PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Compassion marks true leadership

In August the College community proudly unveiled the sculpture in our reconciliation garden. The creation of Rahamim began with a visit from Victorian sculptor Pauline Clayton. Pauline was commissioned by the College Board in 2010 to design a bronze work that reflected the Gospel values held dear by the College in its founding stories and in the way this community seeks to build positive relationships and care for one another.

Pauline visited us in November last year and worked with many of our Year 10 students to find out what they believe is important about being Mercy and Marist people. Our students told

Pauline that this College is a place where people are cared for, where learning is important and where students are encouraged to grow into compassionate and caring adults.

Pauline returned to Melbourne and inspired by the students' stories and the parable of the Good Samaritan she created Rahamim. Rahamim is the Hebrew word used by Jesus in the parable of the Good Samaritan and means "womb love" or deep compassion, a love which envelops and protects. Pauline, unfortunately, was unable to join us for the unveiling of the sculpture on Feast Day. However, she sent us a beautiful message.

Mercy ministry draws to a close

After more than a decade of gentle mission and compassionate service, the College community said a sad farewell to Sr Kathlyn O'Brien RSM.

On 2 March, we said thank you and God bless to a gentle soul who, through her work ministering to families in need, demonstrated how to be a living witness to the Mercy spirit.

Sr Kathlyn's leaving marks a sad chapter in our history, drawing to a close the physical presence of the Sisters of Mercy that began in Burnie in 1900.

Sr Kathlyn first arrived in Burnie as Sr Chanel in 1967, teaching Grade 2 at Stella Maris Convent School. After a stint in Victoria Sr Kathlyn joined our College community in 1998 to take up a much needed role in ministering to families in need during times of crisis. In more recent times, Sr Kathlyn has worked as the school's archivist, securing and preserving the historical records of the College.

In 2009, Sr Kathlyn celebrated 50 years as a Mercy Sister. One of her favourite quotations of Catherine McAuley, founder of the Sisters of Mercy is, 'There are things that the poor prize more highly than gold, tho' they cost the donor nothing; among these are the kind word, the gentle, compassionate look, and the patient hearing of their sorrows'.

Sr Kathlyn's departure is not the end of the Mercy tradition here at Marist, for she has handed the baton to us and we are all called to carry on the good work of the Sisters of Mercy.

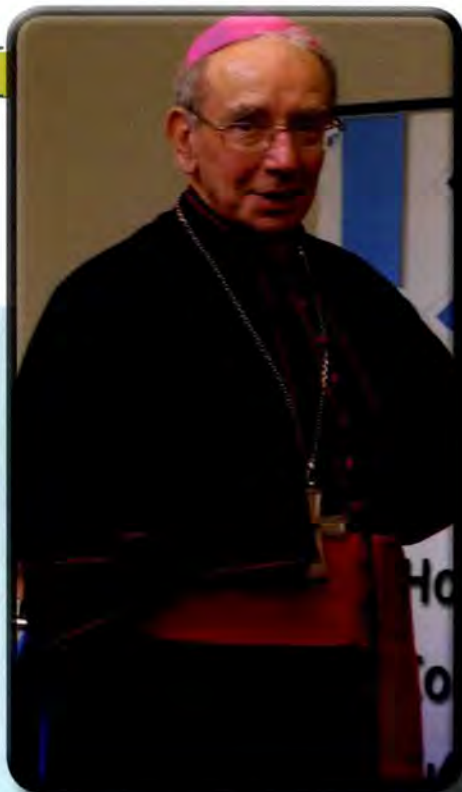

delivered by our e-Learning coordinator and the provision of approximately 600 computers in the College as well as other electronic resources to support learning.

Our Middle Years program is producing excellent results with students engaged in their learning and expressing high levels of satisfaction. It is always a joy to visit the Chanel Centre and talk with enthusiastic Year 7 students about their learning and to see how the design of the building enhances learning.

NUMERACY & LITERACY

The results for NAPLAN 2011 indicate that, as a College, we continue to perform well compared with similar schools, in this State and across the nation. Credit goes to students who work hard, parents for their support of children's learning and to the staff for their quality teaching. We have a reputation for a high standard of education which is supported by hard evidence.

ACADEMIC HIGHLIGHTS

A highlight this year was the Frank MacDonald prize won for the first time in 2010 by Marist student, Declan Fahey and this year again awarded to a Marist student — this time to Year 9 student, Jacqueline Smedley. What better way to experience history of Australia's involvement in the world was than to visit Gallipoli, Belgium and France.

Our Year 12 results give great cause for celebration. The highest university entrance ranking or Australian Tertiary Admission Rank at the College, 99.95, was awarded to our College Dux, Georgia Jaffray and was the equal highest score in Tasmania. Ellie House achieved an ATAR of 99.65. These two students ranked in the top one and two per cent respectively in Australia. Fifty per cent of our Year 12 students achieved an ATAR of 80 or more, placing them in the top 20 per cent in Australia.

Each year our students achieve academically above the average for both the Catholic sector and all Tasmanian schools in results and student participation in learning. We do this even though our students have a significant disadvantage in social economic status and in remoteness.

RETENTION

One of the challenges for Tasmanian education, especially on the North West Coast, is the lower retention rate of students at Year 11 and 12. Too many of our young people leave school without completing Year 12 and take up part-time jobs that provide little or no further training. Recent research is very clear that students who do not complete Year 12, who do not gain post-school qualifications and those who go no further than Certificate II in vocational training will, on average, have significantly less income and greater periods of unemployment during their working lives.

