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PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

This year has been marked by the level of involvement of members of the College community in the education of our students. The tremendous support given by teachers, parents, students and friends to the Open Night, Subject Advice Night, Musical, Art Exhibition and Volunteer Appreciation night indicates the extent of the commitment by so many.

Over the last few years, the Marist Fathers and Mercy Sisters have engaged in the process of handing over management of the College to lay Christians. Their legacy is a culture of service, self-giving, compassion, generosity of spirit and forgiveness. We share with them a commitment to God's work, to see education as life giving and a path to freedom, that is, a freedom to serve, commit to others and live the fullness of life. They helped create and we carry on a culture of faith in which Christian values are encouraged in the Catholic tradition.

With the resignation of Father Patrick Kervin and the appointment of a lay principal we move into a new era with the continued support of the religious orders through staff and Governing Council representation. The challenge is to keep to the forefront of our minds the essential purpose of Catholic education in the Marist Regional College tradition, education which is about engaging fully in life and all it has to offer.

Looking back on the year, there have been many highlights. One that particularly comes to mind was the weekend when, in the process of visiting sporting venues, the Musical rehearsal at the Civic Centre and attending the College Ball, I saw over four hundred of our students involved in the extra curricular life of the College. I was struck by how fortunate our students are to have teachers, parents and friends who give generously of their time and expertise, and who are willing to build relationship outside the classroom.

The Feast Day celebrated on the Feast of the Assumption commenced with a College Mass the theme of which was thanksgiving for the gift of Catholic education. Mass was followed by a barbecue arranged by the Student Representative Council. After feeding seven hundred people, the SRC conducted an afternoon of round robin fun activities. Not content to rest on their laurels, that evening the SRC followed up with a very well patronised social. Their contributions on that

day and throughout the year are to be commended.

Accepting responsibility for those less fortunate, different groups engaged in fundraising activities. Recently, the St. Vincent de Paul conference sponsored Operation Christmas Child, which, within a fortnight, resulted in over fifty gift filled boxes. It was a wonderfully generous response.

Academic highlights have been the number of students who have achieved distinctions and high distinctions in Maths, Science, Chemistry and English competitions. In particular, Nick Beeton, over the last six years, achieved outstanding results in Tasmanian and Australian mathematics competitions culminating in second place for the M L Urquart prize for the most mathematically gifted student in Tasmania. Two teams reached the national titration finals and many prizes were won in the Tasmanian Science talent search.

Blessed with fine weather for both swimming and athletics carnivals, good spirit and participation were evident. In contrast, the cross country was postponed because of stormy conditions only to be held later on one of the coldest days of winter when participation was down. The contrast was the determination shown by the NSATIS team which achieved third place in the aggregate shield at the NSATIS cross-country carnival.

The winter sports finals were an exciting time for the many students who competed in finals for football, netball and hockey. The crowd of over a thousand people witnessing the Junior A and Senior A football finals at Penguin was a highlight. The atmosphere was tremendous and the footballers lived up to expectation.

Ultimately, the measure of success of our Christian community is not about prizes and awards but is about how well we enable each student to learn and develop into a person of self worth, who has the freedom to serve others and make a valuable contribution to society. That is our challenge.

BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT FOR MARIST REGIONAL COLLEGE INC

As I opened my report last year, I report that a new era for Marist Regional College commenced this year, as in 2001. Mrs. Sue Chen commenced as Principal to the College during the year, the first lay person to have that position. This milestone in the College's history is a reflection of the changes taking place in our catholic community. As part of her role as Principal, Mrs Chen was also warmly welcomed to the associated position on the Board of Management.

The Annual Meeting of Marist Regional College Incorporated was held in March 2002. At this meeting the Board re-elected David Dwyer as Chairman, with Mrs. Kathy Cameron elected Deputy Chairman. The other Members of the Board for 2002 are Mrs. Sue Chen, Fr. Robert Hollow, Mrs. Billie Hicks, Mrs. Suzanne Harris, Mrs. Clare Kiely-Hoye, and new members Mr. Colin Mackenzie, Mr. Paul Smith, Mr. John Neilson and Fr. Paul Pearce (representing the Marist Fathers).

Auditor, Mr Jeff Knott of Cassidy Partners led up the team which audited the College accounts and he reported that the management was carried out in an efficient and proper manner. The audited accounts for the year ended 31st December 2001 were accepted and approved at the Annual Meeting.

