PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

The 1998 school year began on a successful, if challenging note at the Senior College Conference when Brendan Gale, a noted Australian football player and an ex-student of the school, gave a strongly motivating address and left the Senior College with a challenge which the Student Representative Council took up as its motto. "Be a doer not a knocker." That challenge could be directed at all aspects of college life and has been put before all students by the student leaders on several occasions at school gatherings. I can only endorse that motto and its challenging message. Fortunately, we have had doers and achievers to acknowledge in a wide range of activities.

The ethos of the college and its Christian values have found expression in the work of our St. Vincent de Paul conferences, in the Amnesty International Group and in the ready involvement of students in charitable appeals and doorknocks, such as the doorknocks in support of the Red Cross and Centacare. The school liturgies continued the broad scale of participation that I mentioned last year and for me a highlight of the liturgical year for the school was the Mass celebrated by our Tasmanian born Archbishop, Adrian Doyle, during second term. The whole-hearted participation of all members of the school community in that liturgy was very pleasing.

There have been some fine achievements in the field of study. In the first weeks of the year we rejoiced with and congratulated Rebecca Dean of Year 12, 1997 on her tertiary entrance score of the magic 100. The good news in the academic field has continued during the year with fine results in subject competitions. These have been capped by the achievement of Nicholas Beeton of Year 8 who received the only medal awarded to a Tasmanian in the Australian Mathematics Competition. He received that medal from the Governor of South Australia in early November.

As usual, the major cultural production of the year, "Artium Spectaculum" was a great success with many students exhibiting fine talents and admirable stagecraft in a highly entertaining production.


We had doers on the sports fields as well. We had individual champions in swimming and athletics at the Northern Tasmanian Independent Schools Carnival and at the State Championship Carnival. In team sports our senior girls, once

again, won the Northern Premiership in Netball and several of the teams from the junior part of the school competed in local netball grand finals and one of them did go on to win the Premiership. This year the football teams also got into the act, with both the Year 10 and Year 7 teams winning their respective Grand Finals.

Not only the winners were the "doers" that Brendan spoke of. Those who entered subject, artistic and sporting competitions and extended themselves to achieve results commensurate with their respective abilities far outnumbered the winners and they are the stuff of which this school's accomplishments are made.

I would like to make special acknowledgement of students who represented the school in the Northern Sports Association of Tasmanian Independent Schools (NSATIS) competitions, who gave up many Saturdays to represent the school in cricket, softball, tennis, hockey, soccer, football and netball. It has been a big commitment for them and their team managers and coaches. For those who struggled to win any matches it demanded just as much determination as for the winners. Thank you one and all. You were "doers" in a very obvious way.

All in all, it is fair to say that we have had a good number of doers in 1998. One of the 1998 captains in her final address to the school urged all to remember the motto and make it even more of a reality in 1999. I can only echo and support her challenge.



BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

During August it was confirmed that the College had been successful with its application for recategorisation from Category 9 to Category 10. This is an increase in recurrent funding of \$140,000 each year. It is the result of an enormous amount of activity and persistence, meeting with politicians and public servants in Burnie, meeting a Commonwealth Minister in Hobart, and a visit to Canberra to meet a group from the Department of Education Employment Training and Youth Affairs (DEETYA).

The College prepared two submissions to be presented to the Non Government Schools Funding Review Committee. For several years the Principal, Fr. Ryder, has given a tremendous amount of time to prepare our submissions and has written a great many letters to politicians and DEETYA and this marvellous result is truly an achievement with which the College Board is very pleased and we acknowledge Father Ryder's efforts in this matter as outstanding.

The increased funding allows us to feel more comfortable about our significant debt that has been steadily increasing as a result of the many major capital projects the Board has undertaken during the past few years. We have always recognised our responsibility to improve and update the facilities that we believe are necessary to provide the pupils and staff with buildings, equipment and facilities of an acceptable standard.

It is worth stating that approximately \$2,000,000 has been spent during the past few years. Recently we relocated and consequently improved the Photography Room, and we spent \$160,000 in providing new computers and computer networking within the College with internet facilities.

The Art Department may be the next major undertaking. The Art Department is in need of improvement and our additional Category 10 funding will allow us to give serious consideration of this as our next project.

The Catholic Education Commission and the Catholic Education Office are constantly working to achieve increased Government funding and the improvement of some essential services. During this year a number of promises have been made by Government which should give us some financial and administrative benefits in the near future. These and other issues were discussed at regional meetings during the year. One of these meetings was held in Burnie and was well attended by Coastal people and useful information was made available.

One significant benefit is in the area of Information Technology. It is expected that the State Government will provide the Catholic schooling sector with approximately \$950,000 during 1999 for the advancement of Information Technology initiatives in schools and Marist Regional College will be receiving a share of this. The amount is yet to be confirmed but we are very confident that it will eventuate.