Some of our Year 10 students elect to go to alternative education at the end of Year 10, sometimes because we are unable to provide the specific courses requested. Often, however, it is because of a misplaced understanding that there will be more freedom with alternative providers. This was reflected in a recent survey of Year 10, 11 and 12 students. In contrast to Year 10 students, Senior College students said they enjoyed Marist because of the freedom offered them as senior students. Clearly, we have some work to do in clarifying perceptions and celebrating what we do well in Senior College.

VOCATIONAL EDUCATION

A renewed focus this year has been on the extension of vocational and trade-based courses at the College to provide flexible opportunities for students to undertake nationally certified courses along with university entrance subjects. The opportunity to do both is an integral part of the curriculum and is growing with student and community interest.

Recent discussions with representatives from the Department of Education emphasised our mutual interest in regional education and putting the interests of students before institutional interests. Marist students are able to join Polytechnic classes and vice versa where either institution is unable to provide particular courses due to lack of facilities or teachers. Such a dual enrolment process allows our students to engage in subjects on our campus as well as participate in all of the other cultural, sporting and

spiritual opportunities that our College provides while gaining from vocational education training at other institutions. We look forward to a future where other institutions use our facilities to provide hospitality and bakery courses to their students.

A highlight this year has been the development of the Cradle Coast Trade Training Centre — a fantastic facility through which we can provide industry-standard training for students in our region, with the purpose-built commercial kitchen, bakery, café, training restaurant, reception area and office. This facility will support a range of VET courses that will be offered to our students and partner organisations. The appointment of Louise Thynne as Director of VET from 2012 will drive initiatives and ensure our vocational curriculum continues to expand. We have been able to increase course offerings for subject selections for the coming year.

DADIRRI STUDENT CENTRE

The refurbishment of existing rooms, early in the year, to create the Dadirri Student Centre, has provided a welcome and necessary space for the student body. The Centre is home to both the counselling and learning enhancement teams and many students have been accessing the area for counselling support, remedial learning, lunchtime meetings, tutoring and other activities.

At the Marist national conference earlier this year Miriam Rose Unungemerr, Aboriginal leader and educator from the Daly River, offered a suggestion for an Aboriginal name for the centre that would reflect something of our key objectives: Dadirri, an Aboriginal word for inner deep listening and quiet still awareness.

In its annual report, the Dadirri team described a vision of the centre as a sanctuary where the pursuit of knowledge and a commitment to achieve potential is encouraged and valued and where self-acceptance and respect for others are values embraced, experienced and shared. It is a vision inclusive of all learners and embraces particularly those students who are struggling in one way or another. The hope for the future is that the Dadirri Student Centre will continue to grow in its advocacy of students at educational risk.

SAFE SCHOOL FRAMEWORK

In response to the recently updated National Safe Schools Framework document, our Pastoral Care team has conducted an extensive audit of the College policies and practices relating to community safety and wellbeing. A group of students, supported by several staff members, has been working together to promote and enhance a safe school environment.

The students, from Years 7-12, have

spoken at both whole school and year level assemblies and have developed an online survey for students. We are keen to continue this important work into 2012 and beyond and will use the survey data to inform future policy and practice in this area.

PARALLEL BOYS PROGRAM

Our parallel program will come to fruition at the start of 2012 for a small group of Year 10 students. An application process, consisting of both a written submission and an interview, has resulted in 21 boys being offered places in the program.

We hope that through the program the students will become more confident and self-aware, responsible, accountable and ultimately develop a greater motivation to achieve and succeed at school.

CONCLUSION

On behalf of the College I would like to thank Archbishop Adrian who, as Archbishop and chairman of our Governing Council, has ultimate responsibility for the College. Given his impending retirement, we take this opportunity to thank him sincerely for his support, kindness and trust in the leadership of the College. His style of leadership has provided careful governance of the College but also allowed the Board and leadership

The second event involved the change of role for Fr Ray Chapman who left the Board during the year to join the Governing Council. We wish him all the best and thank him for his insights, his spirit of leadership and his joyful personality. We are lucky to still have direct contributions from the Marists through our local parish with the representation of Fr Tony Kennedy.

The Board membership remained relatively stable with the addition of Kevin O'Daly and the finishing up of chairman Garry Dazeley who had contributed so much in his time. To say that the VET training project, mentioned above, has been a success is very much an understatement. Thanks must be extended to Mr Kimbal Chen and Brendan Schmidt whose contributions were instrumental in obtaining the funding approval from the Federal Government. The school is progressing towards the construction of our Arts Hub alterations and additions with acceptance of tendering.

The Board meetings continued to deal with the annual agenda which ensures at least touching upon all significant matters at least once a year and with all matters which arise from time to time.

