PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

The circumstance of my being chosen as the next Provincial of the Marist Fathers has meant that when I began to write this report, I was living for a few weeks in Rome attending a "new provincials' workshop".

Being in Rome made one very conscious of the year of the Jubilee and the many thousands, even millions of people coming to Rome as pilgrims to participate in the Jubilee program.

A question arose in my mind "How relevant is all that is going on in Rome to the future of the Church? How relevant is it to the continuing mission of the Church in Tasmania - to the role in the Church for Marist Regional College?"

In Rome one gets a sense of history having been lived out. Locations, buildings and monuments from the first millenium abound. Nevertheless, Rome is a city of contrasts. Among buildings I visited was the Pantheon, now in regular use as a Parish Church, but which was built before the Christian era. Another was the Paul V1 auditorium at the Vatican, in regular use for gatherings addressed by the pope, built during the second half of the twentieth century. The former about 20 centuries old, the latter not a lot more than 20 years old!

Among the ceremonies I saw were a Mass at St. Peters, celebrated by the Pope with an abundance of bishops in attendance and for which the order of service and precedence among clerics was carefully set out in the Vatican newspaper. I also had the privilege of sharing in the evening prayer of a community run by lay people in one of the oldest churches dedicated to Mary. This nightly service fills the rather large basilica and simultaneous translation is provided in several languages to cater for their many visitors.

There are the contrasts! The old and the new, the hierarchical church and the church moved along by devoted and dedicated lay women and men.

At the time of the "Call to Change" in Tasmania, I feel it is an appropriate time to ponder the place of Marist Regional College in the church of the 21st century which is about to begin.

I see Marist Regional College and indeed all Catholic schools with an important, even essential role. The church men and women of the new century will continue to need to be taught about the gospel

message, about the history and traditions of the church. The environment will need to be established where students can learn about the varied roles to be played in the church. If it be God's will for them they will need encouragement to become priests and religious. The majority will need to be prepared to be good Christian lay women and men who can carry on the work of the church in the secular world of the 21st century.

If the Church is to play any significant role in influencing the ethos of 21st century society it will be through the lifestyle of Christians aware of the gospel message and who live out that message in their daily lives and so bear witness to the gospel. Vatican 11 placed the emphasis in spreading the gospel on the contact of Christian men and women with their neighbours, their work mates and their social acquaintances. It falls to schools such as Marist Regional College to support (and unfortunately, sometimes virtually replace) families in preparing young men and women to be the witness to the gospel.

It is with some misgivings that year by year I see young men and women move on from school to the next phase of their lives. In the way they live out their lives they will show how the College has succeeded in preparing them to be good followers of Christ, "good citizens and well prepared for life."

It is my hope and prayer that in the years to come the names of the men and women active and leading the church and civil society in Tasmania will include names familiar to me because they will be names of students who attended Marist Regional College in the last few years of the twentieth century when it has been my privilege to serve the school as principal.

BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

The year 2000 has been a year of structural change in catholic education in Tasmania. These changes reflect the type of business structural changes that have been found necessary in the community around us, and we at Marist were not excluded.

Marist Regional College was invited to participate in an Association of Catholic Colleges in Tasmania to form a systemic arrangement for funding. This is seen as a positive move for the advancement of catholic education in Tasmania. Upon the clarification of the guidelines of association, the Board was in strong support of this move that will benefit not only Marist Regional, but also the whole of the senior catholic education system in Tasmania.

The Governing Council of Marist Regional College was established this year replacing Marist Regional College Incorporated. This change has been made to give more local ownership to the governance of the College. An example of this is the registered office of Marist Regional College Incorporated has been transferred to Burnie, which allows the Business Manager, as Public Officer, more involvement with the compliance with legal provisions. Sadly at the beginning of 2000 the Sisters of Mercy gave notification of their withdrawal from the Governance of the College. The Sisters of Mercy remain on the College's Governing Council, thought at this stage they do not have a representative on the Board of Management.