Board members this year are Peter Blesson, John Bloomfield (Chairman), Sr. Beth Calthorpe, David Dwyer, Father Robert Hollow, Father William Ryder, Kathleen Siggins, Mark Summers and Michael Willis. We have met regularly and I am grateful for the commitment and dedication of the members and for the time that they have made available for College business. Our Board has been involved with regular maintenance on the buildings and it is currently considering the need to implement a strategic plan that will look into our changing educational requirement for the next few years.

We acknowledge the continued diligence and efficiency of the staff and the co-operation and loyalty they have given the College and our Principal during the year. The Parents and Friends' Association are a very hard working group who provide essential fundraising for us and the social functions they arrange bring many of our parents together to enjoy each other's company.

The SRC has enjoyed a high level of success in serving the student body and school community for 1998. Following the amendment introduced by the previous SRC in relation to the SRC election, our council was elected late last year. This was particularly beneficial enabling the time over the summer time period for us to grasp the realities and responsibilities associated with such a position of leadership. The members were elected from an array of different social and cultural environments which has provided the capacity for an equilibrium balance.

The members of the council felt that there was a clear need for change in community spirit and attitude. Rather than focus on material goals, we wanted to experiment with a change of direction emphasising the importance of positive attitudes among our student body. To address this concern and affirm our stance in relation to this issue, we conducted a campaign known as 'Be a doer not a knocker' utilising on stage performances and the introduction of an official school chant, aiming at lifting morale problems.

In ensuring the continuum of a pro-active and innovative council, we initiated several activities for the student body and witnessed them come to fruition. Our major fundraiser was conducted in conjunction with the annual feast day. Despite the inclement weather, the day was a huge success and not even the weather dampened the spirits of all participants. Activities on the day included a walkathon, College Mass, sausage sizzle and many other enjoyable activities. The day was enjoyed by all and was a memorable experience. Other innovations included a Playstation Challenge, Year 7 lunch barbecue and games period, SC Thinktank, music played through the public address system at Friday lunchtimes and a Year 7 mentoring program to name but a few.

Prior to the commencement of council inductions and proceedings, we enjoyed a SRC leadership camp at the seaside retreat, the Waterfront Wynyard Motor Inn. This was a great start to the year creating a strong foundation for friendships and unity among our members. We would like to thank Mr Grant Sims for his tireless contribution as Teacher Liaison, and staff and fellow students who have all assisted in the success of 1998. Well done Sarah !

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


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ST VINCENT DE PAUL SOCIETY

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
YEAR 8



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

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RELIGIOUS EDUCATION REPORT

The year began in fine style for the teachers at Marist as they gathered in Hobart for their first day of work at the *Teachers in Catholic Schools Conference*. Over 800 Tasmanian teachers heard the excellent keynote addresses of Bishop David Konstant of Leeds, Gabrielle Carey and Robert Fitzgerald, and attended numerous workshops. The liturgies and final Eucharist were very special as expressions of faith and of our shared vision for the education of young people. The Conference went a long way to achieving its aims of renewing and restoring the understanding of the nature and purposes of Catholic schooling and fostering commitment. A seedling was brought back from the Conference and has been planted in the school grounds to symbolise the continuing growth of and commitment to Catholic education.

A highlight for the year was the visit of Archbishop Adrian Doyle who presided over the College Mass in August. Students and staff worked together to prepare for the Mass to ensure a reverent and participative liturgy. A feature was the communion reflection *Dona Nobis Pacem* sung by the choir and led by Mrs. Price. Archbishop Doyle spoke in his homily about his visits to Burnie as a child when the land, now occupied by the College, consisted of paddocks. He spoke of the foresight of those who bought the land and struggled to develop the facilities and provide Catholic secondary education for the young people of Burnie, the far North West and West coast. We were reminded that we are a part of that history and bear responsibility to continue to spread the good news of the Gospel.

The Renewal program, under the very capable guidance of Sister Marlene Binns, continued this year with some minor variations. Year 12 met as a year group at Camp Clayton for a day/evening session. This enabled time for more group work, activities, prayer and meditation, and judging by the student evaluation held afterwards, it was an enjoyable and valuable experience. Father Robert Hollow, Parish Priest of Burnie joined Sr. Marlene as co-facilitator and their efforts were much appreciated.

Vocations Week took on a new flavour this year as a number of local parishioners joined the Sisters of Mercy and the Marist Fathers in talking to class groups about their experiences of being Christian in today's world. Valuable for the students was the recognition that Christians at different times in their lives experience doubt and failure as well as great solace in their faith.

