If there is one constant in education it is the pressure for "change". The pressure comes from State and Federal Governments, educational theorists, the changing world we live in, teachers and young people themselves. It means we work in an environment that requires us to critique but be open to the possibilities, to be observant and adaptive to the learning needs of our young people. There is the danger, however, of running with the latest pet theory and change for change's sake, but there are also wonderful possibilities in change that can enhance the learning of our young people and enable them to become the "valued and contributing members of our ever changing society", described in the College Mission statement.

Within this culture of change there is a fundamental constant. That constant is the aim of the Catholic school to form young people whose physical, intellectual and moral talents are developed harmoniously. In other words, the challenge at MRC is the formation of the whole person and to enable our young people to grow into responsible adults with integrity, ready to take an active part in a rapidly changing world.

This year we are pleased to have established a Year 10 REMAR group in the College who meet to pray, learn about the Marist and Mercy stories, socialise and meet with other Marist schools. We hope to extend the program with groups in both Years 10 and 11 next year.

Our Student Representative Council has shown excellent leadership with each of the five committees; Special Character, Community, Culture, Academic and Sport, making significant contributions. The Special Character Committee has led by example through their preparation and ownership of liturgy that is relevant, interesting and challenging. We have just appointed a Director of Mission, Mr Ian Margetts, whose responsibility it will be to nurture the spirituality of both staff and students and promote the charisms of the College so that the Catholic mission of this College is kept in the forefront of our minds. To assist in attaining this objective we have also appointed a separate Curriculum Head of Religious Education and a teacher with youth ministry responsibilities.

Holistic education includes development of the physical health of our students. The opening of the Harcombe Centre at the beginning of the year provided a huge morale boost for our community and has given our students state of the art facilities after nearly 50 years of doing without. It would be nice to think that our success as the Tasmanian Independent Schools Netball Champions and State Basketball Champions in two divisions this year has been assisted by the provision of these facilities. Time will tell if this trend continues.

A great boost for the performing arts has been the refurbishment of the old Assembly Hall into a performing arts facility, named Conway Hall. I look forward to watching wonderful productions in first rate facilities.

My gratitude goes to the staff of MRC. This team of 60 teachers and 31 general staff have worked hard to make sure the young people in our care are given a first class education.

Thank you also to the many volunteers who support the College, not least of all, members of the College Board and Governing Council. Mr Colin McKenzie and Mr Paul Smith have made outstanding contributions and will be missed after six years of service on the Board. Thank you also to Mrs Kathleen Siggins who has retired from the Governing Council. Her knowledge of Catholic education and empathy for young people has been much appreciated.

What is it that makes our school Catholic? At one level it is the religious education lessons we teach, at another it is the prayer and liturgy we all participate in, but the X factor is in the way that we treat each other, reflective of the way that Jesus Christ treated the people he met in his life and the sacrifices he made because of his deep and abiding love of God, his Father. Those gospel values are evident in the work of our founders, the Marist and Mercy orders, and reflected in our College values of hospitality, respect, justice, compassion and responsibility. It is in living these values that our community will develop its spirit and spirituality.

Board of Management



I am pleased to report on the activities of the Marist Regional College Board for 2007. The Board was delighted with the reappointment of Susan Chen as Principal for a further term.

Membership

This year Mr Robert Rimmelzwaan resigned from the Board and his vacancy was filled by Mr Barry Britton, who has had experience on the Board of St Brigid's, Wynyard. Mrs Tess McDonagh accepted the position vacated by Mrs Suzanne Harris, joining Colin McKenzie, Susan Chen, Paul Smith, Margaret McKenzie, Sandra Harvey, Gary Dazeley, Fr Pius Jones, Fr Bernie McFadyen and Kevin Young on the Board. Gary Dazeley and I have been requested to stand for second terms. The Board members were joined in meetings by Les Allen and Richard Lakeland.

Regrettably, both Colin McKenzie and Paul Smith's terms have come to an end, each having served six years on the Board. Both have been terrific servants of the College and will be sorely missed.

This year has seen the Marist Board working on a diverse range of issues:

Master Plan

This year has seen the settling in of the Harcombe Centre and work on the redevelopment of the assembly hall into two classrooms and a Performing Arts space known as Conway Hall. This facility is now complete and the College is now waiting on the lift installation which will give much needed access to the upper levels of the western wing.

Architects and the Board are currently reviewing the College's Master Plan to help us identify prioritise and cost development of the College for the future learning needs of students. We see significant issues with the age and design of some of our classroom areas and increasing enrolments continue to place pressure on availability of rooms.

Staff office space in the main staff room and a redevelopment of the old drama studio are priorities for 2008.

Finance

With some of the costs associated with the Conway Hall contract still to be finalised, close cooperation of the Board and the Business Manager has seen the College produce another good budgetary result for 2007.