A major activity of the Board in 2002 has been the activity of its Future Planning sub-Committee. This work is a key in following the Charter of the Board. In the constitution the following directions have been articulated in its Charter:

The College Board shall be directly responsible to the Governing Council.

Within the context of providing high quality Catholic education and promoting the Catholic life of the school the Board's functions shall include:

1. Promoting Catholic secondary education in the Burnie region, in accordance with the doctrines, laws and educational ethos of the Catholic Church and the directions of the Archbishop, and for that purpose to take action in conjunction with the Tasmanian Education Commission, the Catholic Education Office, and institutes of education within the region.
2. Within the broad parameters established by the Governing Council, formulating policy for the conduct of the College, in consultation with the staff, parents, students and friends of the College.
3. Co-operating with the Principal in maintaining the College as an institute of Catholic education.
4. Taking direction from the Governing Council on matters regarded to major changes.
5. Liaising with the Parish Priests and Parish Pastoral Councils of the Region in matters of mutual concern to the College and parishes.
6. Planning, implementing, and evaluating the financial and building programmes necessary for the recurrent and long-term effective management of the College.
7. Managing the finances of the College.

The charter of the Board is therefore very pastoral in focus. There are frequent opportunities for members of the Catholic community to respond to this call. As I retire from the Board I encourage community members to come forward to volunteer for Board membership opportunities and assist in ensuring the continued success of Marist Regional College.

WORLD YOUTH DAY 2002

TORONTO, CANADA

What is World Youth Day? If you asked the people who went to World Youth Day this year one might be given a number of different answers. On July 14th, Keely Spurr, David Roberts-Thomson, Rachel Maguire, Belinda Maguire and I joined 30 other young people from Tasmania who took the opportunity to discover what World Youth Day is.

After a 20-hour flight we arrived in Vancouver for the first stage of our journey in discovering who we are as individuals. In Vancouver we joined the remainder of our alliance, comprising young people from South Australia and the Northern Territory. Our pilgrimage totalled 136.

From Vancouver, we hopped on another plane and flew to Calgary. After a short tour of Calgary, we headed to Banff. Whilst in Banff, we had the privilege of spending 3 days sightseeing in the Banff National Park. Our exploration enabled us to visit Lake Moraine, Lake Louise and the Athabasca Glacier located at the Columbia Icefield.

At the completion of our days in Banff, we were challenged to identify where we had seen the face of God. For me it was in the creation and beauty that I had seen in the surroundings that I was exposed to. Each day in Banff, we also had the opportunity to attend mass in the natural surroundings of the different locations we were in.

From Banff, we headed to Quebec City where we spent 1 week in home stays. Apart from the lack of sleep that we had to date, we came across one more challenge whilst in Quebec: a different culture and language. The main language spoken in Quebec is French.

Whilst in Quebec City we had the opportunity to visit a number of Basilicas and also the Cathedral. We went to St-Anne-de-Beaupre Basilica where we celebrated Mass. Then we had a tour of the Cathedral, the Ursuline Sisters Chapel and then Our Lady of Victories Basilica.

On our last day in Quebec City we proceeded to Cartier Bre'beuf Park for a Diocesan celebration and gathering of all those pilgrims who had spent the week in Quebec City. In all there were approximately 30, 000 people present at the celebration. This was a time to meet other pilgrims who were heading to Toronto for World Youth Day.

Our week in Quebec City allowed us to see the face of God again. This time, however, it was the faces of our host families and the people we met in Quebec City. We were privileged meeting the people in Quebec City and had another wonderful experience.

Two moments will always stay with me from Quebec City. Firstly, when we arrived in Quebec City we were all very tired and emotionally drained. On arrival at our host Parish, the energy and alertness on everyone's face was just tremendous. Secondly, on our final day in Quebec City we had the opportunity to speak to some of the youth leaders. At this meeting we talked about our experience in Quebec City and what it meant for us. We were also able to share some of our hopes for the future of youth in the Church. When it came to Fr. Jean (one of the organisers of our experience in Quebec City) to share his hopes, he was so overwhelmed that he started crying. To have invested so much in this experience and then to hear how appreciative we were was so emotional for him.

From Quebec City we headed for our final destination - Toronto. This is where the main celebrations for World Youth Day were to be held. With such an enriching experience already Toronto had a lot to live up to.