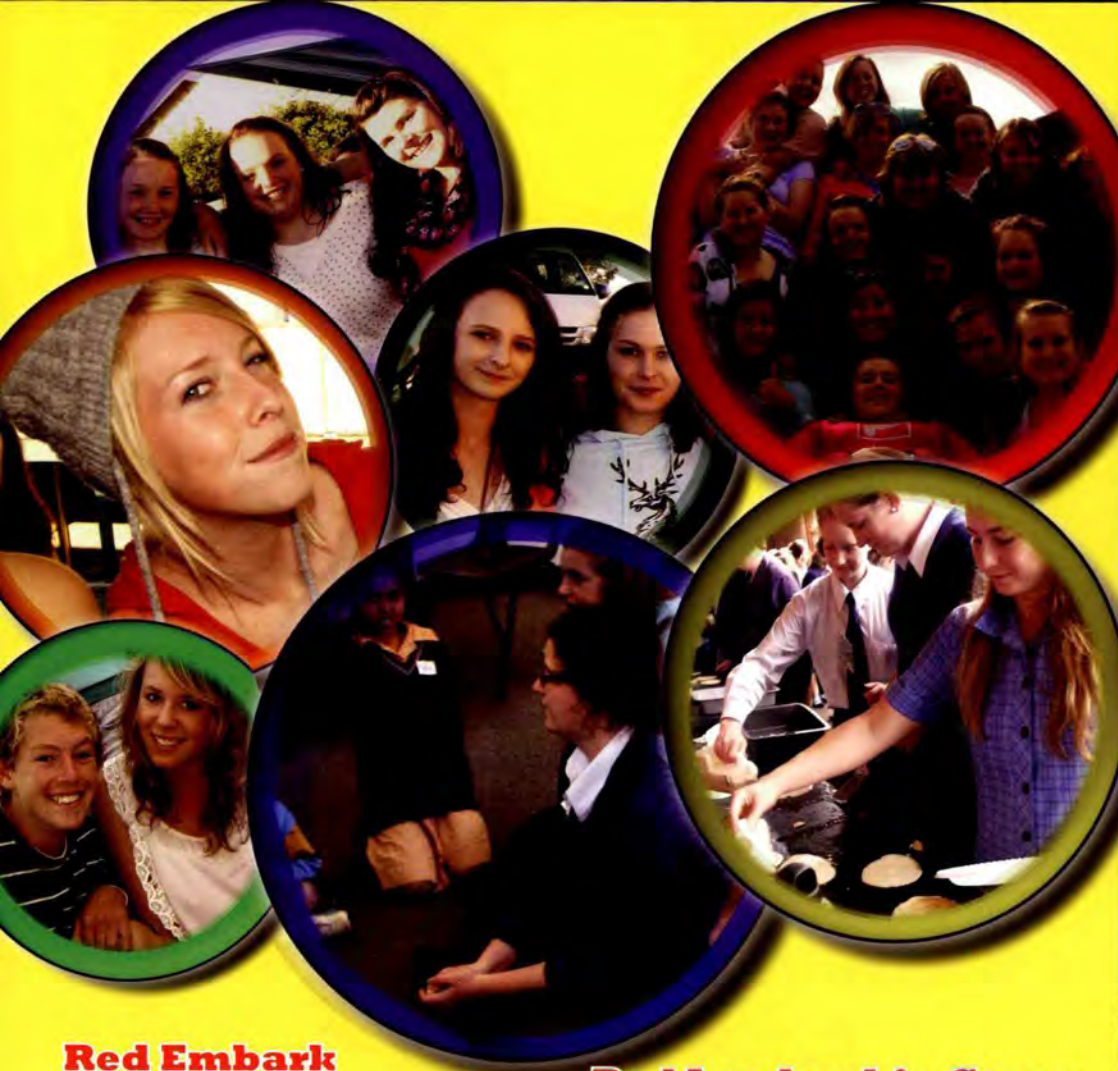
Fr Kado will be working with Fr Tony Kennedy in the Burnie/Wynyard Parish.