The Budget has been prepared for 2008 with the new Federal remote funding allowing a balanced budget totalling \$8.85 million. Fee increases have been kept to approximately 2.5%. The total size of the budget is largely as a result of increasing enrolments which will see the College pass the 800 enrolment mark for the first time since 1993.

Other Matters

The roof safety system identified in last year's report as a safety measure was completed early this year and we have obtained a quote for a safety fence on the school exit road.

The Board has worked with the Business Manager and the Executive Officer of the Governing Council on un-incorporation of Marist Regional College and this should soon be finalised.

Finally I would like to thank fellow Board members, the Parents and Friends Association, College staff and students for their collective efforts in taking Marist Regional College forward in all aspects of its development. We can all see the improvements in the College's physical assets, but it is in the improvements in the learning of our students, that we can all take pride.

The curriculum at Marist Regional College enhances and promotes student achievement by having learning tasks, assessments and experiences that cater for the different ways in which we learn. 2007 has seen many fantastic achievements in all Faculty areas. In particular, two excellent programs at the College demonstrate the breadth of learning that students can access at the College.

The Individual Learning Program assists individual and small groups of students through "hands on" learning continues to add depth and meaning to students' educational experiences. In 2007, the courses Carpentry, Diesel Mechanics, Metal working, Model Construction, Agriculture, Engine Maintenance and Art Design were offered. For the first time a high level Year 9 Computer Database and Programming Course for a highly motivated and skilful student was developed in the style of a student directed inquiry course. These courses are offered through the expertise of staff and the philosophy of enabling student potential through individualised and

challenging programs.

The Diverse Learning Program promotes higher order thinking and creativity and has seen students involved in challenging and rigorous competitions as well as attending some higher order thinking seminars. A Gifted and Talented seminar was on the themes: the contribution of psychology and sociology to an understanding of what it is to be human; the nature and beauty of Mathematics; human genetic engineering; and death and sexuality in the 21st century. These challenging topics enriched the learning of students as an extension to the College curriculum. Students also undertook individual interest based projects to explore during the year. Students challenged themselves and each other in this flexible parallel learning opportunity to the mainstream curriculum.

We have much to be proud of in the academic life of the College and for the first time, due to an SRC Academic Committee initiative, the College awarded the *Academic House Cup* to the House group that achieved the highest academic results, per student, at the end of the year.

Students at the College strive to do their best and are expertly supported by generous, knowledgeable and hard working teaching staff. I applaud students and staff for their efforts this year and hope that this same sense of drive, purpose and zeal will see them achieve of their best in 2008.

The Governing Council, which draws its membership from the founding religious congregations of the College, Catholic Education organisations and the wider Tasmanian Catholic community, is the delegated authority of the Roman Catholic Church Trust Corporation of the Archdiocese of Hobart. The Governing Council is established to conduct the College in collegial partnership with the Board and the College Principal.

Membership

As Chairman of the Governing Council I share membership with Dr Dan White, Fr Gary Reynolds SM, Sr Jan Geason RSM, Mr John Bloomfield and Mrs Kathleen Siggins. Mrs Siggins will retire from the Governing Council at the end of this year after having served Catholic Education in many capacities for many years. I thank her sincerely for her generous contribution.

We also welcome two new members who will join the Governing Council in December. Mr Carey McIver and Mrs Claire Hoye, both will bring great experience to the Council and we look forward to their contribution to the Governance of the College.

Reappointment of Principal

The Governing Council has confirmed the reappointment of Mrs Susan Chen as Principal of Marist Regional College for a further term of five years.

Appointment of an Executive Officer

Early in the year the Governing Council appointed Mr Stuart Elliss as Executive Officer to the Governing Council. The Executive Officer will serve the Governing Council by undertaking designated administrative responsibilities and facilitate communication between the Governing Council, the College Principal and the Board.

Constitution

At its first meeting in 2007, the Governing Council adopted the Marist Regional College Constitution, which clearly sets out the nature, scope and responsibilities of the principal, the Board and the Governing Council.

The Harcombe Centre

It was my privilege in March to bless and open the Harcombe Centre in the presence of the members of the Governing Council and the school community. This wonderful addition to the Marist Regional College facilities is a credit to the foresight and planning of the College Board, Principal and staff over many years.

Mr Andrew Mullins is the principal of a secondary boys college of 500 students. The school believes parents are the primary educators of their children. Several initiatives have been adopted to assist parents with their parenting role. For example, father/son camps are organised by the school. It is an expectation that all involved attend.

The many positive comments made by students on the night was a testament to the thought and organisational skill placed into the evening by Mrs Wendy Horniblow, the Year 10 Coordinator and Mrs Rosalie Nayler, the Parents and Friends' treasurer. Official Opening



It was at the request of the Archbishop of Hobart, Rev. Guilford Young, in the mid 1950s that Fr. James Harcombe led the construction of a Marist school to cater for the growing, educational needs of the Burnie community. Following the opening of the school in 1959, the intention of the school was to add a gymnasium to its grounds, however, it was not until nearly fifty six years later that the project to build a new gymnasium commenced.

