A new history begins

An early chapter of our College history will draw to a close at the end of 2012 as the original buildings of Stella Maris Regional Girls College are scheduled for demolition. The buildings have served many purposes over the past 46 years – the new home of the girls college from 1966, the Junior School from the mid 1970s, and more recently, as McAuley Wing.

A new chapter in the story of our community will begin in 2013 as the Year 8 section of our specialised middle school begins to take shape.

The new building will be known as McAuley Centre, in recognition of the founder of the Sisters of Mercy, one of the religious orders that form a strong part of our charism as a Catholic college.

The Mercy Sisters began teaching in our community in 1901 at Stella Maris Convent School and blazed a trail in secondary education for girls in north-west Tasmania with the establishment of Stella Maris Regional Girls College in 1953.

Although the old bricks will forever belong to the past, the spirit of the Sisters of Mercy will live on in the new McAuley Centre where the nurturing of every child's capacity to learn underpins our middle school philosophy ■

The agenda for 2013 will include the introduction of the 1:1 computer program, continuing adoption of the Australian Curriculum, a \$3 million re-build of McAuley Centre with the help of \$750,000 of federal funding through the Diocesan Capital Projects Committee and the introduction of a teacher performance and development program instituted by the federal government. In fact, the pace is relentless and so we have great hopes for all that the four-term year, with its intensive 10-week learning periods and more regular breaks, will bring.

Our academic achievements are evidence that we are meeting our learning goals. Our NAPLAN results are impressive and well above our socio-economic status. Senior College results are up with the best in the State, with one of our students, Georgia Jaffray, achieving the equal highest university entrance score in Australia last year.

Our vocational education and training program is growing and an increasing number of students are achieving nationally recognised certificates in this sector.

A highlight this year was the official opening of the Cradle Coast Trade Training Centre. This fantastic facility provides industry standard training for students from the north-west coast. We now host eight VET courses and enable students to participate in five other courses hosted online or by other institutions. This year the Polytechnic used our commercial kitchen to run a 16-week program. In 2013, the Skills Institute will use the bakery to run a program for bakery apprentices from our region. Also in 2013 students from Leighlands Christian School will be coming one day a week to participate in a Certificate II in Hospitality.

One of our goals is to focus on personalising learning to meet the

needs of each student. We know that good teaching is about connecting with each of the learners in our classes and using the strategies we have to engage and inspire them to achieve new skills, understandings and attitudes. Much of our professional learning is focused on strategies to personalise learning.

One radical way the College is doing this is through the development of the Year 10 Parallel Boys Program. This was the first year of the program and was led by Mr Adrian Pearce and Mr Grant Sims. They have reported that all of the boys in the program are continuing in education and four of them have achieved traineeships or apprenticeships. There have been some trials along the way and, while the approach is not for all students, we can be confident in saying that this group of boys overall has shown a significant development in maturity and focus. Their parents believe so as the following comments attest:

"My son has been taught self-respect, self-confidence, compassion, empathy, responsibility and maturity. We have a son who is doing homework, looking forward to school and planning his future; his marks have improved no end."

"In short this program has helped our son to adjust to the seriousness of schooling without the stress and lack of confidence."

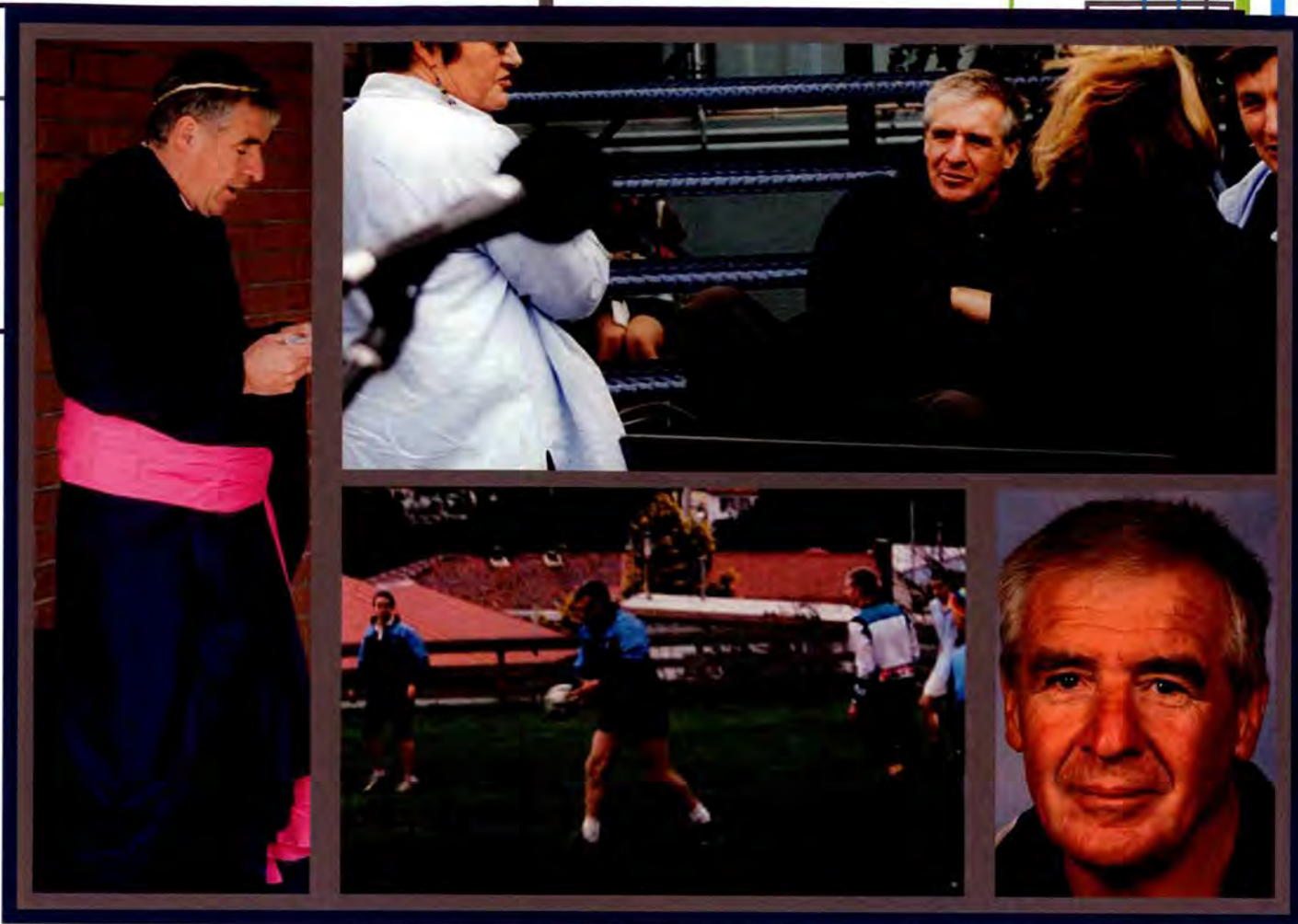
There have been many wonderful highlights this year and, while it is impossible to recognise them all, the list below is indicative of the examples evident as our community works together:

- the national MSA netball carnival which brought about 200 competitors to Burnie;
- the 2012 musical – the *Great Australian Rock Musical* – a collaboration of 150 students, staff and parents;
- the National Year of Reading program, organised by the library staff, which resulted in nine nationally acclaimed authors visiting this year;
- the Science Week activities hosted by UTAS;
- the NEXTgen Business Team Challenge;
- the study tour to Japan.

These provided students with terrific learning opportunities and are consistent with our vision as a dynamic and innovative learning community that strives for excellence.