Student numbers at Marist fell to 630 in 2000 from 663 in 1999, with 156 in the Senior College, as the region deals with the local economic situation and the resultant population trends in the district. Financial management of the College with a projected decline in student numbers over the next five years (as recent evaluation of feeder school enrolments predict a 6% reduction in numbers) will be a challenge. The formation of a vision for Marist has had to incorporate the demographics predicted for the region together with the advice of educationalists and the school community. We believe that Marist Regional College is well placed in continuing to provide quality Catholic secondary education for our young men and women.

The year 2000 has seen a continuation of opportunities to make sure cost efficiencies at Marist are maintained. Outsourcing is a necessary efficiency in business that allows effective use of available community specialists. This year the change was to outsource the Uniform shop. This follows similar successful actions with the Canteen and book sales in recent years.

An increase in Supplementation through Federal Government grants allowed the College to maintain a good cash flow through from 1999, and as a result, it was not necessary to borrow money (as budgeted) to achieve the projects planned for this year. This positive status has allowed renovation works in the old toilet/shower block to provide five co-ordinators' offices and two small tutorial rooms to proceed financed internally.

At the beginning of second term students were able to use the new toilet block and renovated internal shower/toilet facilities. This asset development program that required Capital Projects funding is the preliminary required to upgrade the Art Department. It was found necessary to upgrade toilet and shower facilities to ensure maximum use of existing buildings. These renovations will free up space for the Art Department development in our 5 year plan.

The Board Members for 2000 were Messrs. Peter Blesson, John Bloomfield, Mark Summers, David Dwyer (Chairman), Fr Robert Hollow, Fr William Ryder, Mrs Kathleen Siggins, Mrs Billie Hicks and Mrs Kathly Cameron. The Board has met regularly during the year and I am pleased to be supported by the members and thank them for their participation. Mrs Suzanne Harris is a recent appointment to the Board.

The Board congratulates the new Principal Fr Pat Kervin on his appointment. It is a positive for us that Fr Pat is already available at the College with a strong understanding of the existing operations. Congratulations to Mrs Sue Chen on her appointment as Deputy Principal. We look forward to the new year working with this new Team and wish them well in their leadership of the College.

Last but not least I wish to thank Fr Bill Ryder for his service to the College and to catholic education in Tasmania. Fr Bill has worked tirelessly for the College in his 7 years in Burnie. He has been devoted to the cause of financial justice, with his efforts rewarded with changes to the Federal Government system finally bringing about equity last year. We also congratulate Fr Bill on his new appointment as Provincial, the head of the Marist Fathers in Australia. Well don Fr Bill.

FAREWELL FR RYDER

While we expected that Fr Ryder would complete his term as Principal at Marist Regional College at the end of this year, we were not certain of his future appointment until last August when it was announced that Fr Bill Ryder, S.M., had been elected as Provincial Superior of the Marist Fathers' Australian Province.

Fr Ryder professed his vows as a Marist in 1956 and was ordained a priest in 1961. Apart from periods of study at the University of New England, NSW, and the Catholic University of America, USA, Fr Ryder has been involved in the ministry of secondary education at St. Paul's College, Bellambi, NSW, Holy Spirit College, Bellambi, NSW, St John's College, Lismore, NSW and has been Principal of Marist Regional College, Burnie, since 1994.

During his principalship at Marist Regional College we have watched the continued growth of the College and a continuing improvement in the College's facilities. During the last seven years we have seen Year 6 returned to Stella Maris Primary, the completion of building projects for the Library Resource Centre, Home Economics, Textiles and Speech and Drama, the refurbishment of the Science, MDT, Music, Photography, Change Rooms, and faculty office areas. The College has benefited from Fr Ryder's efforts in securing a more equitable funding for the College from the Commonwealth Government, and more recently through the Association of Catholic Colleges in Tasmania.