This long awaited structure with a total floor space of 2000 square metres, was opened to the school and wider community by Archbishop Adrian Doyle on March 15th. In the recognition and appreciation of Fr. Harcombe's foresight and dedication, the new gymnasium now carries his name and is an amazing new educational asset to the College and broader community.

It includes flexible learning and entertainment areas, as well as a double gymnasium, fitness room, staffing and storage spaces. The facility is often used for school gatherings and assemblies, with retractable seating which has the potential to seat at least 900. Installed are professional sound and presentation systems to stretch the centre's function beyond that of a sporting nature.

It provides wonderful opportunities for students at the College to engage in sporting activities, despite inclement weather, and create links with sporting or community groups to make this a truly unique and beneficial venue.

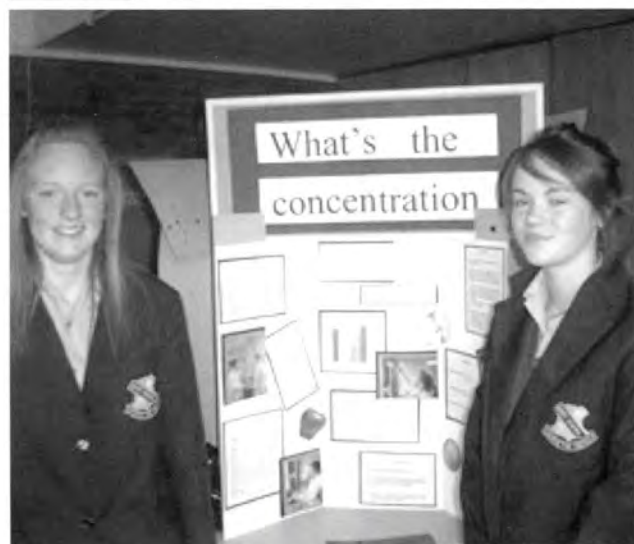

2007 has been an extremely busy year for the staff in the Resource Centre. Not just because of the numbers of people entering and requiring assistance, but also because of the many changes we've made in both the library layout and staffing.

We have certainly been well utilised by the school population, averaging 3500 people through the doors every week, which has kept us occupied doing everything from checking books out to shelving those items which have been returned, laminating project covers, finding difficult to locate information and recommending something good to read. We have exhibited lots of student work which created colourful, ever-changing displays throughout the Resource Centre. To keep the broader school community informed of events and happenings we have produced the Library Newsletter which went out in the *MRC Star* once a month. We also have a display of two highly recommended books which changes weekly to show the different books available in our fiction collection.

During the May-June holidays we had the silent study carrels removed, and using the space made available by this, we reorganised almost the entire library collection, moving everything but a few of the fiction books and some of the non-fiction shelves. We also purchased a new display stand, a special box to house the picture books and two couches which have become very popular, particularly among Senior College students during their study periods. We have replaced the carrels with small tables for those students who wish to study quietly by themselves or in small groups. This restructuring has made the library look larger, more open and lighter and was the subject of many favourable remarks by both staff and students at the beginning of Term 2.

Also during this holiday break we went live with a new catalogue system, replacing Athena which we have used for the past 6 to 7 years with Oliver, a system with lots of potential. All the grade 7 and 8 students, plus quite a number of staff have had training in its use by library staff throughout second and third terms. Not because it was complicated to use, but because of the extra features it provided. As well, we acquired a program which allows digital videos to be accessed from any computer within the school. Clickview™ is regarded as a very useful teaching tool and I'm sure will be even more widely used in future years.

At the beginning of August, the Resource Centre and English Faculty jointly hosted two authors visiting the school. Simmone Howell and Justin D'Ath were each here for two days, and between them they spoke to nearly every student in the school. As well as discussing writing styles and methods, Justin entertained the younger grades, beginning his talks with explaining that historically his surname was Death, but that his grandfather had

changed it to D'Ath because the name Doctor Death didn't inspire confidence in potential patients. Simmone inspired some great ideas and resulting stories from the workshops she took with the Senior College English classes. It was a tiring three days for those involved in the organising of these events, but very worthwhile for staff and students alike.

One of our biggest changes occurred at the end of Term 2. On the final day of term, Mrs Kaye Dunn, who had been a part of the library staff for about 17 years, retired in order to go sailing around the world. We shall miss her very much, but wish her the very best in her interesting new endeavours.

Mrs Trudy Rogers is now working full-time instead of her previous 3 days a week, and has taken over the position of Audio-Visual Technician. We also welcomed Miss Jade Anderson to our team as our new Library Technician. Even in the short time she has been with us, Miss Anderson has proved herself an extremely capable and talented addition to our staff, as well as being a lovely person to work with.