COHESIVE EFFORTS HELP DEFINE COLLEGE IDENTITY

BOARD REPORT

The Board wishes to thank the staff and students for their contribution to a successful and productive 2012.

This year saw the opening of the new Cradle Coast Trade Training Centre, which incorporates the Cloud 9 training restaurant and café complex. The Arts Hub alterations and additions were completed in January and staff and students commenced using the new facility in February.

After deep involvement from all stakeholders, the College has completed *Strategic Directions 2012–2016*, a living document that emphasises our mission as a Catholic school.

As a particular project, the Board sought to establish for the College a communications plan for 2013–2015. Ms Simone Atkins, from the Cradle Coast Water Authority, has given generously of her time, as did many Board members, to establish a draft plan. It is hoped we can move more clearly to identify the role of the College in our north-west community through these efforts.

Major projects for this year include the new McAuley Centre to be built on the site of the old junior school. Demolition work began towards the end of 2012, while new building works should commence early next year.

His Grace has reappointed Sue Chen to the position of Principal after the completion of her term of 10 years. It is particularly pleasing to have Sue lead the College. Her intellect, experience and drive have always been outstanding and she brings the best out of all involved. Deputy Principal

Ann Roberts and the Leadership Team have, I believe, worked to keep Marist striving for excellence within the Christian and Catholic ethos.

The Board has kept to its tasks throughout the year meeting regularly, overseeing policy development, general governance, the careful revision of College finances and establishment of the budget for 2013.

The Board has approved in-principle the College moving to a one-to-one computer program for the school. The Leadership Team has formed a committee and is progressing towards implementation through the 2013 year.

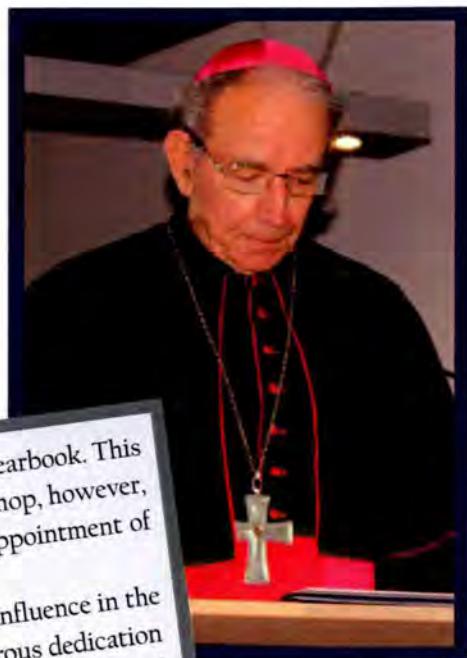

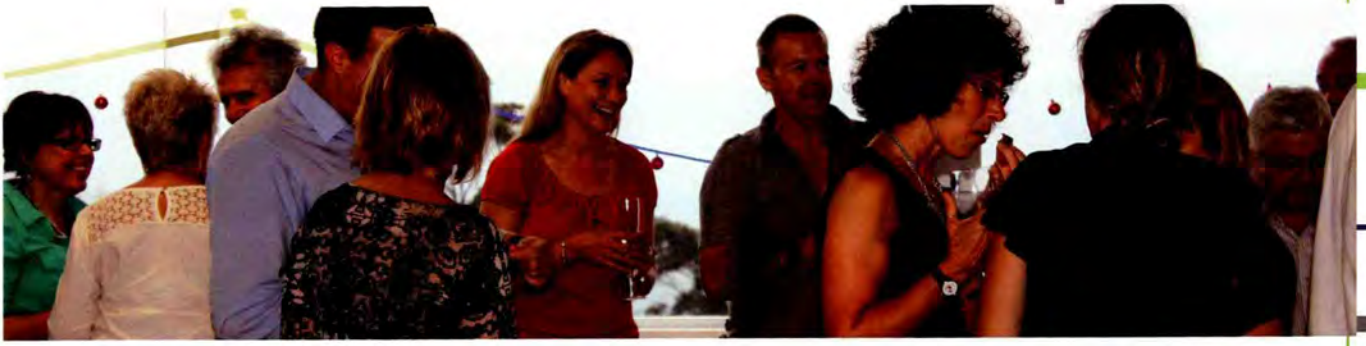

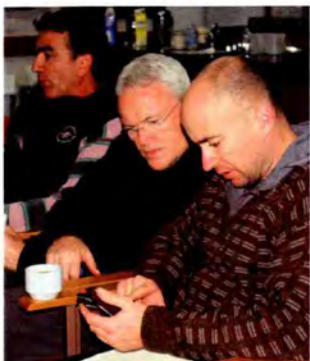

MISSION REPORT

Staff and students were formally welcomed to the College for the 2012 year at the annual Commencement Mass. In 2012 this event was combined with Ash Wednesday and the College student leaders were inducted. Other liturgical celebrations throughout the year included Holy Week liturgies, Lenten prayer, Feast Day and graduation masses. One of the priorities for 2012 was to build stronger links with our parishes. It is pleasing to note that 12 of our Remar students were actively involved with the Good Friday

Stations of the Cross. The shared morning tea that followed enabled our students to meet and talk to parishioners. We also met to remember passed loved ones at our annual Mass for Deceased Members of the College community. This was celebrated at our 6pm Sunday mass in the Chapel. Again, our Remar students took an active role in this mass. A shared light supper in Cloud 9 prompted a diverse range of conversations between the younger and older members of our faith community. Six lunchtime student-led Lenten Taize

prayer services were held throughout Lent, with Middle Years students joining the service by week 4. Early in Term 2, the weekly 6pm Sunday mass changed from Star of the Sea to our College Chapel.

Renewal program

The Chapel has been used considerably throughout the year and regular class liturgies are run by the Religious Education teachers in Years 7 and 8, with the support of the Director of Mission. The delivery of in-class renewal sessions has witnessed

authentic religious experiences and growth for our students. At the conclusion of their renewal delivery, every class in Years 7-10 participated in a reconciliation service and liturgy. The in-class delivery mode has also enabled the Director of Mission to build, foster and maintain positive relationships with all students within our College. As another means of building stronger links in our parish, Fr Tony Kennedy and Fr Fred Kado have been regular visitors to our Religious Education classes. They visited every Year 8 and 10 RE class four times during Term 1 and every Year 7 and 9 RE class five times during Term 2. Fr Tony was also involved with the Year 11 Renewal Day and Year 12 Retreat.

The Year 11 Renewal Day was held at the St Brigid's Church Hall. Two guest speakers spoke about leadership. Practical activities followed and the day concluded with a liturgy, led by Fr Tony and Remar students. The Year 12 students attended a two-day retreat in Term 3, which included presentations from staff members, international guest speaker Sam Cawthorn and Fr Tony. The theme for the retreat was "running the race of your life".

REMAR

Once again in 2012 we had three Remar caravels in our College. This co-curricular activity provides students with the opportunity to undertake personal growth, faith and leadership formation. Each caravel met once a fortnight to explore and respond to social justice issues. Caravels also attended a variety of local and national camps and retreats. In addition to this, students participated in community service in the local area. This included Yaraandoo Aged Care, Kommunity Kids, Leukaemia Foundation button selling, a hospice collection drive, the Vinnies Winter Appeal, the Smith Family student-to-student program, assisting at the Sunday evening youth

mass and raising money for charities. The Year 11 Remar caravel again travelled to Melbourne for a solidarity camp, where social justice issues challenged them to think deeply about their beliefs and values. Activities included visiting St Mary's House of Welcome and Mercy Place, Mercy Home, packing hampers at the Collingwood St Vincent de Paul Community Shop, stacking books at Smith Family student-to-student reading office and assisting with St Vincent de Paul Society soup van services. In early December, at the Sunday evening parish mass, we held our Remar end-of-year mass which included the graduation of our Gold Caravel.