Solidarity Camp

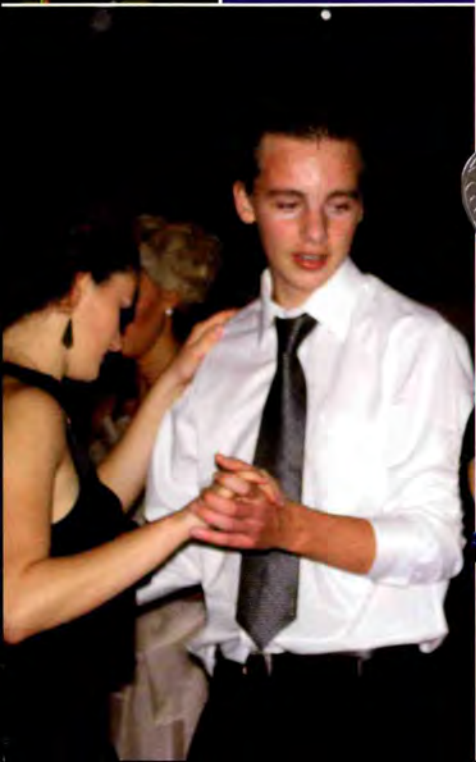

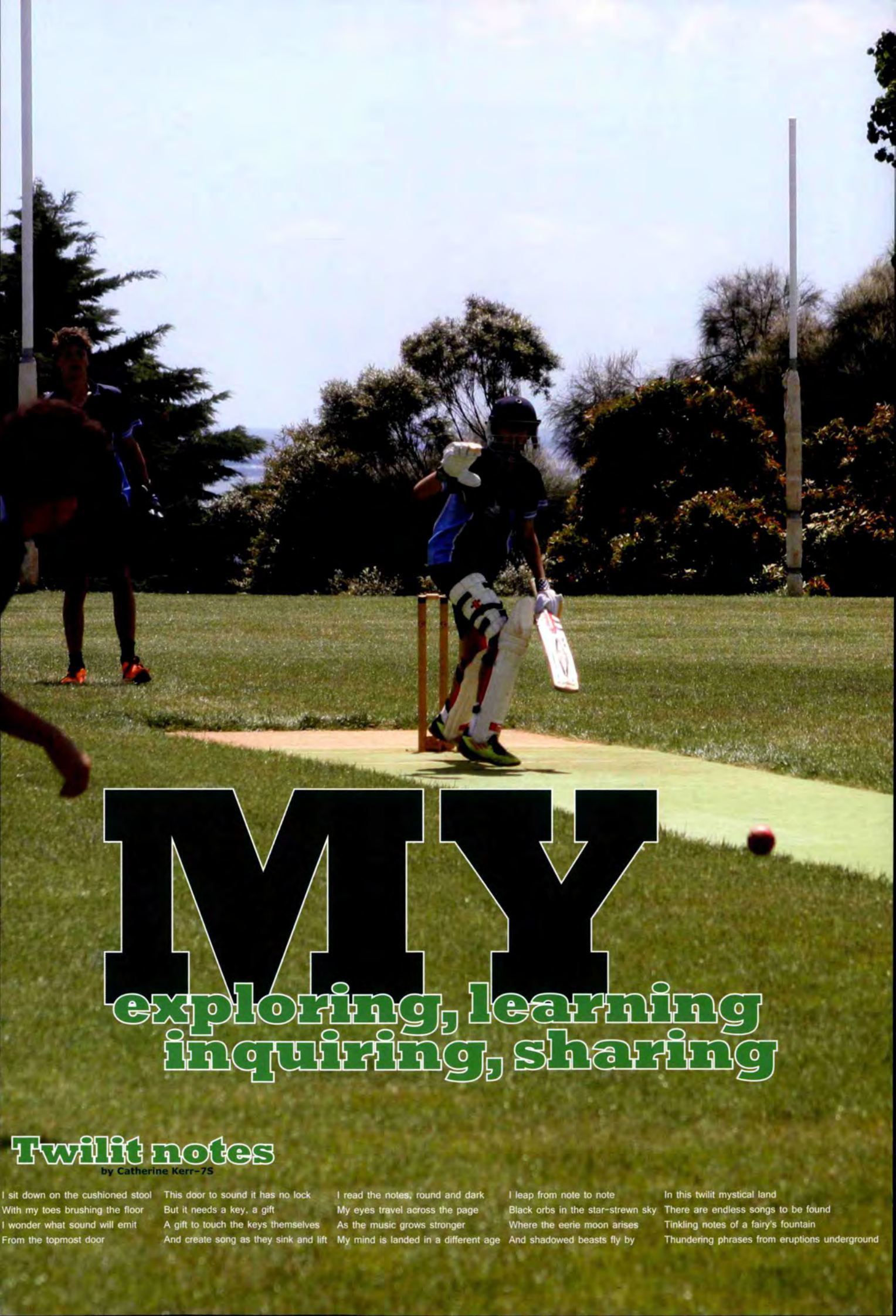

DIRECTOR OF MIDDLE YEARS



The Middle Years learning program, involving Year 7 and 8 students, recognises that young adolescents have particular academic, pastoral and social needs as they make the transition from primary to secondary education.

This year at Marist, the Middle Years learning program has included an integrated curriculum structured around big ideas that relate to all subject specialisations.

The focus...is to make students feel welcome and part of the Marist community

In Term 2, Medieval Day for Year 8 students and Rome Day for Year 7 students were very successful cross-curricula days, both of which included a strong focus on pastoral care.

We implemented the Australian Curriculum in the areas of English, history, maths and science. A feature of the Australian Curriculum in our Middle Years learning program is creative, 'hands-on' learning. Some classroom examples included the construction of ancient clay name plates, aboriginal art, infomercials and the design and construction of ancient Rome or China models and dioramas.

In Middle Years, we continued to offer a literacy program to students who needed extra support in this area. Students worked in small groups to develop their literacy skills, working from their current level. All students were tested in November 2009 and again in November 2010. The results have clearly shown the value of the program with increases in reading grade levels.

Middle Years students have only two core subject teachers and we believe this has contributed to the establishment of positive relationships between students and teachers.



The first two days of the year for our new Year 7 students involved a transition program to assist students into settling in at Marist. The focus of the two days was to make students feel welcome and part of the Marist community. It also aimed to develop positive relationships between students and Year 7 teachers prior to commencing timetabled academic study. Year 8 students participated in a Super 8s Day early in the year to assist them in developing their cooperation and team work skills.

Middle Years students broke out of traditional classroom learning towards the end of the academic year to embark on a four-day program based on a number of literacy, numeracy and physical recreation activities. Among the activities on offer were screen printing, card making, digital image manipulation, zumba and an extended cricket "test" match.

Overall 2011 has been a fantastic start to Middle Years learning at Marist Regional College.

students have had the opportunity to continue to examine the complex issue of bullying, through the creation of posters in Year 7 and enacting and filming a restorative mediation meeting in Year 9.

The Student Representative Council has, for several years, comprised students from Year 12 only. In an effort to address the very real need for a more inclusive student representative body, the SRC in 2012 will include representatives from each year level. This change has resulted from a meeting with a small number of interested students late in Term 2. A more extensive student forum will be held early in 2012 to explore

student leadership opportunities throughout the College and make recommendations for change and further development.

Our parallel program for disengaged boys will come to fruition at the start of 2012 for a small group of Year 10 students. The program will be taught and managed by Mr Adrian Pearce and Mr Grant Sims. Curriculum for the program continues to be developed, with a focus on authentic and practical learning experiences, community involvement and personal development. We hope that through the program the students will become more confident and self-aware, responsible, accountable and ultimately develop a greater motivation to achieve

and succeed at school.

A survey of students from Years 10-12, seeking their feedback regarding how effectively we are meeting their academic and social needs in Senior College, was conducted towards the end of the year. This data will be analysed and used to effect change in our future practice, where necessary and appropriate.

None of this work would happen without the support of our staff who have worked tirelessly throughout the year to provide so many opportunities for the students which extend well beyond the classroom. We look forward to continuing this important pastoral work in 2012.

The College experienced huge success in the drama section of the 2011 Burnie Eisteddfod.