Despite being extremely busy in a number of different ways, 2007 has been an enjoyable and interesting time in the Library. We have continued to prove very popular and our usage statistics have increased from previous years. Overall it has been a very good year and we look forward to an eventful and exciting 2008.

I was just nine years old when I thought my life had changed forever. I was in London when the war began and felt safe in the company of my home and parents. But all that changed.

My father was a doctor. Mother stayed at home and made it comfortable for my father and me. Everyone knew that it would be safer in the country but my father would not leave – for his love of his country was too strong. So he stayed and helped the casualties of the war. My mother would not leave her beloved husband so I was sent away to boarding school in the country.

I packed my things and mother and father took me to the train station. When I got there I was crying so hard my shirt was wet. But I knew I had to go and then when the war was over I would come home to my parents. I was just getting on the train when I raced back to Mum and gave her the biggest hug a boy could give his mum. She whispered in my ear,

“Be strong my baby boy and know that we will love you dearly always!”

Then the whistle started to blow and the conductor yelled, “ALL ABOARD!”.

Not wanting to go I reluctantly climbed aboard the train while yelling a tearful farewell to my parents.

As the train started to pick up a little bit of speed and smoke was billowing from the funnel, I caught a glimpse of a plane flying low above. The air raid sirens came then, which I could hear over the loud noise of the train and the high powered engines of the jet. I looked back to see just a smoking fire hole where my parents had been only seconds before. I started screaming so loud I could hear nothing else. But the train did not stop.

The next thing I remember is waking up in a strange bed with a broken heart. I then asked one of the adults standing by wearing nurse-like uniforms,

“Is this the boarding school?”

“No” they replied “This is an orphanage.”

Then it all came back to me, the horror of my parent’s death. I was alone in the world with no one to love and no one to love me. They told me that because my parents were supposedly killed in the air raid, this was now my home, along with many other parentless children.

Panasonic KWN Program



Early in Term One a meeting was called for those students who would be keen to create a five minute documentary for this year's Panasonic Kid Witness News program. While we began with a group of about eight Year 8 and 9 students, this eventually reduced to a team of four dedicated Year 9s.

