PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

As the year 1999 draws to an end and we prepare for the year 2000, some significant milestones call for recognition.

Firstly, there is the Year of Jubilee the Year 2000 which marks the end of the second millennium of the Christian era. Some reflections on the Year of the Jubilee, put together by current students, are featured in this magazine.

Secondly, there is the 100th anniversary of the commencement of Catholic education in Burnie when the Sisters of Mercy began their ministry of educating the Catholic children.

Thirdly, there is the completion of 40 years of secondary education on the site where Marist Regional College now stands.

The centenary celebrations are being organized by a committee working closely with the Sisters of Mercy. The main celebrations will be in the week-end of 10th, 11th & 12th March, 2000.

The 100 year and 40 year anniversaries remind us that we are entrusted with the task of carrying on works that were begun in the face of difficult financial circumstances and were enabled to continue and prosper because of the generosity and hard work of many people, teachers, religious and lay, students and parents.

When I first arrived in Burnie in 1994 I was impressed by the high standing that Marist Regional College enjoyed in the community. I have spoken of this to students at our college assemblies and challenged them to do their part to maintain that high standing, by being proud of the school and its traditions and by doing their part to live up to those traditions at school, when representing the school in public and by their participation in the life of the wider community.

The 1999 school year began with the acknowledgement of a tertiary entrance score of 100 achieved in the 1998 TCE by Phillip Pullinger. Five other students scored above 90 to make that set of results very pleasing news to start the year.

The 1999 musical production, "Return to the Forbidden Planet" in July kept up the great tradition of college musicals of earlier years. The enthusiasm and talent displayed by the students and the laudatory comments from seasoned "musical" goers embolden me to say that the tradition was at least maintained.

A study of the Burrowing Crayfish in Shorewell Creek has received high praise and tangible recognition from the students who began the study and for Jonathon Duniam, who put the report of the project together to submit for the Stockholm Water Prize. The College can take great pride in his achievement to be the first runner-up in this world wide competition.

The three things I have mentioned are some highlights of another crowded year at Marist Regional College in which the solid performances of many in the classroom, in cultural activities, on the sportsfield and in community participation have made 1999 another significant year in the life of the College.

BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

In this my first report to the College community, I open with a reflection on the role of the Board of Management. I very much see the Board as a support to the Principal and Staff in providing the facilities required to achieve the objective of the College - the provision of secondary education according to the Catholic ethos for children of the Burnie area and the North west and West coast areas of Tasmania, by overseeing the financial management in a responsible and diligent manner.

In the past 12 months we have seen the milestone of 40 years since the foundation stone was laid at the then St. James Marist College in November 1958. We also mourned the death in November 1998 of Fr. John Smith who was a participant in the vision of Marist as Parish Priest of Burnie in the late 1950's.

With this history behind us, we as a Board now look at the needs of students at Marist Regional College into the 21st Century. The formation of the vision for Marist has to incorporate the demographics predicted for the region, and the advice from the educationists and the community are important as we manage the available funds for the benefit of our students to maximise their opportunities as they grow and move to the next stage of their development.

These considerations are the guidelines when the priorities of the College funding are assessed. The Principal Fr. Ryder has the unenviable role of assessing the priorities brought to him by his staff. The Board's role is to support the decisions of his Administration Team.

The major issue under consideration in 1999 which has resulted in a Capital Projects submission for funding is for the preliminaries required to upgrade the Art Department facilities. This has highlighted a need to upgrade toilet and shower facilities to ensure we maximise the use of existing buildings.

Other projects which have been addressed by the Board this year include the outsourcing of the Canteen and firming up an agreement on the supply of texts and stationery. The Board was also represented on a committee addressing an Information Technology submission and supported the recommendations of the committee.

There was a significant change in the structure of the Board of Management in 1999. Mr. John Bloomfield did not seek re-election as Chairman. John had been Chairman 11 years and had given remarkable service to Marist Regional College and indeed to Catholic education in Tasmania. He will be a hard act to follow, but John remains on our Board to provide guidance as we reach into the next decade.

Mr. Michael Willis resigned from the Board at the end of 1998. Michael had been an active member of the Board and involved in other College activities for several years and has been active in Catholic education on the North West coast. We sincerely thank Michael for his service to the College.

We welcomed Mrs. Billie Hicks and Mrs. Kathy Cameron to the Board in 1999. Marist Regional is fortunate to have their services available to us as they bring experience in education and community services.