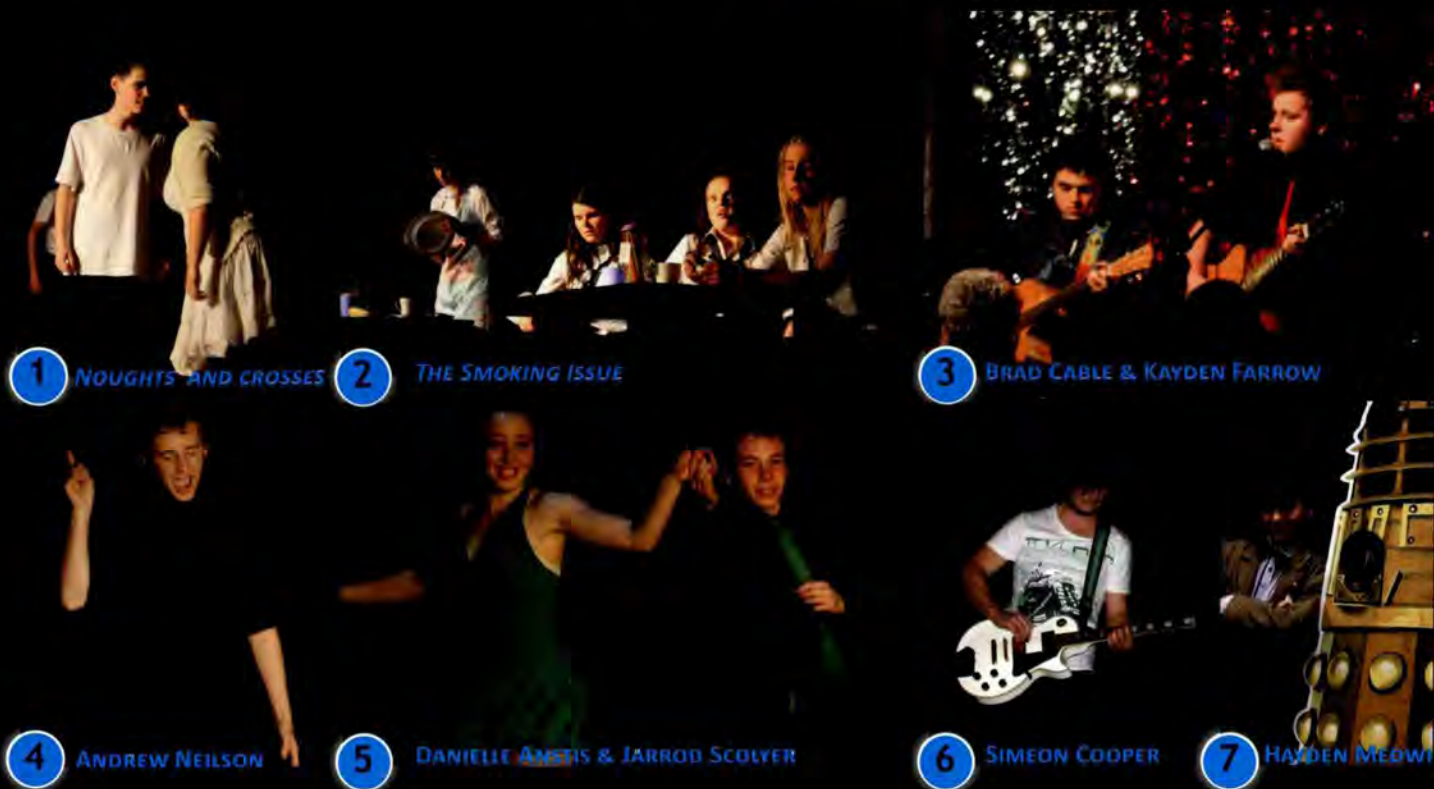
Our actors and performers took to the stage in plays, duologues and monologues, with nearly 20 students taking out first place in various solo and duologue sections.

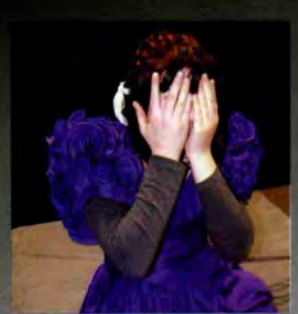
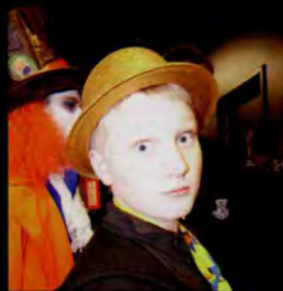
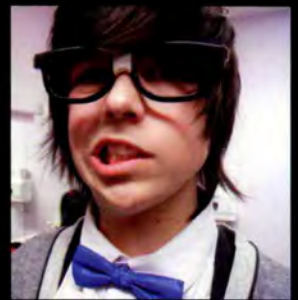

Most of us braved the Giant Drop at Dream World and splashed to our hearts' content in the many rides at White Water World.