When cops and robbers and hide and seek were the only way to play

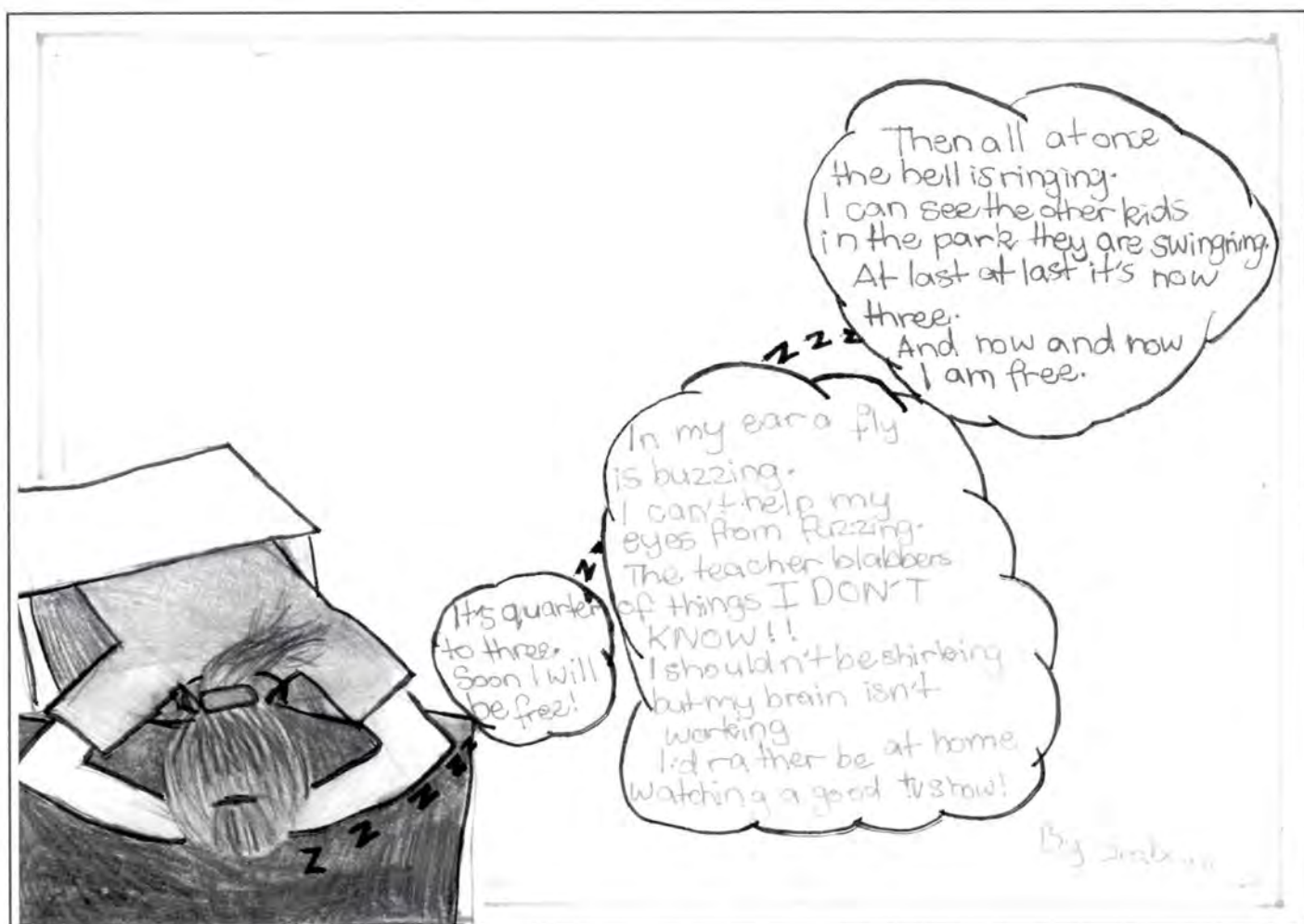

France September 2007

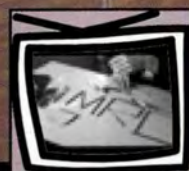

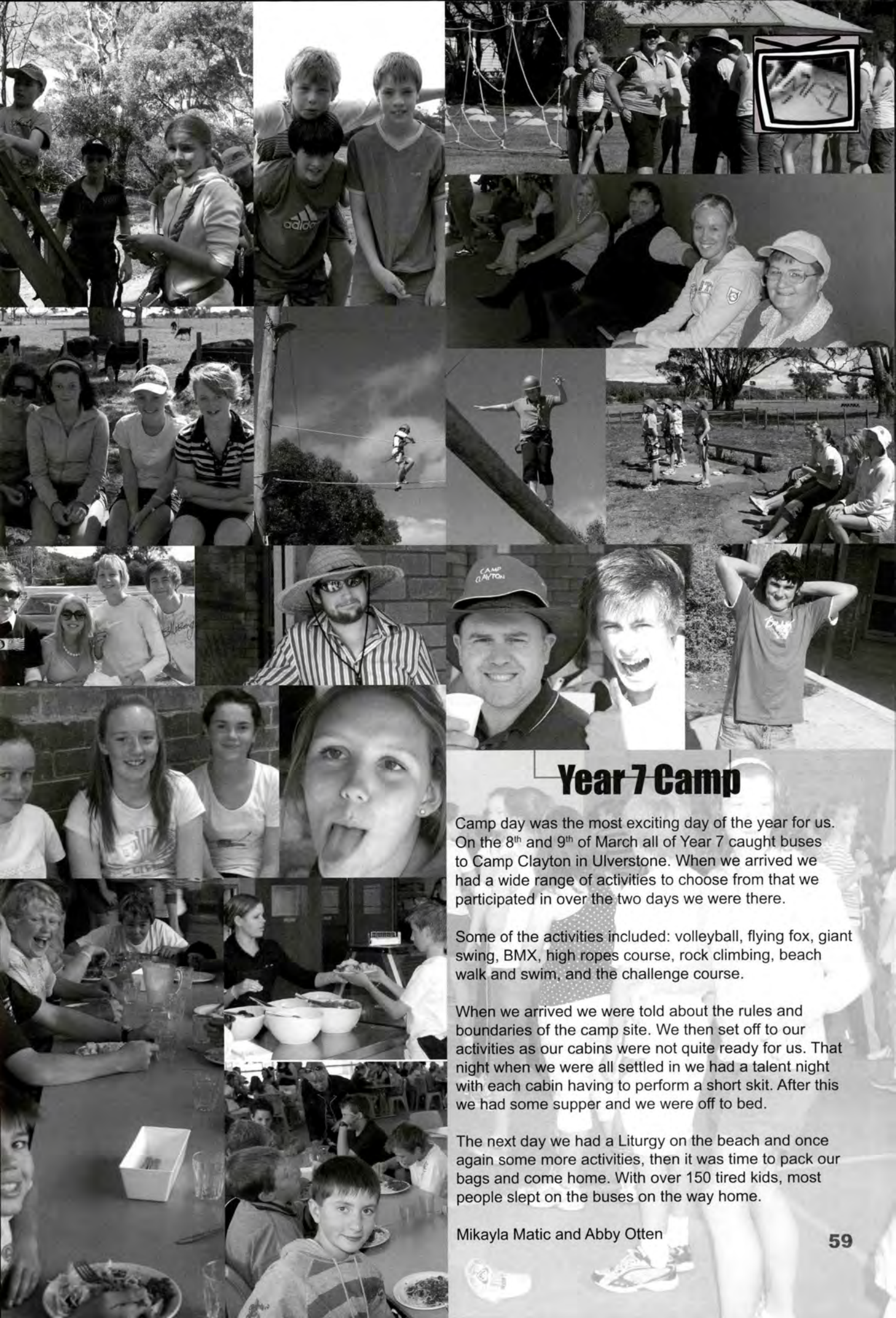

Official Opening December 6th 2007



Sister Mary Sabina Conway

Mary Catherine Conway was born at Armadale, Victoria, on April 30 1897. In 1916 Mary entered the Ascot Vale Novitiate of the Sisters of Mercy and was professed on February 4th 1919. She took the religious name Sr. Mary Sabina and for the next 12 months she completed her teacher training.