Whilst in Toronto we spent most of our time at Exhibition Place, which is where the majority of events for World Youth Day were. Our first appointment at Exhibition Place was a celebration of all Australians attending World Youth Day. At this gathering there were some 1300 Australians. During this time we heard of all of the pilgrimages that the other diocesans had been involved in before arriving in Toronto. Some went to Mexico, Quebec City and others spent time in Europe.


During our week in Toronto we attended catechesis, masses and celebrations of youth. It was a time to meet other young people from around the world and celebrate being Catholic in this world. We also had the opportunity to visit the Royal Ontario Museum to view an exhibition of Vatican artwork entitled "Images of Salvation".


Our last 2 days in Toronto were spent at Downsview Park. This is where we celebrated a vigil (on Saturday evening) and mass (on Sunday morning) with Pope John Paul II. The day started with a procession to Downsview Park from our accommodation in 35°C weather (approximately 9km). Once at Downsview Park we found a place where we could spend the night with 800,000 other young people. The Pope arrived around 7pm when we spent 3 hours in celebration and prayer. After the celebration at Downsview Park we spent the night meeting other young people from around the world.

Sunday began overcast and threatening rain. Eventually at 6am the heavens opened and it rained for the next 3 hours. Standing in mud and dripping wet we celebrated mass with the Pope. In trying conditions the 800,000 people present all celebrated and rejoiced with the Pope.

World Youth Day for me was a chance to learn more about my faith and celebrating being Catholic with other young people from around the world.







JAPANESE



In the May/June holidays 16 students and 2 staff travelled to Japan for 20 days of immersion into Japanese language, culture and lifestyle. Tokyo was frantic - we packed in a lot of sightseeing including Asakusa Temple, Imperial Palace, Tokyo Tower, Akihabara (the best discount electrical town) Ginza, (the most expensive land in Japan) and of course, the highlight for many students, a day at Tokyo Disneyland. We also met up with Miwa Suzuki our language assistant from 2000. Then it was into the central highlands for some slightly cooler weather and glorious mountain scenery. We stayed in Matsumoto, a hot spring mountain resort town. The best adventure here was hiring bikes and cycling to Asama Onsen and indulging in a traditional hot springs bath.

By this stage a great camaraderie had developed and we all felt rather nervous about the prospect of the next 10 days with host families and a week at Seibo Jogakuin. Seibo is a Catholic girl's school of 1000 students, situated in Kyoto, one of the ancient capitals of Japan. Our students were taken aback by their pop star like popularity and we were often mobbed in and outside classrooms! We participated in P.E. English, Music, Home Economics and Calligraphy classes. We spent 2 afternoons with the English Speaking Club. The change in climate (from our late autumn to Japan's hot and sticky summer) took its toll this week combined with the change of lifestyle (up early and to bed late and very busy days) and the stress of home stay. Listening and speaking are the two most difficult skills in any language learning and in home stay situations these were the skills students had to use every waking moment. Marist students had a variety of home stay experiences - some in modern homes, others sleeping in futon on tatami mats, one in a Buddhist temple. The food was without a doubt a highlight of our stay. Host families ensured we all sampled the best of Japanese cuisine and we all enjoyed comparing our obento at lunch times.

We also had a day visiting Nara with Fr John Walsh. Highlights of this day were visiting Todaiji, the world's oldest wooden structure. in its 1250th birthday year, and the Okonomiyaki Restaurant where we cooked our own 'pancakes'. Our last day at school began with the Founder's Day Mass. Marist students then toured some of the 'must see' spots in Kyoto in 2 minibuses. We are grateful for Fr Kervin's support in providing the buses as they were comfy, cool and very convenient. We visited Kinkakuji, Ryoanji, both National Treasures, and Kiyomizudera. The Kyoto Handicraft Centre provided us with an opportunity to look at craftsmen working, view all manner of traditional craftware and also to purchase gifts for friends and family.

The hosting and school experiences were overwhelmingly positive and life long friends made. After tearful farewells at Kyoto station we headed south to Hiroshima to an interesting experience at a traditional Japanese Inn. Here we sampled traditional bathing and sleeping. CHRIS GARWOOD (Year 12) was one of only 11 Tasmanian students selected by Rotary Tasmania in association with the University of Canberra and the Australian National University for the National Youth Science Forum in Canberra in January. Upon his return Chris was positively glowing about the program and has provided us with this report.