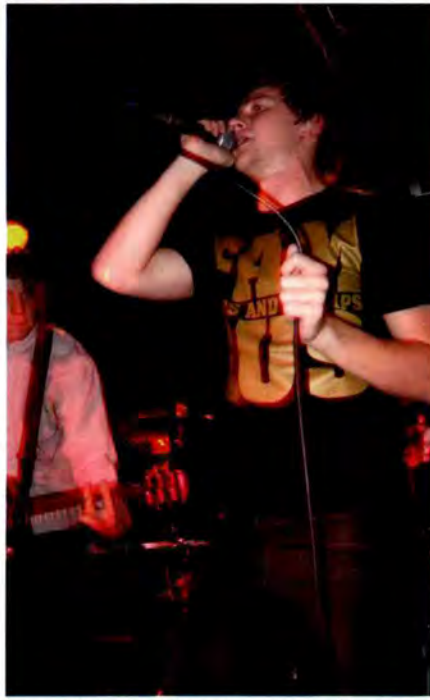

LEARNING & TEACHING REPORT



Our College community strives hard to ensure that our students are provided with a wide range of activities that not only provide opportunities to excel, but also opportunities that inspire them to learn, develop confidence and extend their capabilities. I hope you find this review of learning and teaching at the College for 2011 both informative and inspiring. Scattered throughout the following pages, are examples of the work students have compiled in their endeavours to achieve.

The NAPLAN 2011 results indicate that the College performed extremely well when compared with similar schools, both in Tasmania and more broadly throughout Australia. Our results are 2-9 per cent higher than comparative schools in all categories.

Writing continues to be the key area for focussed attention. Compared to similar schools in Tasmania and Australia, Marist students performed 3-12 per cent higher in all three comparison groups. Overall, the College continues to perform at a consistently high level.

OUTSTANDING SCIENCE ACHIEVERS

LITERACY ENHANCEMENT

This year's Literacy Enhancement and Achievement Program targeted Middle Years students. Two lessons per cycle were dedicated to decoding, reading, comprehension and literacy activities. ICT was integrated into the program to develop information technology literacy skills and to develop students' ability to access online literacy-based activities.

Additional support was provided to students identified from TORC results and to those displaying difficulties. These students were given tuition for one additional period per week. For a number of students, their improvement in reading placed them at age-appropriate levels.

EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Involvement in activities outside of the classroom provides challenging, meaningful and differentiated learning opportunities.

Our teachers nurture and support student involvement in a range of forums, competitions, research projects and community engagement activities. The achievements of our students are testament to the benefits of engagement beyond the classroom.

ANNUAL MATHS RELAY

The competition is a pressure test event, with teams of four students working together to solve 20 maths problems and relay answers to the judges' table in a 45-minute time period. All four Marist teams in the annual competition performed extremely well and were outstanding in the way in which they represented the College. Congratulations to all involved and many thanks to those parents who acted as markers for the competition.

 Lasting maybe only minutes the golden grains will glow

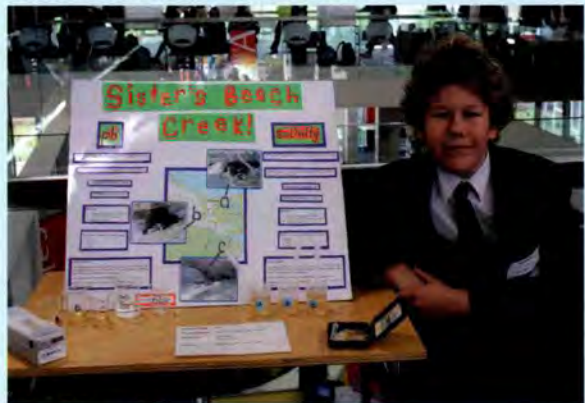

The engagement of a wide range of students in music at the College was highlighted by the involvement of more than 100 competitors in the music section of the Burnie Eisteddfod. Public performance and exhibition are critical to providing authentic and contextualised learning experiences for students. LOTE & CULTURAL ENRICHMENT

The College has an ongoing commitment to developing student engagement with the wider world and our language department endeavours to foster inter-cultural understanding through experiential integrated teaching and learning programs. The development of Asian literacy is an essential element of cross-cultural curriculum perspectives and capabilities.

Immersion language experience underpins exchange activities and enhances language acquisition. A particular highlight for the SOSE & LOTE faculty was our involvement in the Australia-Indonesia BRIDGE Project, fostered by the Asia Education Foundation. This program aims to increase cultural awareness through dialogue and engagement. We hosted two Indonesian teachers from Madrasah Tsanawiyah Negeri Pamulang. Two of our staff will undertake a return exchange in January 2012. Many classes benefited from this cross-cultural experience, which has enabled us to engage students more effectively in understanding our neighbours in the Asia-Pacific region.

A group of 27 Year 10 and 11 students travelled to France for three weeks in September where they had the opportunity to learn more about the country and French culture and use their language skills in authentic contexts. The students were billeted with French families for a portion of the trip, enabling them to gain insight into family life and, hopefully, develop lasting friendships.

VOCATIONAL EDUCATION

The ability of students to undertake both academic and vocational courses is an integral part of the curriculum and the extension of vocational and trade-based courses at the College this year continued to provide flexible opportunities for students. We believe the appointment of a director of VET for 2012 will further drive initiatives and ensure our vocational curriculum continues to expand.

Our 2011 VET program included Certificate I in Construction, Certificate I and II Hospitality (including responsible service of alcohol and barista units), Certificate II in Business and Tourism, Certificate II and III in Community Services (Children's Services) and



Certificate I in Electro-Communications. VET students also undertook training in first aid.

Our first intake of students into Certificate III in Hairdressing included three students who travelled on a weekly basis to St Brendan-Shaw College in Devonport. These students also completed more than 100 hours of on-the-job training with local employers.

Many of our students complete school-based training programs in retail at certificate II level through part-time work or take up apprenticeships. Claire Fairbrother (Certificate III in Business) and Sarah Wilson (Certificate II in Animal Care) both gained apprenticeships through the Australian School-based Apprenticeship scheme.

This year, the College achieved outstanding success in VET subjects at TQA level. Madeline Jago (Children's Services) and Morgan Ralston (Tourism) are to be commended for their high achievements in vocational education and training.