On February 21st 1920 Sr. Sabina crossed Bass Strait to begin a lifetime of service to Burnie. Apart from 6 years at the Deloraine convent she spent all her time in Burnie until her transfer to the Lilydale house in Victoria in 1981. Initially she taught senior primary grades and music at Stella Maris, then piano, singing and commercial subjects at Stella Maris Regional Girls' College and Marist Regional College.

Sr. Sabina also provided great service in other areas. She visited the sick and bereaved, elderly patients in their homes and in hospitals and conducted Sunday school classes. She was a great supporter of the Burnie Eisteddfod, also the church organist and sacristan during her time in Burnie.

She is described as a "member of the Mercy order who epitomised its service to the Burnie Community". Naming the performing arts centre after Sister Sabina honours her work and that of the Mercy order she represented.

Sr. Sabina died in St Joseph's Hospital, Geelong, on August 13 1984.

Conway Hall

The Building Committee, a sub-committee of the Board, commissioned a design for a performing arts centre in the latter half of 2006, while construction of the Harcombe Centre was still underway. Mr David Gillies, architect for Bullocks Consulting provided a design that made excellent use of the old assembly hall which had begun life as the undercroft of the science building.

Digging under the Science building enabled provision of space for dressing rooms and toilet facilities at the stage end of the Hall. A section of the Hall was transformed into a theatre with audience capacity of over 230. During the school day this area is divided into two large drama studios complete with the latest theatre technology to ensure first class productions. The remainder of the Hall has been converted into two classrooms, which help to address the needs of the College's growing student enrolment. Construction company, Meadson, tendered successfully for the project, which was completed in time for its official blessing by Archbishop Adrian Doyle and opening by Dr Dan White on 6 December 2007.

Tickets were available for specific performances as were Roaming Passes which enabled the audience to view several presentations on the one evening.