While we look to the improvements in College facilities with gratitude, I would hope that Fr Ryder will be remembered for his vision for the College, his collaborative leadership and for his sensitivity and compassion for those whom he served. His care extended beyond the College grounds as Fr Ryder gave of his time and talent to work with other College and Archdiocesan bodies to assist the growth of Catholic Education throughout the Archdiocese. His efforts have reminded us all of the importance of Catholic Education and that this College only has meaning in the context of its mission.

We wish Fr Ryder well in his new role as Provincial of the Marist Fathers and thank him for all he has given us during his seven years here.

MARIST REGIONAL COLLEGE PARENTS & FRIENDS

It is with pleasure that I present the annual report for the year 2000.

This is the first year of our new P&F format with only 5 meetings per year and one major fundraiser, namely, the fete. The new structure was devised in response to the low attendances at P&F meetings and a perceived lack of time and interest in sustained fundraising, the aim being to maintain and even increase the essential interest and role of parents in the school in a more compact format.

At the end of the year I believe that we can be satisfied with the outcome. Attendances at meetings have increased marginally and it will take a little time to build the culture of the once-per-year fundraiser. The job of finding interesting and available guest speakers is not always easy and I appeal to all members to assist the incoming President with this task.

The Fete this year proved successful with net fundraising of over \$8,000. However, I believe we should work to increase this amount to well over \$10,000 as a once-off effort. We should encourage all parents to participate in some way - as helpers, purchasers or by giving a donation. Thank you to all parents, staff, friends and students who contributed to the success of the fete.

Upon the transfer of the uniform shop to private interests we received our final dividend of \$4,300.

This year we have followed the usual pattern of spending approximately the amount we have raised. \$4,000 has been allocated to grounds fencing to protect lawn areas from traffic and \$4,430 has been spent on sheet music for our very successful bands. A further amount has been earmarked for fencing at the northern end of the football ground pending plans and cost estimates.

Father Bill has come to the end of his term at Marist and on behalf of the P&F I wish him well in his new and important role as the Principal of the Marist Fathers in Australia. He has served the School well and his efforts in obtaining a better funding formula for the school has been a major achievement. I congratulate Father Pat on his appointment as Principal in 2001 and Sue Chen on her appointment as deputy principal.

I am most grateful to all of the parents, friends and staff who have actively supported the P&F this year. In particular, I must thank Suzanne Harris and Jules Wilson for representing the P&F at Federation meetings.

Marilyn Smiley has been Secretary for some years and this year is retiring from that position due to work commitments. Sue Walsh is in her last year of family involvement in the College and also wishes to retire. Sue has served as Treasurer and previously President of the Association and has made a major contribution to the School. To both Marilyn and Sue I say thank you.







Year 8P-2000

MATHEMATICS

TASMANIAN MATHS COMPETITION:

One hundred and twenty six Marist Regional College students from all grades tried out their problem solving abilities when they participated in The Tasmanian Maths Competition in May this year. Nicholas Beeton from Year 10 won first prize in the Intermediate Section for Year 9 & 10 students. He can add this outstanding result to his 1998 win in the Junior Section of this competition. Others to do well this year were Esther Harris (Year 8) and Matthew Conlon (Year 7) who were among the eleven students state wide to receive Outstanding Awards.

AUSTRALIAN MATHS COMPETITION:

All students from Year 7 were entered in The Australian Maths Competition which was held in August. For students from Year 8 - 12 entry was optional. The participation rate was excellent, with a total of 263 students trying their hand in the competition. Nicholas Beeton was placed in the top 0.3% of his year group and was awarded a prize. He also received a certificate for the best result by a student from Marist Regional College. High Distinctions are awarded to students whose results are in the top 2%. Those to be awarded high distinctions are Alan Forrest (Year 7), Matthew Ribbon, James Berechree, Rachel McKenna, Kayden Walsh, Liam Webb (Year 8), Jarred Moore (Year 9) and Nicholas Cuff (Year 10). Forty two students received distinctions and 95 were awarded credits.