Social justice

Throughout the year our Student Representative Council and Remar students worked together to promote and support social justice programs. These students have run a number of National Safe Schools Framework meetings and activities to build positive relationships within our College community. Posters were erected around the College to illustrate the manner in which positive relationships can continue to be fostered.

Research has commenced regarding the creation of a social justice program for Years 7-9. With the arrival of St Vincent de Paul Society coordinator Danusia Kaska in Launceston, we hope to introduce a Young Vinnies program in 2013. Several primary schools in the north-west region have Young Vinnies operating for their Year 5 and 6 students and the establishment of this form of social justice program at the College will promote a transition into Remar for Years 10-12.

The development of the spiritual growth of students and staff has continued to be explored throughout 2012. The Religious Education Faculty was given planning time to develop units that enable our students to

The College community also continued to support the missions, raising \$4350 for Caritas, Marist and Mercy Missions and the Archbishop's Samaritan Fund.

MIDDLE YEARS

The Middle Years program motivates and engages teenagers in deep and meaningful learning.

The focus in Middle Years is on motivating and engaging students in deep learning. This was certainly the case in 2012 as students were kept busy with a variety of fun learning experiences, designed to help students be the best versions of themselves!

Let's get started

2012 began with two big events designed to help students get to know one another and their teachers, learn to work together, and settle into high school.

Year 7 Camp is always a highlight for students; the memories will be fondly recalled and the friendships treasured. In 2012 staff and students headed to Camp Banksia for three days and two nights of bonding. Activities were many and varied, and included small group challenges, blindfold water fights, no-hands eating, swimming, making sand sculptures, plus lots of time to talk with new friends! these SOSE units. Students participated in a range of themed activities, dressed to impress and enjoyed lunch with their peers.

The Year 7 teaching team held an afternoon of activities related to the water cycle, a concept covered in SOSE and Science. Students participated in English writing activities, Science experiments and SOSE demonstrations. The afternoon was thoroughly enjoyed by all and the learning significant because of the connections made between subjects.

The Year 8 English-SOSE teachers took a different approach to assessing student understanding of Shogunate Japan. Instead of a test, a written report or an oral presentation, students were asked to work in groups to create an interactive information display. An expo-like atmosphere was created in Chanel as staff and Year 7 students

enjoyed sushi and green tea tasting, watched demonstrations of martial arts, tried their hand at calligraphy, and listened as Year 8 students espoused their new knowledge.

Before long the end of the year approached and it was time to think about the alternative curriculum program. For the first time students participated in the TEAM Challenge, an enterprise education program that had students working in company teams to develop and market a child's educational toy. In this experiential, hands-on, decision-making program students took part in a computer simulation to understand key concepts in running a business, developed a prototype of their product, created a marketing campaign, and presented all their work at a trade fair. In the afternoon, students selected a recreational activity to enjoy. More than 20 parents attended the trade fair