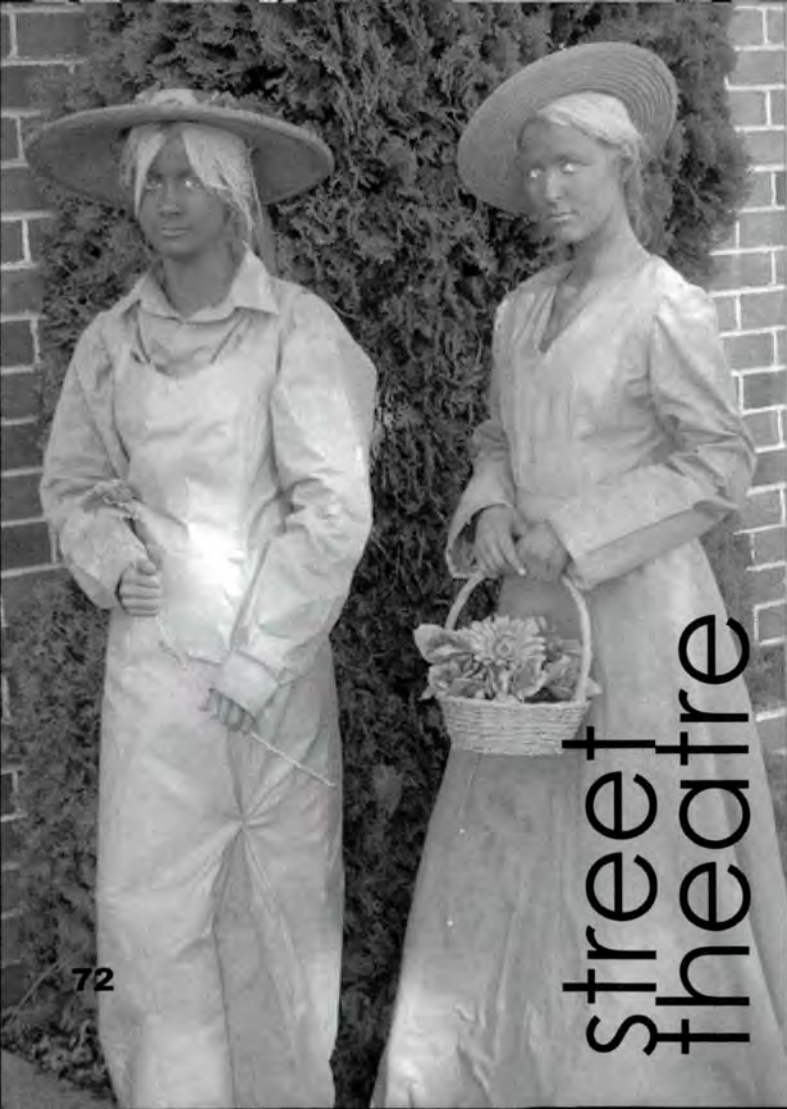

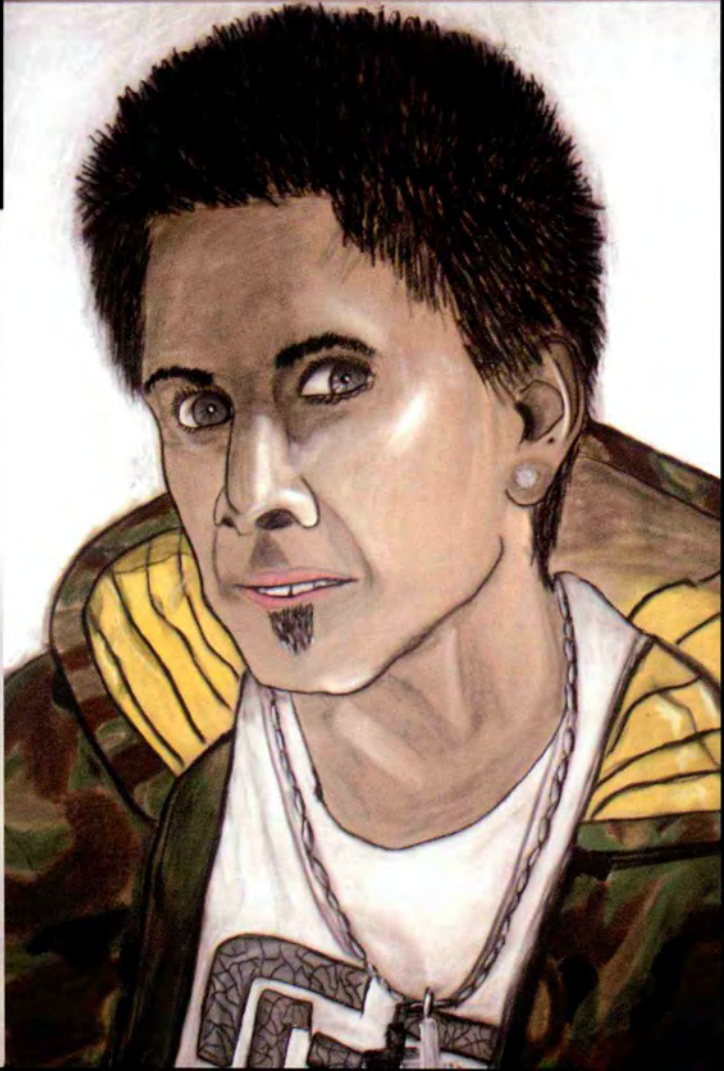
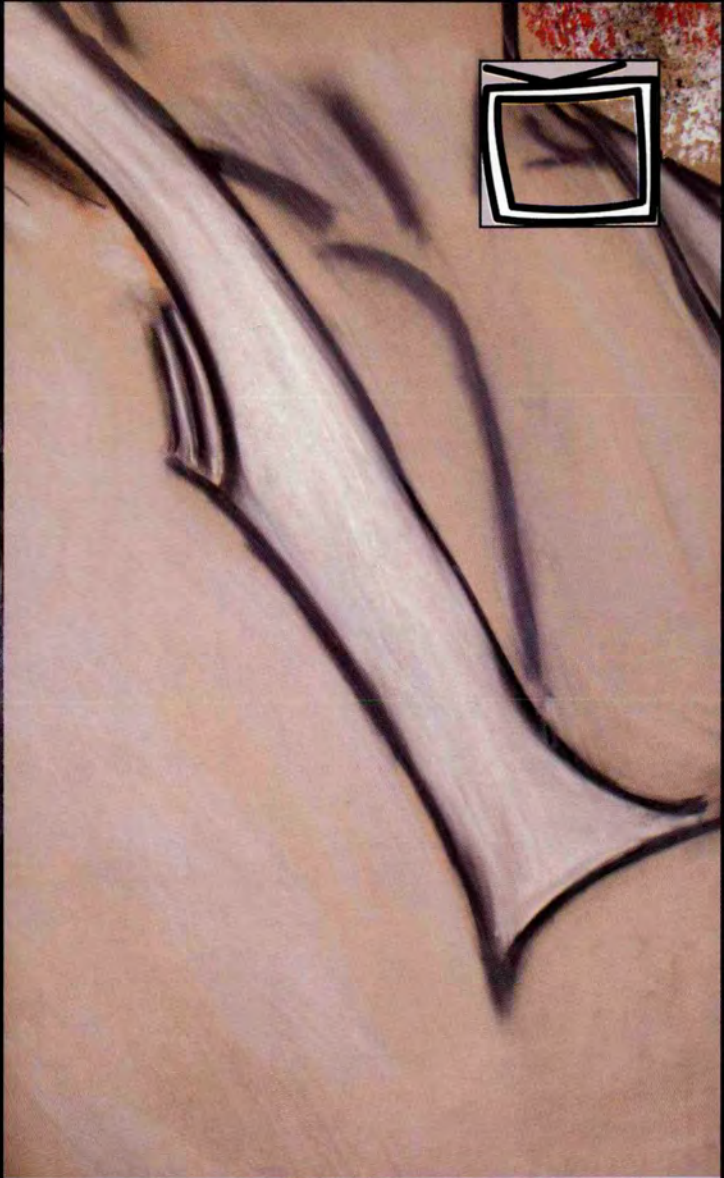