Among the highlights for our vocational students, Jayde Hayes completed a UTAS unit in design and represented the College in the Tasmanian Apex Fashion competition. Our Middle Years Lifestyle, Fashion and Technology students entered their designs in the Home Industries section of the Burnie Show.

Major prizes in the Marist Chef competition went to Oliver Brindley (7S), Kristopher Denby (8J), Harrison Bradley (HSD) and Lewis Kaine (HSR).

Of note was the outstanding work by Jake Dann, Liam Keegan, Ben Spinks, Kevin Atkinson, Brodie Mihocek, Zac Hislop and Jeremy Turner who constructed the new student seating on the grassy knoll outside the Harcombe Centre.

The College will offer an increased range of VET courses in 2012 following successful negotiations with our training partners, investment in new infrastructure and refurbishment of existing buildings.

The major capital works project in the VET area in 2011 was the construction of the Cradle Coast Trade Training Centre. This promises to be a fantastic facility through which we can provide industry-standard training for students in our region with the purpose-built commercial kitchen, bakery, café, training restaurant, reception area and office.

This facility will support a range of VET courses that will be offered to our students and partner organisations. We have added bakery and patisserie courses for Year 9, 10 and Senior College. The development of a new textiles and fashion classroom will assist with developing the profile of applied

technology and textile art.

Students will be able to undertake Certificate II in ElectroComms and the development of a high-end digital creativity suite will enable us to cater for advanced media and graphics courses.

ASSESSMENT & REPORTING

Significant work on assessment and reporting commenced in 2011 as the College worked towards implementing the Australian Curriculum. We have worked closely with the TCEO to achieve a consistent report format across the State. As such, our report format in Term 1 changed to a simplified progress report for Years 7-10. Information about changes to reporting was communicated to parents through the Marist Star.

Also in the area of assessment and reporting we trialled reporting to the Australian Curriculum standards, changed the Subject Selection Handbook format and, for phase 1 subject areas, began developing assessment rubrics supported by professional learning.

EQUITY

A key achievement in the provision of services to support student needs has been the development of our health and wellbeing centre, Dadirri. We also developed community partnerships with employment agencies Ability and Advanced Personnel Management, who provide work placements where students can gain employability skills. The APM program supports some of our students with disabilities to make successful transitions from school to work.

AUSTRALIAN CURRICULUM

A key focus in 2011 has been preparing for the implementation of the Australian Curriculum. All staff attended a whole-school professional learning session about our College vision and the

Australian Curriculum. Teaching staff are familiar with ACARA shape papers and are provided with regular up-dates through network meetings, email, staff and faculty meetings. Parents have been provided with information introducing the Australian Curriculum.

We are tracking our progress using an implementation auditing tool to ensure that we effectively target future professional learning communication strategies and meet implementation timelines and requirements.

At the start of the year faculty heads undertook professional development in timetable concepts, which will support discussion and decisions concerning impending changes required to accommodate the Australian Curriculum.

Staff undertook professional learning to ensure development of consistent approaches to documenting units of work. Staff are aware of how to access curriculum material from Scootle and ACARA.

Teachers planned and trialled phase one subjects. Familiarisation with the general capabilities and cross-curricular priorities contained within the Australian Curriculum was commenced.

Staff identified areas of concern in mathematics and science and additional elective courses were offered to close any gaps during transition. Transitions were mapped in the Subject Selection Handbooks with explanations concerning maths and science for parents and students.

Additional electives to provide Australian Curriculum pathways were

added to subject selections including applied earth science for Year 10 and dance at both TQA level 2 and 3. Additional time will be allocated to English and maths in line with curriculum mandates.

We are developing our pedagogy to provide contemporary learning to our students with a focus on building our e-Learning capacity. An e-Learning coordinator position was established and the coordinator was provided with EPICT training to develop facilitator skills, develop a network and use EPICT to provide structure to support staff professional learning.

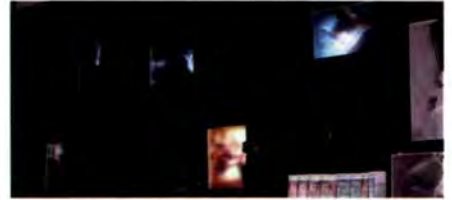
A skills audit will guide support needed to ensure staff have access to ongoing training to deliver integrated ICT in the classroom. Professional learning has been offered via in-house after hours

PD, online tutorials and in-class support. Twilight sessions included workshops in MovieMaker, Sharepoint, Photoshop, blogs, Word, Photostory and Excel. The e-Learning coordinator also developed a number of tutorials, based on screen captures with audio, so teachers could complete them at their own pace.

A survey of learning technology, mapping resources to classrooms, was used to determine timelines and priorities to roll out additional interactive whiteboards, projectors and other technology. There has been continued integration of ClassPAD calculators in Year 10 and Senior College maths classes and a transfer of science units into electronic form.

Frank MacDonald Memorial Prize

The Frank MacDonald Memorial Prize is a competition dedicated to Tasmania's last World War One veteran, Frank MacDonald. Frank MacDonald MM was born in Ulverstone, Tasmania in 1896 and died on 23 August, 2003 at the age of 107. For the past six years, the State Government of Tasmania, in conjunction with the Returned and Services League (RSL) of Tasmania, has sent six Year 9 students, accompanied by two teachers, an RSL representative, a politician and other government representatives on a two-week trip to Turkey, Belgium and France to visit World War One battlefields and sites of significance.