Six Year 10 students attended a statewide camp organised by the Catholic Youth Commission at Camp Clayton. This was an opportunity for students to share their faith with other Christians and get to know students from other Catholic schools. The students came back to school full of enthusiasm and desire to attend the inaugural camp for Year 11s to be held in 1999. Each Year 9 student was involved in community service through the school's visitation program. Umina Park, Yaraandoo, Arthur Special School and Stella Maris School kindly allowed students to visit throughout the year.

Various liturgies were organised by year level groups and featured a growing input by the students. As religious education teachers it has been exciting to share in the students' expressions of spirituality and their celebration of the presence of God in their lives.



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




YEAR 9

"I have learned many skills which will hopefully help me in the future," Blake said. Blake is hoping in the future he will be able to open up his own sail-making business using some of the skills learned while on work experience.



MOCK INTERVIEWS

All 121 students in Grade 10 participated in the Mock Interview Day towards the end of first term. The enthusiasm and confidence in which the students faced this challenge was commendable. Seventy two business people gave of their valuable time to interview the students as potential employees. Coming from the business sector along the North West Coast the employers participated on 25 panels of two or three, each dealing with a specific area of employment such as hospitality and tourism. The girls were presented with cheques and Fr Ryder was presented with library books at a College Assembly in April by Mr Mark Wilson of the Maritime College.


THE ROYAL AUSTRALIAN CHEMICAL INSTITUTE TITRATION COMPETITION

SCIENCE COMPETITION

Top students from Marist Regional College have shown they have the answers and a bright future, following their success in the world's largest Science Competition. Selena Dixon, Robert Guest, Thomas McLean (Year 7), Nicholas Beeton, Lachlan Newport (Year 8), Jason Vandenberg (Year 10) all received a High Distinction Award in the Australian Schools Science Competition organised by the Educational Testing Centre at the University of New South Wales. This year a record 507,000 students participated in the competition which is held annually throughout Australia, New Zealand and the Asia-Pacific region. This was 63,000 more than the 1997 entry. "Science is ultimately about real life. The competition presents students with the challenge of solving real-life problems, thus enhancing their understanding of the science they have learned in the classroom". said Associate Professor Tim Tognolini, Director Educational Testing Centre, University of New South Wales.

EUREKA SCHOOLS PRIZE FOR BIOLOGICAL SCIENCE

A group of Grade 10 students achieved considerable success in the 1998 University of Sydney 'Eureka Schools Prize for Biological Science'. They were highly commended for their entry entitled "A Habitat Assessment and Proposed Recovery Plan for the Burnie Burrowing Crayfish (*Engaeus Yabbimunna*) of Shorewell Creek" and will receive one of four prizes awarded in this national competition. The prize was designed to encourage awareness in the biological sciences in secondary schools by rewarding excellence in an investigation in Biology. A requirement was that entries be submitted via a webpage on the internet. Under the supervision of Mrs Rosemary Holness and Ms Ann Burke the Marist students spent several months mapping the location of crayfish colonies and vegetation types along Shorewell Creek in Burnie. They also evaluated the water quality by carrying out chemical and biological tests at sample locations. As a result of the research several threats to the survival of the crayfish were identified including habitat destruction, clearance of native vegetation and decreased water quality.



Project findings have been distributed to the Tasmanian National Parks and Wildlife, Waterwatch Tasmania and the Burnie City Council and will be used to improve survival chances of the crayfish. Students involved were Jonathan Duniam, Anna Capern, James Davis, Adam Gillett, Michael Pullinger, Joshua Parry, Lyle Crawford and Gemma Hine. 


BASS HOUSE REPORT

MATHEMATICS COMPETITIONS

Marist entered 307 students in the Australian Mathematics Competition. Of those who entered, Nicholas Beeton (Year 8) achieved an outstanding result and was awarded a medal. Of the 522,000 students from 32 countries who entered this year's competition only 50 medals were awarded. Nicholas was presented with his medal in Adelaide. Thomas McLean (Year 7) also performed at a very high level and was awarded a prize. High distinctions went to John Ribbon (Year 7) and James Vandenberg and James Davis (Year 10). Other results included 45 Distinctions and 119 Credits.

Four Marist students were among the best in the State in the Tasmanian Mathematics competition held in May. In the Junior Section for Years 7 and 8 first prize went to Nicholas Beeton (Year 8), equal third prize went to Ryan Oswin (Year 7) and an outstanding award went to Hayden Moore (8D).

Twelve students represented the College in the Annual Mathematics Association of Tasmania Mathematics Relay competition. Teams from all over the State competed against each other in three centres Hobart, Launceston and Burnie. A phone link enabled the teams from the three areas to compete. All three teams performed creditably and an interesting and challenging time was had by all.