Tasmanian Schools Surfing Championships

On 2nd April, the biggest surf contest of the year took place at Clifton Beach near Hobart. Over 300 students participated in this year's championship in 12 different divisions. The competitors come from all over the state with teams from the East Coast, Bruny Island, Hobart, Launceston and the North West Coast.

Marist took a team of 12 students, 7 boys and 5 girls. Futsal in Brazil

During August 2007, I was fortunate enough to be selected in a team of Australian and New Zealand boys to travel to Brazil to play futsal. The team consisted of 6 Australians and 3 New Zealanders under the guidance of Gui Costa, a Brazilian born futsal coach. Futsal, is a very fast, 5 a side indoor soccer game. In Australia it is a relatively new sport, where as in Brazil, it has a long history.

In Brazil children don't play outdoor soccer until they are 14, honing their ball skills till then playing futsal. This difference was obvious in our first few games, when we played the Brazilian boys outdoor it was another story. However, we were fortunate enough to be trained at Malwee Futsal Academy, after two days of training we replayed a team who, originally, beat us 7 -5 winning 7-1. The training seemed to make a difference.

During the three week trip I spent time in Florianopolis, a large city in the south of Brazil, Jaragua do Sul, (which, in Brazil, is known as the city of Futsal) and Veranopolis. We watched a National League Football Game, met Falcao, who is the world number 1 futsal player, and were privileged enough to walk onto the court with the players in the Semi Final of the Futsal Champions League, and kick the ball around with them at half time. The coach of one of these teams presented me with one of their jerseys at the end of the game.

Despite rather long, indirect flights, which took us via Tokyo, and New York before reaching Brazil, I had an absolutely fabulous time. It is an experience I will never be able to repeat. My ball skills improved and I made some good friends, I also have many photos to help me remember my trip.

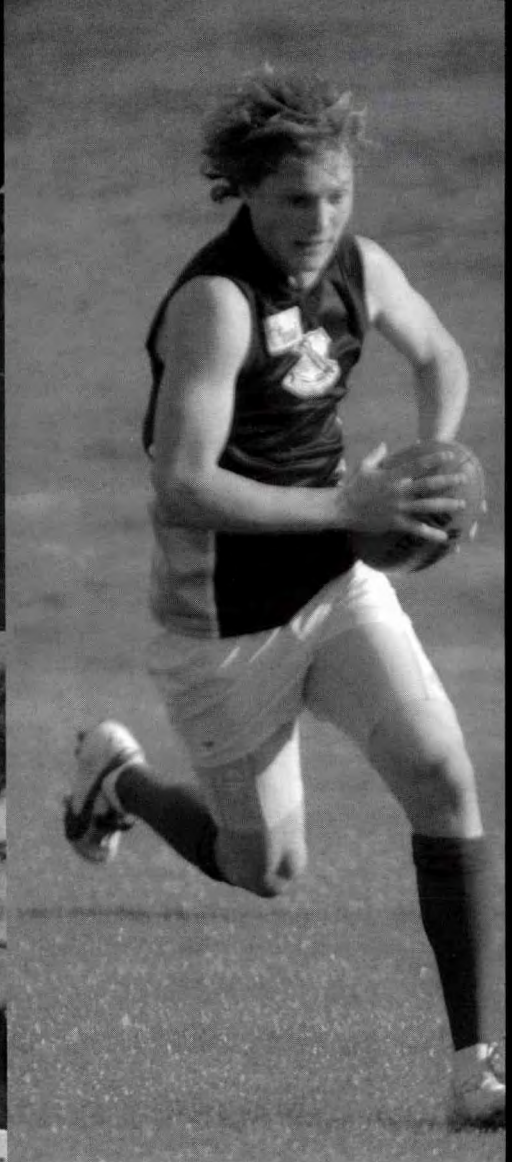