❖ PASTORAL HEALTH

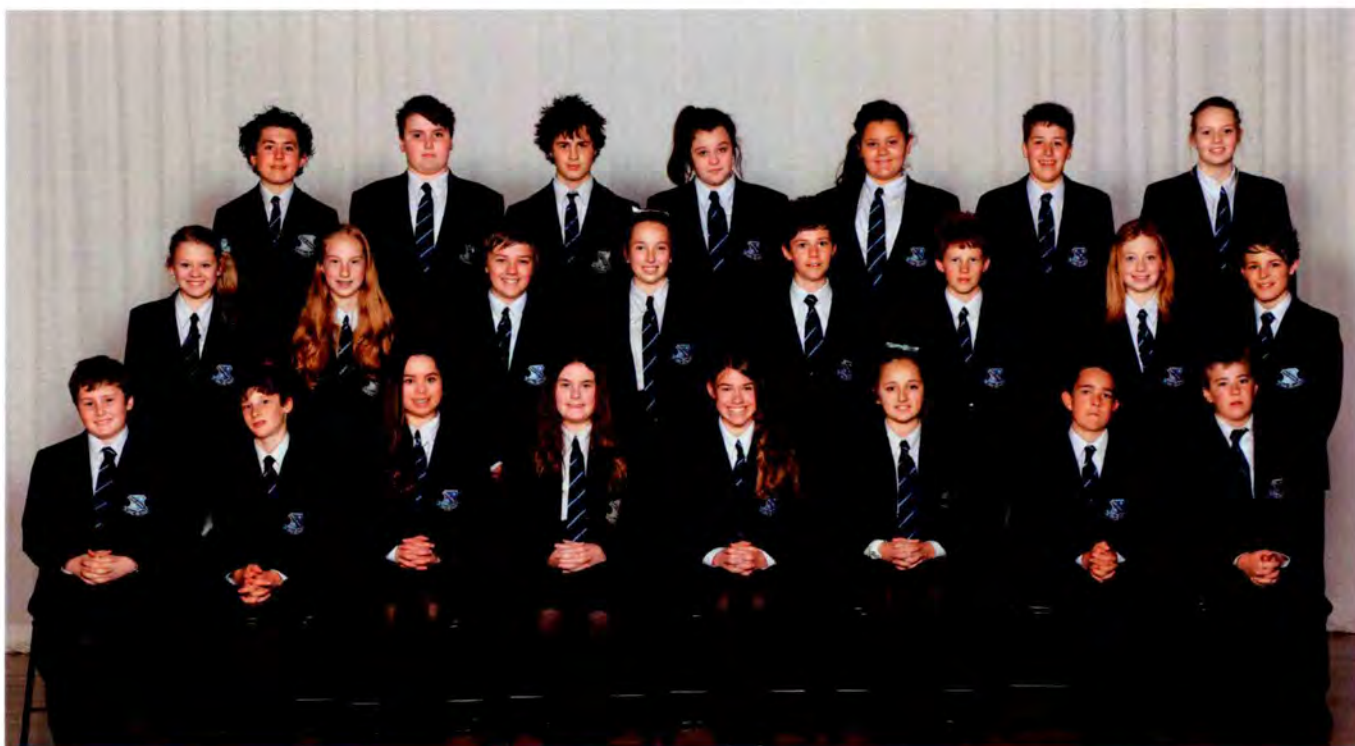

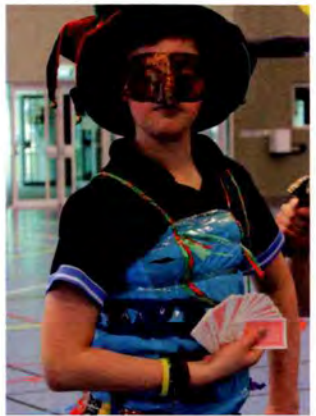

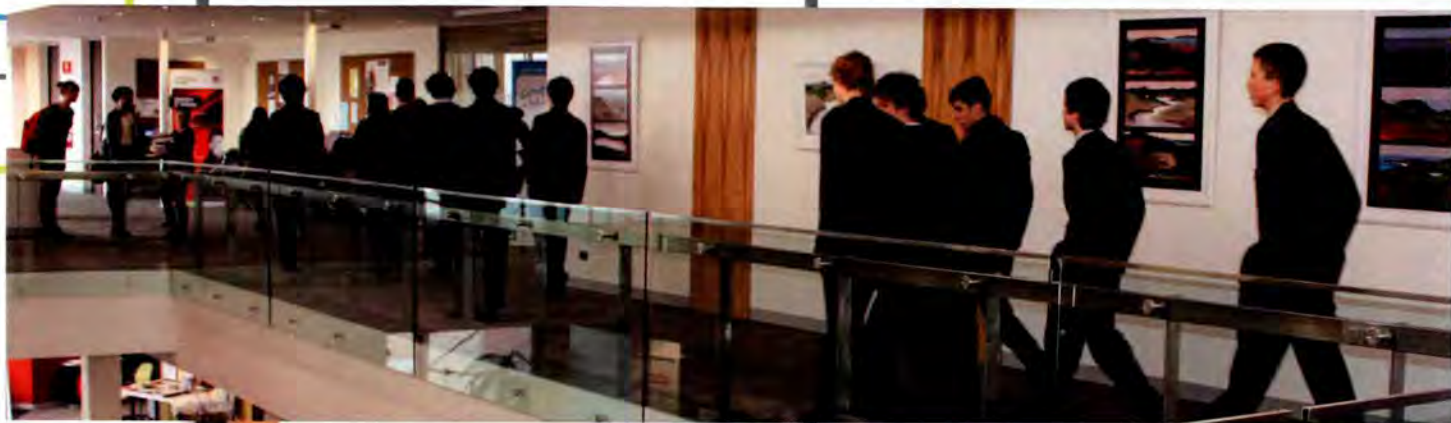

PARALLEL BOYS PROGRAM

The boys soon realised that learning can be fun and that if all deadlines were met, there were opportunities to enjoy many outdoor activities. It was without a doubt the most rewarding year of teaching for both of us. To see the boys develop a

special bond and to finally realise their true potential was fantastic to witness.

While many of the boys have continued on to Year 11, others were fortunate enough to gain apprenticeships, largely due to the work experience opportunities offered within the program "Reach the boy and change the man".

Progress to further education or to viable employment was our main aim for the new program, coupled with the desire to have our boys believe that they all have potential and can achieve great things if they are willing to work hard.

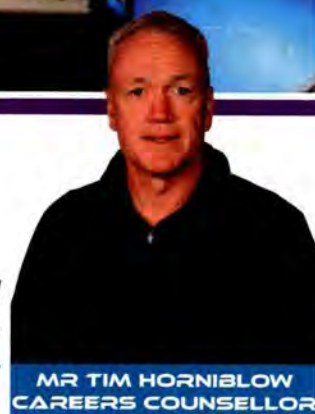
Many thanks to Susie Bond, who put the wheels in motion in 2011, and to the College for supporting this program. It has certainly changed the lives of many for the better.

CAREERS

Prior to commencing work experience, students attended a comprehensive three-day Career and Health and Wellbeing Expo initiated by Ms Ann Roberts and co-ordinated by Ms Belinda Brown, Mrs Susie Bond and Mrs Carina Whitcombe. The expo included guest speaker Ms Karlie Reeves, Youth Development Officer with the Burnie City Council. Karlie inspired the students before they ventured out on their work experience with stories of what to expect from employers and the meaning of work ethic today.

During the expo students undertook a series of tasks including completing a resume, writing a letter of application and a personal statement, undertaking an online OHS induction session and visiting the UTAS Cradle Coast Campus. The intensive pathway training was a successful new development for the Careers Centre.

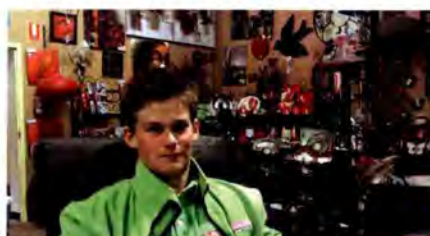
During work experience week students were expected to work the hours required in their particular industry and for some students that meant commencing before 6 am to start on time in the hospitality industry. A diary of activities and a personal journal were completed by each student and at the end of the week the employer completed an evaluation form on the student which was then posted back to the Career Centre for individual counselling and follow-up.

This year it has become even more difficult for students to be successfully placed in their selected field of interest. In the fields of health it has become apparent that students are required to be at undergraduate level before gaining access to hospitals and clinics. To overcome this, the UTAS Rural Clinical School assisted the College by running taster days in the fields of medicine, pharmacy, nursing and

a range of allied health sciences. The health sciences continue to be popular career pathways for a large number of our students.

At the end of Year 10, all students are required to complete a statement of intent which is registered with the Tasmanian Qualifications Authority, through the Careers Centre. During Senior College, all students have follow up individual career counselling sessions with the aim of developing and reviewing their personal planning pathway document that forms part of the Tasmanian Education Certificate.

The success of pathways this year has been due largely to the wide range of courses now available at the College, the generosity of employers in supporting the students and the hard working staff at the College, in particular, Mrs Julie Barnett the administrative officer for the VET and Careers Centre. ■