The Forum was a two week programme where I mixed with 143 other students passionate about science from Australia, New Zealand, Canada, and South Africa. We experienced, participated and contributed in a diverse range of science activities as well as activities aimed at personal development. Over the two weeks I visited numerous science laboratories throughout University of Canberra, ANU, CSIRO and ADFA, met leading scientists in the fields of astronomy, astrophysics, nuclear physics and physical sciences. Other activities included Mt Stromlo Observatory, formal science and Rotary dinners, swimming, bush dances, public speaking, debates, science forums, sports concerts, socials and also the opportunity to gain skills in helping get through University and Year 12. The NYSF was most definitely the most influential, amazing experience in my life. Year 12 students Andrew Gauld and Christopher Garwood have recently joined a co-operative, international volunteer student project measuring variation in density of the earth's upper atmosphere during solar storms.

The project, entitled "Project Starshine 4" is co-ordinated by NASA at Monument, Colorado, USA. The way atmospheric density is determined is by measuring the orbital decay rates of a series of mirror covered optically reflective satellites.

The task for Andrew and Chris was to grind and polish a series of mirrors for Starshine 4. NASA will launch Starshine 4 from a space shuttle in January, 2003. It will stay in orbit for 8 months before being dragged down into the atmosphere's denser regions and burning up. Starshine 4 contains 1000 mirrors polished from the students all around the world and selected on the basis of reflective quality. After the satellite has been launched students can help measure its orbit by observing sunlight flashes from its mirrors as it passes across the starry sky before sunrise and after sunset. The polishing overseen by Ms Burke in the chemistry lab was a very precise job as the aluminium mirrors could easily be scratched and to be selected they needed to have a beautiful reflective finish. Well done to Andrew and Chris for achieving this finish. 


ST VINCENT DE PAUL

Our challenge, parents and staff, in educating the young in spiritual matters is huge but it all comes down to the question of whether we present a set of credible spiritual answers to their questions and live in accordance to our Christian beliefs. Or do we just give it lip service and continue to act like mainstream society.

ATHLETICS

Perfect conditions ensured extremely high participation at the Marist Regional College Athletics Carnival. Every student participated and is to be congratulated on the effort they put in. Intense rivalry in all age groups led to the setting of eleven new records. Seven of these were set on the track which was even more impressive seeing as the old records were set on the synthetic surface at Penguin as far back as 14 years ago.

Samantha Lawrence and Tyson Weller were stand out competitors in the U/13 age groups with Samantha setting records in the 400, 800, 1500 and 3km events. Tyson, who was absent on the second day representing Tasmania, competed on the first day and set a record in the U/13 400m and added 12cm to the U/13 high jump record to raise the bar to 160cm. Other track records were set by Emma Clayton in the U/14 400m and Esther Harris in the U/16 400m.

The field competitors also excelled in the still conditions. Courtney Brunetti broke a 22 year old record in the U/15 girls' discus. Heamasi Akauola also broke the existing discus record in the U/13 boys and Tom Hislop set a new record previously held for 20 years in the U/14 boys javelin. Along with these achievements there were many outstanding performances across all age groups with many personal best times, jumps and throws being posted. (On the subject of records, our announcer for the carnival also set a record with 10 hamburgers, 4 savaloyes and 2 packets of biscuits being consumed over the two-day carnival).

House spirit during the carnival was excellent and large competitor numbers meant that the battle for overall house supremacy was fierce. After many changes in the lead the eventual house shield went to **BASS** with 5409 points. They were followed by Cook 4918, Tasman 4684 and Flinders 4601.






RESOURCE CENTRE

To promote some of the great books bought by the library throughout the year, as well as the various events held by library staff, we have produced *The Liber Wyrms* once a month. This is attached to the *Marist News* so that everyone involved with Marist Regional College can be aware of what is happening within the library. In *The Liber Wyrms* we have been interviewing one MRC staff member per month to learn a little more about them. So far we have 'met' Mr Sims, Mrs Dean, Mr Dobbie, Mrs Neilson, Mr Eade, and Mr Horniblow, and are looking forward to interviewing many more in the years ahead. We also use the Library intranet pages at <http://library.mrc.tas.edu.au/> to promote upcoming events and special happenings within the library. In 2003, the look of the library intranet will be quite different, as our catalogue will be online and available via the school intranet pages, so check back then to see how things have changed.

As has been said before, 2002 has been a very full and exciting year with lots of events happening throughout the year, and we look forward to another excellent and interesting time in 2003.