MATHS RELAYS:

How do you conduct a Maths Relay? You need 1 gymnasium, teams of four energetic enthusiastic students, a set of 20 problems to solve, a large clock for timing, and an adult marker. On the word "go" three students from each team solve the first problem as quickly as they can nervously watched by the fourth who acts as the runner. The runner conveys their answer to the marker. For each new question the student acting as runner rotates through the group. Points are awarded for correct answers. A phone link between Burnie, Launceston and Hobart enables this competition to be a state wide one.

Seven teams represented Marist in this years Tasmanian Maths Association Maths Relays, with all grades from 7-12 represented. Although none of our teams were among the winners, they demonstrated excellent problem solving skills and an enjoyable time was had by all.







PYRETHRUM INDUSTRY/UNIVERSITY OF TASMANIA SCIENCE RESEARCH AWARDS

The year 2000 saw the establishment of a new award in Tasmania to recognise excellence in student research at grade 11 and 12 levels. The award was co-ordinated by the University of Tasmania and jointly funded by The Pyrethrum Growers Association and Botanical Resources Australia. Marist Regional College had two research groups familiarly known as 'The Grass Group' and 'The Apple Group'. Members worked diligently for six months on their chosen topics and submitted their reports by the due date. On presentation night they attended the University and 'spoke to' their research in front of an audience of university personnel, primary industry representatives, sponsors, parents and invited guests. Without any signs of nerves or stage fright at the magnitude of the occasion, members of both teams spoke with confidence and provided convincing evidence of personal understanding of the research topics. The delight was enormous when it was announced that the Marist students had taken First and Second prizes in the competition and secured both \$500 awards.

FIRST PRIZE was taken by Lyle Crawford and Ryan Sweeney with a project entitled 'An Apple a Day..........' The research explored a number of storage variables and their subsequent effects on maintaining Vitamin C levels in locally grown apples. The project was applauded for its ingenuity, scientific methods, practical value and presentation on Awards Night.

SECOND PRIZE was awarded to Adam Hoare, Alex Martin, Nicole Morse, Bonnie Owens and Andrew Taylor for an investigation entitled 'Watching the Grass Grow'. For their project the students set up controlled growth media for the grass, tall fescue, common growth in North West Tasmania. They varied the fertiliser types using a range of inorganic and organic applications and compared early growth rates with fertiliser application. The investigation was commended for its practical nature and demonstration of the importance of science to the community.









MOCK INTERVIEWS

In order for students to develop interviewing techniques and life skills all 130 Year 10 students undertake a Mock Interview in the subject 'Work Studies'. Seventy business people generously gave up their valuable time to interview the students as potential employees. This is an extremely worthwhile day and many of the students find the interviewing panel a challenge. Many weeks are spent preparing the students to undertake the interview successfully with particular emphasis on interview skills and techniques, pre-examined letters and resumes, achievement folders completed, personal statements, role plays to assist with speaking clearly, having a confident manner, understanding the nature of competitive situations in the workplace and the need to present oneself in the very best light.

Being interviewed for a job is a daunting and stressful event. The entire exercise is one of welcoming the challenge, accepting change and developing skills to equip the student for the unexpectedness which can occur in interviews. As Maslow states: 'we need a different kind of human being, able to live in a world which changes perpetually; people who have been educated to be comfortable with change in situations of which they have absolutely no forewarning'. The work undertaken by the students in Work Studies provides for the challenge of change and dealing with future career options. Students at the Mock Interview gain a purpose of what happens in the workforce and how to prepare fully for an interview.

Special thanks must go to Mrs Sandra French and members of the Burnie Business and Professional Women's Club and all the business people who assisted the students to learn key competencies in interviewing techniques in an atmosphere of concern and genuine support. Students enthusiastically met the challenge, gained vital knowledge and are now able to apply for any jobs with greater confidence, ability and experience.

One young lady had an interesting and exciting week working at Beauty Point with the recently developed Sea Horse farm. The Aquaculture area is fast becoming a thriving industry within Tasmania and two students also worked in Strahan at separate fish farms.