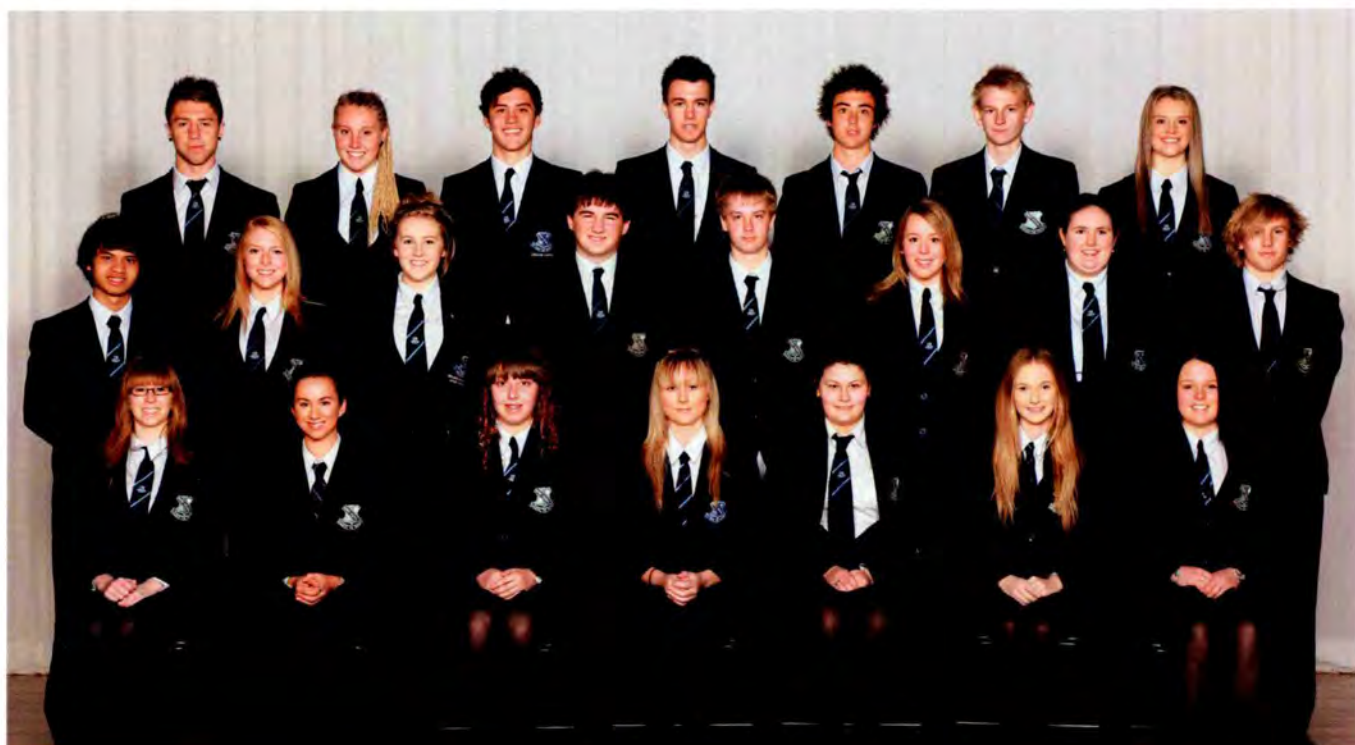

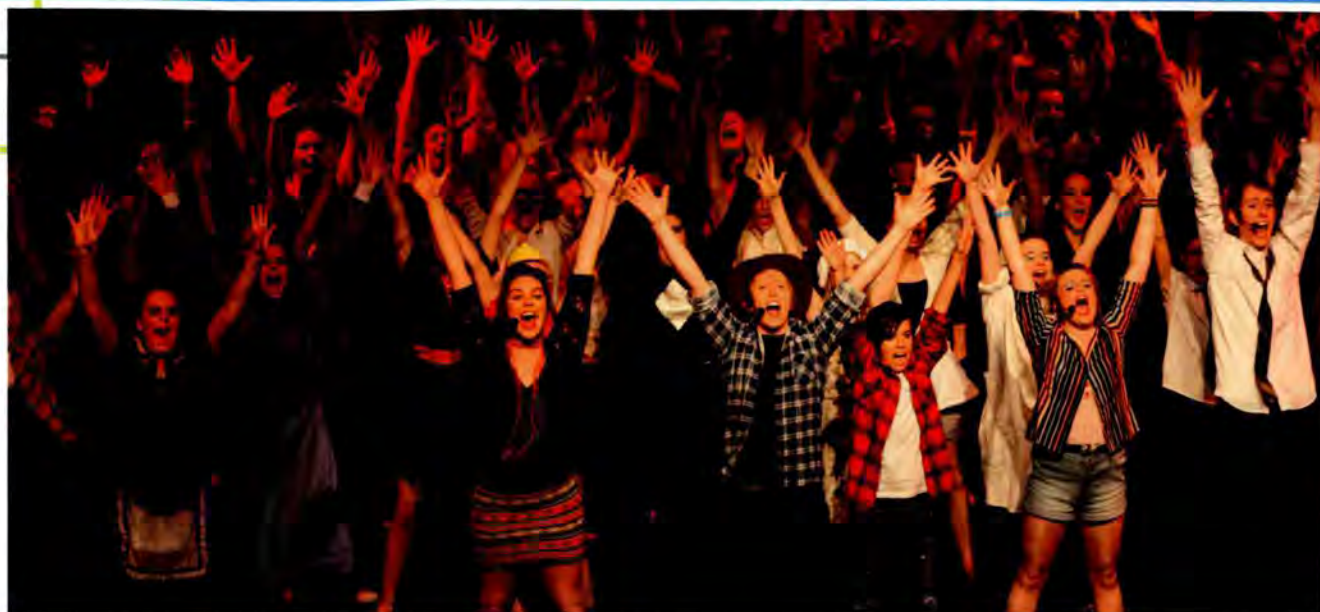

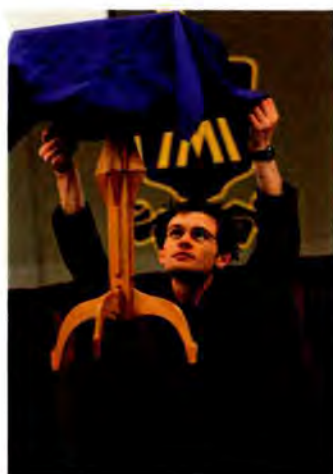

ACADEMICS

TCE academic results

The 2012 Year 12 cohort was slightly smaller than that of 2011 with 93 students completing their TCE studies. Outstanding results were achieved by hard-working and highly focused students with 19 (20 per cent of the cohort) achieving a tertiary entrance score above 88.2, which translated to an ATAR* of above 90 (table 1). A ranking in the 90s places our students in the top 10 per cent of Year 12 graduating students across Australia. This year, 61.3 per cent of Year 12 achieved an ATAR (table 1), with just over half of the cohort ranking above 60. The average ATAR was 79.06.

A significant proportion of the Year 12 cohort who did not achieve an ATAR (38.7%) selected non pre-tertiary subjects that are not considered in the calculations for university entrance scores. Indeed, more students are choosing to combine pre-tertiary, non pre-tertiary and VET subjects. About 17 per cent of students completed VET units as part of their TCE studies this year.

Actual numbers not achieving the TCE declined slightly, with 22 students in the Year 12 cohort failing to attain the necessary requirements to meet the TCE standards.

The 2012 graduating cohort results included exceptional individual student achievements. The College Dux for 2012 is Madeline Marshall. Her outstanding Year 12 results saw her awarded the Year 12 Dux. In addition to her TCE subjects, Madeline completed the UTAS High Achiever Program in Mathematics and was awarded 25.60 points towards her ATAR.

Sam Hamilton also had an outstanding academic year, achieving an EA across all five pre-tertiary subjects studied this year. Madeline and Sam were in the top 16 TCE students this year and were presented with medals at the TQA awards ceremony at Government House. Georgia Waldhauser also received a TQA award for her outstanding achievement in Health Studies. VET students Danielle Hyland and Bonnie Smith received TQA awards for their outstanding achievements in business and tourism studies.

The Year 11 Dux was awarded to Emily Mackrill with a TE score of 73.1 for her pre-tertiary subjects. Six Year 11 students recorded EA results in Physical Sciences.

NAPLAN

Improvement to student learning and achievement requires the establishment of high expectations and a commitment to continuous cycles of inquiry and action.

The results for NAPLAN 2012 indicate that the College has performed well compared with all Tasmanian schools and similar schools across Australia. The scope of the national assessment program increases every year and the data now available is very rich in information. The Catholic education system now has the capacity to track student progress from Year 3 through to Year 9. This valuable tool is helping us target literacy and numeracy improvement programs.

Improvement in the test results of the Year 7 cohort in persuasive writing exemplifies the impact of focused teaching. This year, 98 per cent of the Year 7 cohort achieved at or above the minimum standard, compared with 88 per cent in Tasmanian schools and 90 per cent in Australian schools. The persuasive writing result was a five per cent



increase on our Year 7 result in 2011 and was our highest increase for any test area. This fantastic result is credit to our feeder schools and to the Year 7 English team.

The College continues to perform exceptionally well each year in numeracy, with 99 per cent of the cohort at or above the minimum standard. Again the result compares favourably with Tasmanian schools (93%) and more broadly with schools across Australia (94%).

In Year 7, the College had a higher percentage of students at or above the minimum standards in all testing disciplines for NAPLAN. This is the second consecutive year that our results for the Year 7 cohort have scored higher than their peers from around the country. Reading and spelling will be the key literacy areas in 2013. The focus for numeracy skills will be to work with a small group of students who are at or below the minimum standards set out in NAPLAN.

The results for Year 9 show that the Marist cohort sits above schools across Tasmania and Australia in three of the

five tested areas — reading, numeracy and grammar and punctuation. Year 9 students were on par in spelling and marginally behind (one per cent) in writing compared with national figures.

In response to the data, in 2013 we will continue to address curriculum design, explicit teaching and assessment. The focus areas across Years 9 and 10 in 2013 will continue to be on writing, in particular persuasive writing, and reading.

The NAPLAN results provide additional data to assist teachers to target support for individual students who performed at or below minimum numeracy standards. The Mathematics Faculty has commenced a trial project that will run into 2013 which we hope will provide a targeted remedial approach for underachieving students.

Teaching & learning

Implementation of the Australian Curriculum has been a central focus for the College. We have continued to refine our strategic goals to ensure the significant work required to implement the Australian Curriculum is undertaken methodically and in

the best interests of our students. In preparation for effective delivery of the Australian Curriculum we have increased lesson allocations in the core subjects of English, mathematics and science. One of the key objectives of the Australian Curriculum is to raise standards so that Australian students are prepared for a 21st century globalised economy, a future characterised by increased standards in literacy, numeracy, scientific knowledge and understanding and information communication technology competence.