I also wish to thank the other Board members for their personal support and for their service to Marist Regional College:-Mark Summers, Peter Blesson, and Fr. Robert Hollow were re-appointed in 1999, to join Kathleen Siggins, Fr.William Ryder and Sr. Beth Calthorpe.

On behalf of the Board, thank you to the staff, members of the Parents & Friends Association and all who have contributed in any way to make 1999 a successful year.







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JAPANESE TRIP

On 23rd May, Ms Judy Ball bravely led a party of 12, including 6 Marist students (Alanna Smith, Sylvia Hinkley, Claire Dean, Rachel King, Jessica Barnes and John Guest) to Japan for 19 days. The aim of the trip was to improve our language skills, experience the Japanese culture and to have fun.

We travelled for 22 long hours before finally arriving in Tokyo. Greater Toyko has 30 million people, the size was overwhelming. While in Tokyo we met Tomoko Ochi, a past student teacher at Marist who took us shopping at Ginza. Later



we went on a Tokyo Sightseeing Tour which visited the Imperial Palace, Asakusa, Meiji Shrine. We went on a ferry ride around Tokyo Harbour and then to Tokyo Disneyland where we had a fantastic day.

We then experienced the busiest train station in the world, Shinjuku, where we caught our first bullet train to Matsumoto, a small country town where we stayed at a traditional Japanese Inn. We slept on futons, had traditional Onsen (public baths) and tatamu mats. We visited Matsumoto Castle and a traditional museum.

Upon arrival in Kyoto we went with a little apprehension to stay with our Japanese families for one week. Our new experiences we will never forget, and friends and families whose kindness we shall always remember. One day we spent in Nara where we saw the largest Buddha in the world. On our last day of school we had a farewell party. We dressed in traditional clothes and took part in traditional activities such as a tea ceremony and calligra-



phy.

Next we travelled to Hiroshima where we spent the Sunday on an island near Hiroshima called Miajima. It was a relaxing day where we rode around on bikes, saw the floating Tori (gateway) and tried to avoid the deer that liked eating all our things. On Monday we went to the Hiroshima Peace Park and museum. Everyone admired all the paper cranes that had been made by students all over Japan, symbolising luck and peace. The museum was very horrific but helped us understand the war and sympathise with the victims of the Hiroshima bomb.

We left Hiroshima that day and travelled back to Osaka where we spent our last day in Japan with Sono, an exchange student at Marist in 1997 and Yoshiko Arai, a past teacher at Marist.

We arrived home in Tasmania exhausted but happy. We would like to thank Ms Ball for her tremendous efforts both in organising the trip and in taking us to Japan. Thank you to all the parents who spent many nights cooking cakes and organising our trip. A thank you also to everyone who supported the weekly cake stall. Our trip to Japan was a fantastic experience both in furthering our language skills and understanding the Japanese way of life.



On August 11th via a phone call from Chris Davis, Executive Director of the Australian Waste Water Association (AWWA) in Sydney that "The Australian Representative, Jonathon Duniam, presenting a paper entitled *'Habitat Assessment for the Burnie Burrowing Crayfish on Shorewell Creek, Burnie, Tasmania'* had been placed first runner up to the overall winner, Spain, at the International Competition." National representatives from Argentina, Australia, Finland, France, Germany, Great Britain, Italy, Latvia, Poland, South Africa, Spain, Sweden, Thailand and the United States contested the prize. Jonathon was presented with an International Certificate of Commendation by HRH Crown Princess Victoria of Sweden, the Patron of the Stockholm Junior Water Prize.

Sponsors, Australian Waste Water Association and Rio Tinto were thrilled with the outcome in this Australia's first involvement in the international competition which has been running since 1997. Mr. Davis thanked Marist Regional College Science Department for the guidance and supervision which led to the quality of the entry and for the intense preparation of Jonathon for the event. Mr. Greg Cawston, Federal President, who travelled to Stockholm with Jonathon and his family and who spoke with the judging panel stated that what gave the Australian representative the edge was 'his absolute compliance with the entry requirements of the competition, his thorough understanding of all aspects of the project and his ability to speak with passion about the plight of 'The Crayfish', the subject of his study."