Placing 130 Year 10 students is a difficult task and all the students must be congratulated on their maturity and commitment to work.

Mrs Probert plans to retire from Marist Regional College at the end of this year and having worked closely with her in Careers/Work Studies, I would like to take this opportunity to thank her sincerely for her generosity, professionalism and dedication.













SENIOR COLLEGE CLASSES













Vocational Education & Training

In 2000, Vocational Education and Training Programs were offered in the industry areas; Hospitality, Office Administration, Community Services (Aged Care and Disability Care) and Engineering/Automotive Trades. With the exception of Engineering/Automotive Trades, all programs were run jointly with Hellyer College, Engineering/Automotive Trades was a partnership program with TAFE Tasmania. During the course of the year all students undertaking a Vocational Educational and Training programme completed a Workplace First Aid Certificate with Red Cross and fire training with TasFire.

Engineering/Automotive Trades Programme

The newest VET programme was launched this year as a partnership programme with Marist Regional College and TAFE Tasmania. This unique programme saw students attend the Burnie TAFE College each Friday to undertake off-the-job training and assessment in Automotive, Metal Fabrication, Fitting and Machining and Electrical nationally accredited industry units of competence. At the conclusion of the programme students will have had the opportunity to gain eight units of competency which may count towards a traineeship/apprenticeship or further study in the Engineering/Automotive industry. In addition to the off-the-job training, students have also gained experience in the workplace having undertaken up to three structured work placements in local businesses related to the programme.

Community Services

In its second year of operation at Marist Regional College, this year Community Services combined with Hellyer College to offer students from both colleges the opportunity to gain Certificate II in Community Services in either the Aged Care or Disability Services specialisation. Again, the training for this VET course based on the Community Services National Training Package, has been delivered by industry personnel both on and off the job. For the Community Services trainees the year commenced with the Aging Game at Yaraandoo, a game designed to simulate the feelings associated with aging. During the course of the year students have undertaken four weeks workplacement in up to three different local work sites. In addition to their work at college, trainees attended industry led seminars and training sessions conducted by specialists in the industry; topics included occupational health and safety, protective behaviour, alternative therapy, introduction to disability care and aged care, communication and numerous site visits.

Office Administration

The trainees commenced the year with the well established, combined Marist Regional College and Hellyer College Orientation Day at the Burnie Surf Club, where students were introduced to the Office Administration programme, the employers and Hellyer College trainees. Throughout the year students have experienced the world of business having undertaken three work placements in the Office Administration area. In addition to their training at Marist Regional College, the students attended the Burnie TAFE Postlink Practice Firm, where they were exposed to and carried out tasks within the simulated practice firm.

Hospitality

Students in the Hospitality Vocational Education and Training programme also commenced the year with a combined Marist Regional College and Hellyer College Orientation Day. Throughout the year the trainees have gained skills and experience in the Hospitality Industry having undertaken four weeks workplacement in local businesses. For these trainees the year concluded with the showcasing of their skills with the Burnie VET Training and Assessment Week held at the Burnie Civic Centre. During this week trainees from both Marist and Hellyer Colleges received training in the preparation and operation of a fine dining restaurant. The menu posed a challenge to both the kitchen and front of house trainees allowing them to demonstrate their talents and skills in the Hospitality Industry. Many local sponsors also contributed generously and their support is gratefully acknowledged.

Sincere thanks are extended to all workplacement employers, trainers and supervisors, the hardworking members of each of the Industry Advisory Committees, TAFE Tasmania and Hellyer College personnel. We look forward to next year with the involvement of more students and staff in the VET in Schools Programme.


......during which "Looditz" entertained the crowd with peaceful rock in the foyer.


SWIMMING CARNIVAL

The police estimation of numbers was 25,000, the largest turnout of any state per head of population.

We felt proud to be part of the celebration for reconciliation and hope that the event will send the message to all Australians that we are sorry for the mistakes made in the past, and that we want to mend relationships with the Aboriginal people.




























HOUSE REPORTS