To prepare and support teaching staff for the extensive work they are undertaking faculty heads and curriculum leaders regularly attended network meetings provided by the Tasmanian Catholic Education Office. Teaching staff have undertaken a range of professional learning opportunities focused on assessment, pedagogy and differentiation. Considerable work in curriculum design and development of learning programs has been undertaken in the key learning areas of English, mathematics, science and history and



we will be ready to report to Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority standards in these subjects in 2013.

Students born into a digital world need to be capable of managing and operating information communication technologies. This includes the capability to investigate, create and communicate using ICT while applying social and ethical protocols. In 2012 we have focused on developing e-learning.

The e-learning coordinator has attended a broad range of professional learning activities across Australia to develop expertise in using blogs in the classroom, and software such as Flash and InDesign for creating eBooks and interactive documents. The e-learning coordinator presented to teaching staff during our professional learning day, including a presentation that showcased current initiatives in ICT by teaching staff at the College. Teachers have undertaken a broad range of workshops throughout the year to support the implementation of the 1:1 computing devices and the Bring Your Own Device (BYOD)

program for Senior College students. An ICT working party was established, led by IT manager Hal Douglas, to make recommendations regarding the introduction of computing devices for the 1:1 program for Year 7 students in 2013.

In Senior College, lesson allocations were increased to 12 lessons per cycle in line with notional hours recommended by the Tasmanian Qualifications Authority. This time increase for all Senior College subject enabled teachers to provide additional tuition time for students who were otherwise unable to access support. Religious Education courses were reviewed in 2012 by the ministry team and will be redeveloped for 2013, also providing Senior College students with additional study time.

The introduction of the Australian Curriculum has also heralded a move towards a more consistent approach to reporting across Catholic schools in Tasmania and some necessary adjustments to our reporting format commenced in 2012. Cyclical in-house and interschool moderation practices continue to ensure the quality and

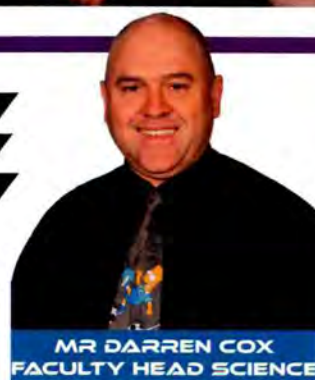
validity of assessment practices as we move towards statewide moderation in ACARA subjects in 2013.

SCIENCE

Our science teachers have nurtured and supported student involvement in a range of forums, competitions, research projects and community engagement activities in 2012.



A key focus in 2012 for the Science Faculty has been the writing and development of units of work to implement the Australian Curriculum, and sourcing resources that will support and enhance innovative and engaging pedagogy. Teaching staff have undertaken a wide variety of professional learning.

The Science Faculty received a grant through the Science and Technology Education Leveraging Relevance Project, including \$1000 from the Australian Academy of Technological Sciences and Engineering, \$4000 worth of science equipment and one day of professional development for two teachers. The aim of the STELR project

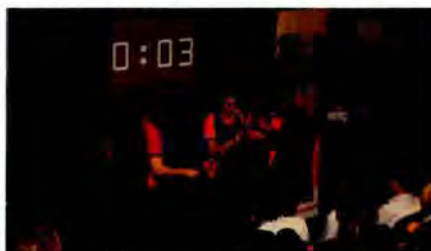
is to increase interest in science and engineering in Australian schools so that it has a flow-on effect for careers in those fields. The equipment purchased this year will enable students to perform a large range of practical investigations in the field of renewable energy, such as production of electricity by wind, solar and water flow, and to engage in thought-provoking investigations that align with the Australian Curriculum.

The Faculty of Science has taken the lead in 2012 in moving towards generating customised electronic science work and text books (eBooks). The aim is to reduce the cost of teaching and learning support materials and to commence the development of

resources in readiness for 1:1 electronic devices, and our new learning management system that will enable students to access materials and work online from home.

With the current transition to the Australian Curriculum, the Science Faculty has focused on developing units of work for Years 7-10 under the three major strands of science understanding, science inquiry skills and science in the human endeavour.

Our science teachers have nurtured and supported student involvement in a range of forums, competitions, research projects and community engagement activities in 2012.



❖ NATIONAL YOUTH SCIENCE FORUM

The National Youth Science Forum is a unique program that provides Year 10 students with the opportunity to gain hands-on science experience and to learn about study options and careers in the diverse fields of science, engineering and technology.

The College had three students attend the national forum; Allison Burgess and William Sikora at the Australian National University, Canberra and Emily Mackrill at the University of Tasmania. All three students lived on-campus as university students, gaining an insider's perspective into campus life and working with scientists at a range of laboratories and workshops.

❖ PICSE SCIENCE INVESTIGATION AWARDS

Lillian Stewart took out third place in the Year 9 section of the UTAS PICSE science investigation awards with her investigation 'Zapped'. Erin Cox was chosen as the People's Choice Award winner for her investigation 'School of Fish'.

❖ TASMANIAN SCIENCE TALENT SEARCH

The College again fared well at the annual Tasmanian Science Talent Search. Year 9 student Jonty Fahey (pictured above) won the intermediate division and was presented with the Rio Tinto Alcan Award, presented to the best three research investigations of the year. Jonty is a state finalist in the BHP Billiton Science Awards, gaining automatic entry into the national BHP Billiton Awards, judged in early 2013.

Gemma Winton was awarded a commendation certificate in the intermediate division in the Tasmanian Science Talent Search, while Joel Philpott, Sam Reugebrink, Varun Kotay, Sienna King and Kurrin McGrath were awarded a merit certificate for their entry in the junior division.

MATHS

In 2012 the Mathematics Faculty implemented the Year 9 Australian Curriculum and focused on preparing for next year's implementation of the Year 10 Australian Curriculum.

To ensure our students will be able to access the new IOA Mathematics course, which provides a specialist maths pathway, a new Year 9 course – Maths Plus – was trialled as an elective, with outstanding success.

Resource development

The development of e-learning capabilities continued in Mathematics with the integration of ClassPAD calculators into the Years 9, 10 and Senior College curricula. The use of an electronic resource package that aligns with 2012 textbooks for interactive simulations, worksheets and unit tests has also been implemented.

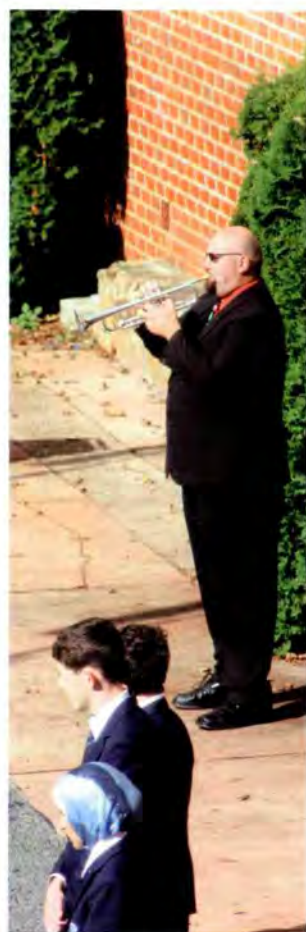

LANGUAGES

The LOTE department endeavours to foster inter-cultural understanding through experiential integrated teaching and learning.

The College has an ongoing commitment to developing student engagement with the wider world and our LOTE department endeavours to foster inter-cultural understanding through experiential integrated teaching and learning programs.

Development of Asian literacy is an essential element of the cross-cultural curriculum perspectives and capabilities. Emersion language experience underpins exchange activities and enhances language acquisition.