The entire College community applauds Jonathon on his achievements on the international stage and thank him sincerely for his personal preparation which led to such a polished presentation. AUSTRALIAN SCHOOLS SCIENCE COMPETITION

On May 11th, 274 students at MRC sat the Australian Schools Science Competition organised by the Educational Testing Centre at the University of New South Wales. In 1999, 717 new schools entered the competition and an enormous 437,047 students participated at venues across Australia, New Zealand and the Asia Pacific region. When results were released, the Competition Director commended highly Marist students Sam Johnson (Year 7) and Nicholas Beeton and Thomas Hiscutt (Year 9) who achieved within the top 1% in the competition. places but were not far short. They were presented Certificates of Achievement and a book (on Physics, of course!) which they in turn presented to the College Library.

TASMANIAN SPACE SCHOOL

On 5th July, Shaun Fitzmaurice (Year 10) received the news that he was selected as one of the 40 students from

across Tasmania to participate in the 1999 Tasmanian Space School. Shaun attended the Space school from 14th-16th July in Devonport. Over the three days the students had an action packed itinerary including workshops and trips (Cape Grim Clean Air Station, Tasmanian Alkaloids, Launceston Planetarium, RAAF presentation, Devonport Airport, Australian Maritime College). The climax of the series of events was a presentation by astronaut, Jim Reilly (NASA), and a rocket launch in the grounds of the Australian Maritime College. Jim Reilly was on the 8th shuttle – Mir docking mission during which the crew transferred more than



9000 pounds of scientific equipment, logistic hardware and water from space shuttle Endeavour to Mir (Jan 21-31 1998). In the 5th and last exchange of a United States astronaut, Reilly delivered Andy Thomas to Mir and returned with David Wolf (February 1999) Shaun's comments: *'The Tasmanian Space school was excellent with great food and people. It was not just about space but about careers in all areas of Science.'*

ROYAL AUSTRALIAN CHEMICAL INSTITUTE TITRATION COMPETITION

The 1999 RACI Titration Competition for the North West region was hosted by Hellyer College on Friday, 13th August. The College was well represented having nine teams



The 1999 Conference was held in Sydney to coincide with the Pacific Science Congress. The Commonwealth Government, Department of Employment, Department of Education, Training and Youth Affairs provide a number of grant aided scholarships to attend. These bursaries were heavily contested by Senior College stu-

dents around Australia and were ultimately won on merit. Students had to provide evidence of academic achievements and interest in science related careers.

Grade 12 students Luisa Lyall and Anita Madden were the recipients of two of the 1999 bursaries. They had the opportunity over three days to hear experts in their fields discussing a range of aspects of science, to meet the speakers personally and to interact with like-minded students from all across Australia. Topics under discussion included molecular biology, environmental science and physics. Both girls considered this a very worthwhile

involvement and made a presentation on their experiences to their peer group upon their return. The following is a comment from Luisa: 'Overall I found the Youth ANZAAS program of 1999 very interesting and was surprised to see how well it related to my current studies at school. It is a good experience to mix with others the same age who were interested in similar subjects to myself and the various activities we undertook gave me a greater understanding into various scientific fields and the future careers options available within them.'

TASMANIAN SCIENCE TALENT SEARCH

The Tasmanian Science Talent Search is an initiative of the Tasmanian Science Teachers Association and is now in its 41st year. The competition adopts a 'theme' each year with that of 1999 being 'Science and Time'. 



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
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MUSIC REPORT

THE MUSICAL

"Return to the Forbidden Planet" by Bob Carlton

The 1999 musical was an amazing combination of Rock'n'Roll, Shakespeare and Science Fiction. All "The Bard's" best known speeches were borrowed to create a loose parody of "The Tempest", about two hundred years in the future and set, not on a remote island but on a remote planet. The story goes as follows:

The audience are all passengers on a 'routine survey flight' with the glamorous Ensign (Corrie Wheare) taking them through a 'polarity reversal drill' before take-off. Ensign is ably assisted by eighteen glittering "Cabin Crew" whose performances include dance routines in the aisles. Captain Tempest (Nathan Broomhall) assisted by Bosun (Hayley Nebauer) and Navigation Officer (Zoe Edwards) is challenged by the new Science Officer (Jessica McPherson) who accuses him of being a misogynist. The flight crew, who unobstrusively monitor and manipulate the ships endless dials, knobs and gauges, are always ready to spring into complex dance routines, whenever the "inflight on stage" band drops an introductory note.

No one seems to have any control over Cookie (Daniel Taylor), a scene stealing comedian who loves good food and beautiful women. The Science Officer has a secret mission of her own, to find her daughter, whom she inadvertently fired off into space while disposing of her over-ambitious husband something-teen years ago.