As one of last year's winners of the prize, I had the opportunity to travel to Europe in April and May this year. While overseas, our group visited some of the most renowned battlefields of World War One including the Somme, Ypres Salient and the Gallipoli Peninsula. However, visiting these sites was only one element of our trip. We also attended the Anzac Day service held in Villers Bretonneux at the Australian National Memorial and were treated to cultural delights and tourism icons in Paris, Istanbul and Çanakkale.

Each student who won the prize was required to carry out a personal investigation and research a soldier who had died and was buried in one of the three countries we were to visit. I researched my neighbour's great-uncle, Private Hector Lachlan Hodgetts. Hector Hodgetts was not just a casualty statistic of the Great War; he was a much-loved son and brother. As far as Hector's family know, I am the only person to have visited his grave in the 93 years since his death. It was truly an honour to represent the Hodgetts family.

The Frank MacDonald Memorial Prize was, for me, the opportunity of a lifetime. It was more than just a trip overseas. It was a learning experience, the forging of life-long friendships and something that I will carry with me for the rest of my life. It reinforced the value we must place on ensuring future generations remember and commemorate the sacrifices of our Australian service men and women. Without them we would not enjoy the freedom and lifestyle we have today.

LIBRARY REPORT

As it is every year, 2011 has been an interesting year in the library, with lots of wonderful displays provided by a variety of different subjects, some fun competitions, a number of classes taught, and lots and lots of assistance given and resources borrowed.

Once again we've been extremely popular with Senior College students, and our after school study time has been very well utilised, especially on Thursdays when we offer snacks for those studying at 3.30pm.

A trip to half a dozen publishing warehouses in Melbourne in April meant our book stock was updated with current material, partly to meet the requirements of the new national curriculum, and this has borne fruit with continuing book borrowings. As many of our staff and students are aware, not everything is available on the internet. Even when available, at times it is much easier to use print material.

Another development aimed at promoting books, was the purchase of a specially designed bookcase for the Chanel Centre. Looking like a very large box when shut, this bookcase enabled students in Middle Years to borrow, return or renew reading material without having to do the trek to the main library building.

Our many library displays have included a

fantastic French display by Ms Thornton's Year 8 class for Bastille Day. This display had a full-size guillotine which was a very special highlight. Other subjects displaying their work included some fantastic textiles shows of dresses and other stitched items made by students, great boxes of World War II items from SOSE classes, plus some fantastic picture books. These last were written and designed by Mrs Rogers' Year 9 and 10 Writers' class. The students came to the library for a lesson on the elements of picture books, after which they made their own. These wonderful books were taken by their authors to read to Stella Maris classes, before being displayed in the library. I would like to congratulate all of these students, as I was extremely impressed with the talent and efforts that went into each book. Well done, and keep up the good work.

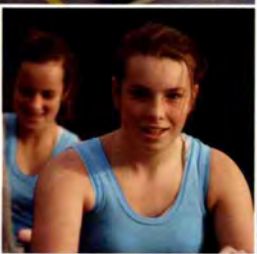

The extensive range of sports undertaken by students at the College could only have been possible with the support of staff, parents, students and volunteers who take on the responsibility for coaching and managing teams. I would like to thank all these people for their time and effort.

The College continued to support both the NSATIS and SATIS carnivals and rosters throughout 2011. A number of individuals and teams achieved to a high standard. Our girls Firsts and Seconds and boys Seconds basketball teams finished the season as state champions.

The College experienced outstanding success at the North West High School Basketball Championships, qualifying for the state finals in all four divisions. The Year 9-10 girls went on to win the state championship.

In local sports rosters, the College won premierships in divisions C2 and C3 of the Burnie Netball Association, senior boys B division of the North West Junior Football Union, senior girls division of the Burnie District Hockey competition and under 14 boys division of the Western Schools Soccer Association.

ROWING

The College made a huge splash at the Head of the River rowing regatta at Lake Barrington at the start of the year, with two students dominating their events and finishing the carnival undefeated.

Grace Djakic and Saraa-Jai Smith made a great start to the carnival taking out the under 13 1000 m double sculls by more than 8 seconds from Collegiate.

Both girls then backed up for the under 13 1000 m single sculls and finished first and second—Grace in a time of 4.46.93 and Saraa-Jai close behind in 4.47.88.

Saraa-Jai turned the tables on Grace a week later at the state carnival, again held at Lake Barrington. Saraa-Jai came second in the under 13 single sculls and Grace third. Our rowers teamed with two other girls to take the state title in the girls under 13 quads.

To cap off a great season representing the Ulverstone Rowing Club and Marist, Saraa-Jai was named the club's best first year rower and Grace the club's best second year rower.

BASKETBALL

The College set high standards in basketball again this year. The girls SATIS Firsts are State Champions, and both the girls and boys SATIS Seconds won their division two competitions. All three teams won the NSATIS titles earlier in the year, earning the right to play the southern colleges for the state titles. Our Girls Senior team took the Division A State Title at the High School Championships, after dominating the North West titles. The Junior Girls and Junior Boys also took out the regional North West high school competition and, on a lighter note, the College retained the Old Scholars Trophy in the annual friendly against St Brendan-Shaw.

SATIS

Our girls Firsts were crowned State Champions with a 57–35 win over Guilford Young College. Ella Fox (15 pts), Lori Douglas (13) and Estelle Margetts (6) played solid games.

The carnival saw a number of excellent performances, with two records being broken on the day and the top six runners in each age group making the College All-Schools Cross Country team.

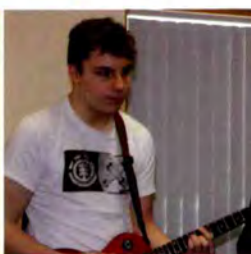