In partnership with the Asia Education Foundation's Australia-Indonesia Bridge project, the College hosted two Indonesian teachers from MTsN Pamulang, Indonesia in 2011. Two Marist staff undertook a return exchange in January this year.

Among the many student achievements and highlights in the

LOTE department in 2012, was student use of a free online language program, Language Perfect. Students have access to this online program free of charge at school and at home to hone their language skills. Students answered 210,000 questions on Language Perfect this year.

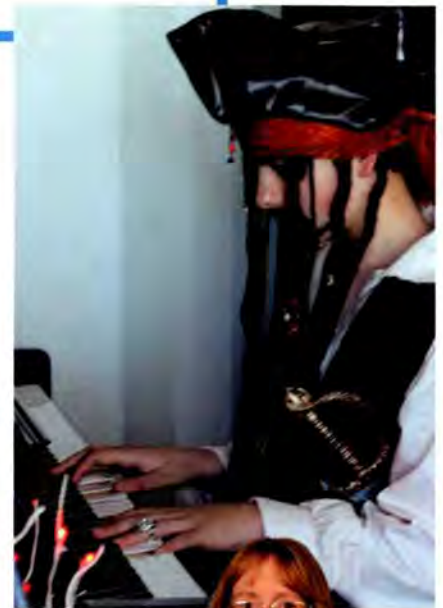

Students were involved in a range of music performances throughout

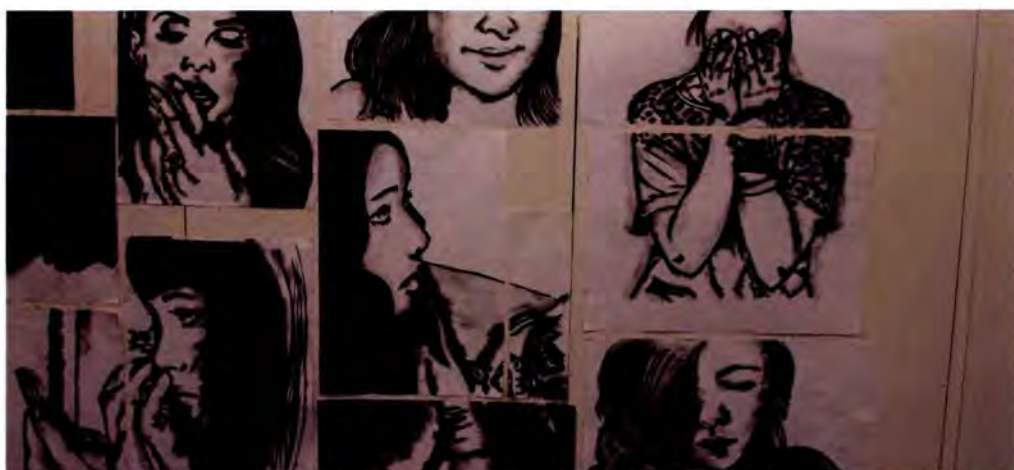

ART

This year Art students enjoyed the opportunity to work in the newly refurbished painting and drawing studio with new lighting and warmth improving the working conditions in this area.

VET

The Vocational Education and Training highlight of 2012 was the official opening of the Cradle Coast Trade Training Centre. This fantastic facility is equipped with an industry-standard bakery, a commercial kitchen, a training restaurant and a cafe.

Vocational and trade based-courses continue to provide opportunities for students to undertake certificate-level courses through the Cradle Coast Trade Training Centre and successful partnerships with other institutions and industry partnerships. Flexibility in the delivery of our VET courses ensures the capacity for students to undertake academic courses alongside vocational training. Vocational programs ensure students acquire job-ready skills and

prepare them for a pathway of lifelong learning.

The CCTTC enables the College to provide industry-standard training for all students in our region. This year the Polytechnic used the facility to run a program for the long-term unemployed. In 2013 the Skills Institute will use the bakery for all bakery apprentices in our region. Also in 2013 we will be welcoming a class from Leighlands Christian School who will be using the

facility for the practical components of their hospitality course.

One of the first major challenges for our students using the CCTTC was the contract to cater for the MSA Netball Carnival, held here at the College in June. The VET students provided afternoon tea for Sunday arrivals, a drinks and tapas evening for officials on Sunday night, morning tea, lunch and afternoon tea for all 60 officials and 180 netballers across three days of competition and a three course meal

for the officials dinner to conclude the carnival.

In other areas of VET at the College, Senior College students participated in Certificate I Construction, where they commenced building a one-bedroom, relocatable house that will be completed in 2013 and then auctioned. There was a 98 per cent completion rate for the Electrocomms students in 2012. All Senior College VET students attained their senior first aid certificate. Year 9 and Year 10 students have participated in an introductory program in hospitality and bakery. All students attaining the minimum of one unit in an associated certificate, some as many as four units.

Other tailored programs have included students participating in hairdressing at St Brendan-Shaw College, horticulture at the Polytechnic, automotive in Smithton, technical production using the sound technology

studio in the music department, library studies (Certificate II online) and animal studies.

In 2012 we listed 32 students undertaking Australian school-based apprenticeships in retail (Cert II & III), hospitality and business.

TECHNOLOGY

This year the Lifestyle, Fashion & Technology students of the Faculty of Technology moved into a refurbished workspace next to the art rooms.

This spacious facility is filled with light and is far more suitable for larger projects than the sewing rooms requisitioned from the former living quarters of the Marist Fathers.

After settling into the new rooms, the students got busy creating a wide range of products. Year 10 students Teneille Wilson and Jayme Beaton achieved second place in the junior division of the Burnie Paper Dress Competition.

Safety in the workspace was a major focus for the year. The Design in Wood and Design in Metal students completed workspace inductions using Oguard, an online occupational, health and safety program. The faculty plans to expand the use of this valuable learning tool in 2013, with home economics students coming on board with the program.

A new vinyl cutter has been used consistently this year in CAD. CAD has

organised new online versions of 3D Studio Max and is also looking at the possible acquisition of a 3D printer, all of which will be ready to use in 2013.

A major goal for the Technology Faculty in 2012 has been to encourage more students to develop a folio of work compiled over their years of practice in the various technology courses on offer at the College. More students are finishing with comprehensive folios that include their design ideas, photographic evidence of their work and written appraisals; many of these having been compiled over the past two years. Students are also honing their ICT skills in completing their folios. The concept of a design brief is also flowing over into Food Technology programs, which were updated to accommodate this way of showcasing student achievement.

Prospective student enrolments for the Technology Faculty are on the increase with additional CAD and Lifestyle, Fashion and Technology classes being established in 2013. Technology added a pre-tertiary Food and Nutrition course for Senior College students this year, which will be retained in 2013.