Suddenly the ship is caught in an asteroid storm, provided for the first time in the musical's history by computer animation (Keegan Rush-Buckley) and is drawn towards a beautiful planet. Strangely enough(!) here lives Prospero (Peter Smiley) an eccentric scientist, and his beautiful daughter Miranda (Sarah Scharvi) and their faithful but somewhat naive Robot, Ariel (James Dwyer) who are (you guessed it!) the lost family of the Science Officer.

A monster attacks the ship, twenty metre tentacles flying down the aisles and across the Flight Deck. This along with Cookie and the Captain's wooing of Miranda, the Science Officer and Prospero resuming their stormy relationships, nineteen Rock'n'Roll songs of the fifties and sixties and the brilliant choreography of Hayley Nebauer, Emily Lane, Penelope Bruce, Alysha Cumming and Mrs. Judy Tyson (with input from many of the crew) danced energetically by the huge cast ensured that great fun and entertainment was had by all.

The set was visually stunning, designed and supervised by Mr. David Hawley with assistance from Zane Lynd and Peter Smiley. The set construction was by Mr. Brett Argent and the MDT team, the glittering costumes were made and designed by Mrs. Suzanne Hennessy, Mrs. Bev Dwyer, Mrs. K. Raschle and a band of parents. Special mention must by made of Ariel the Robot's costume.

The stage crew, highly efficient and supervised by Mr. Steve Dobbie and Mr. Matthew Williams, managed the science fiction effects very well. The lighting by Mr. Garth Tuckett reinforced the SciFi effects. Mr. Marcus Taylor and Ms. Oma Rodger designed and made the monsters fearful twenty metre tentacles. Computer animation was provided with the assistance of Launceston Church Grammar CAD students. Five videoed scenes were filmed and edited by Dr. Wayne Martin. The number of Credits awarded in other year groups were Year 8, 19; Year 9, 25; Year 10, 18; Year 11, 10; and Year 12, 7.














GRADE 10 WORK EXPERIENCE

A useful and rewarding week was completed by all providing invaluable knowledge for students as they begin to plan for their futures and make decisions about subject choices for the year 2000 and beyond. Placing students in areas of work which are suited to their interests and their abilities has not been easy and I am deeply indebted to the business and industrial communities of Burnie and many firms in other parts of Tasmania. The goodwill and generosity of employers to allow our students to participate in this valuable vocational programme is greatly appreciated.

Tuesday May 11 saw Marist Regional College once again transformed for the afternoon into an efficient, very busy and exciting mock emploment agency with 70 invited business people joining our staff and Year 10 students to participate in the College's annual Mock Interview Day.

The generosity and support of our visitors so ready to supply the necessary helping hand, giving up their valuable time to assist our students and the flexibility of our staff that allows such re-organisation of the school day for this unique programme can never be overstated and is greatly appreciated.

The day is the culmination of many weeks of preparation and hard work for the students and teachers of Work Studies. The sincerity and care with which the students faced the challenge was commendable. With a clear sense of purpose 120 students met interviewing panels of 2 or 3 employers invited especially to lend their expertise and experience matched to the choice of work selected by the student. Pre-examined letters and resumes were discussed and evaluated, personal statements, Records of Achievement folders were presented, knowledge of the position applied for and the associated study requirements and career pathways were tested. Personal presentation, courtesy, and interviewing techniques were observed in an atmosphere of concern and genuine support. Our students enthusiastically accepted the knowledge gained not only in the area of communication and interviewing skills, but the broader sense of understanding themselves and their life's goals more clearly.



Right at the heart of the success of this programme has been Mrs Iris Bingham, member of the Burnie Business and Professional Womens' Club whose members initiated the very first Mock Interview programme at Marist Regional College 15 years ago and have supported it ever since. Mrs Bingham has devoted endless hours all of those years to the task of inviting Year 10 students to present themselves for interviews with the business community she coordinates to assist our students. Regrettably Mrs Bingham has retired from this role this year. We will miss her enthusiasm,

generosity and energy greatly and thank her sincerely on behalf of the many hundreds of students she has assisted during her time working for her adopted school. We also congratulate Iris for the book she has produced this year recording the processes used for the programme at this College. Titled 'Organising Mock Interviews' it is

available for a small price for those who wish to consider a similar programme. Thank you Iris from all at Marist Regional College !