A new co-curricular initiative was implemented this year in the form of **Stitched** workshops. The aim of the workshops was to involve the wider College community in fashion and technology. The three workshops, which were held on Saturdays, were well attended by students, parents, staff and their friends and family, with the last workshop attracting sixteen participants. This initiative will continue in 2013. ■

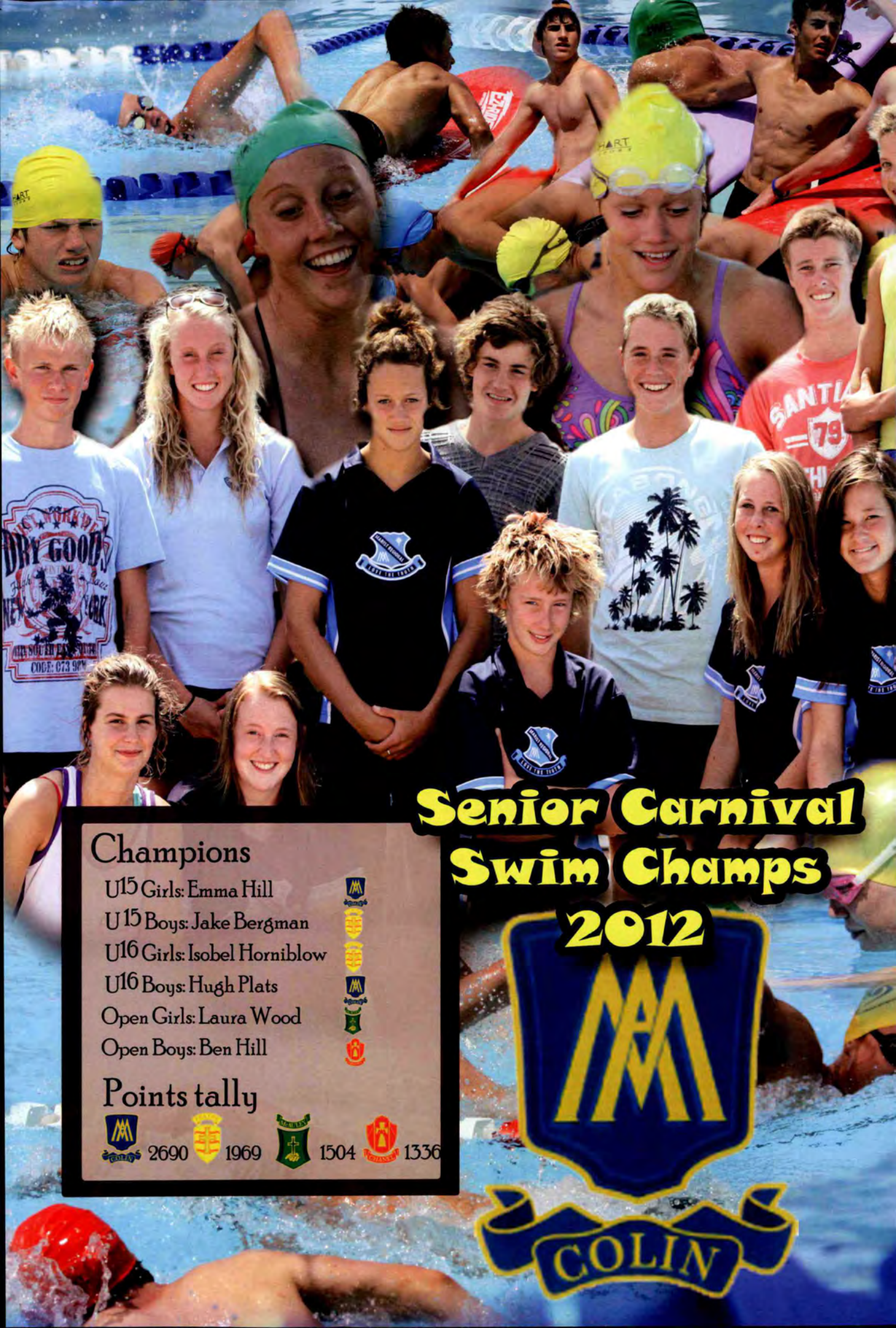

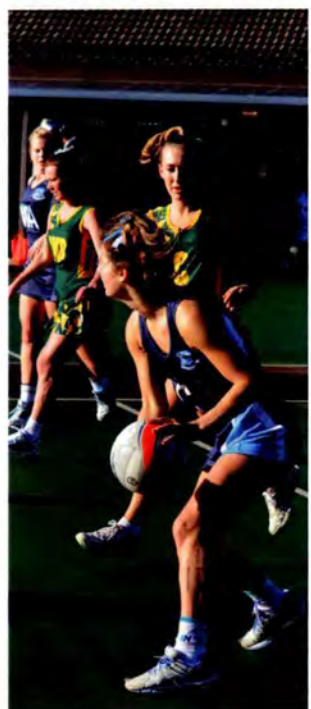

Wood led the 'golden boot' award as the team's most consistent scorer.

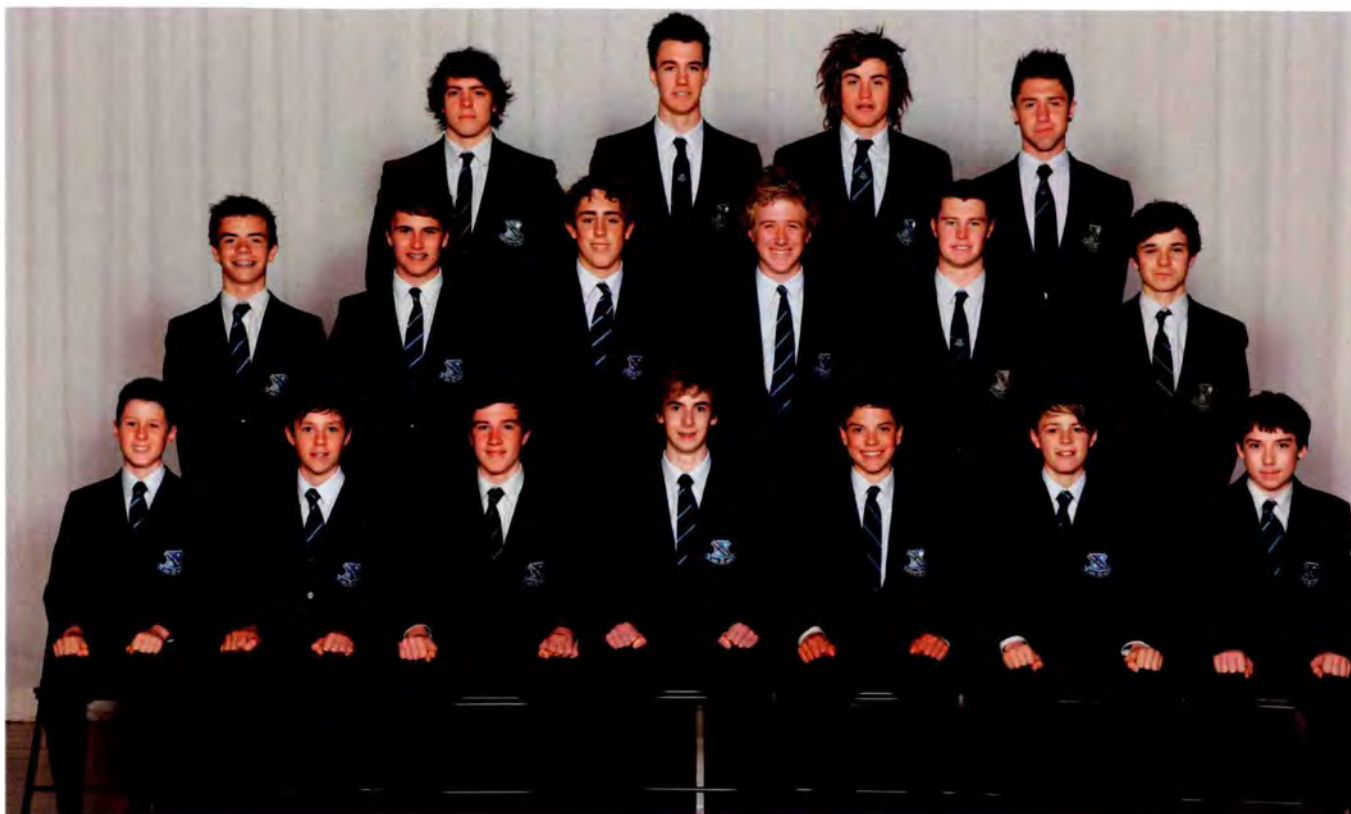

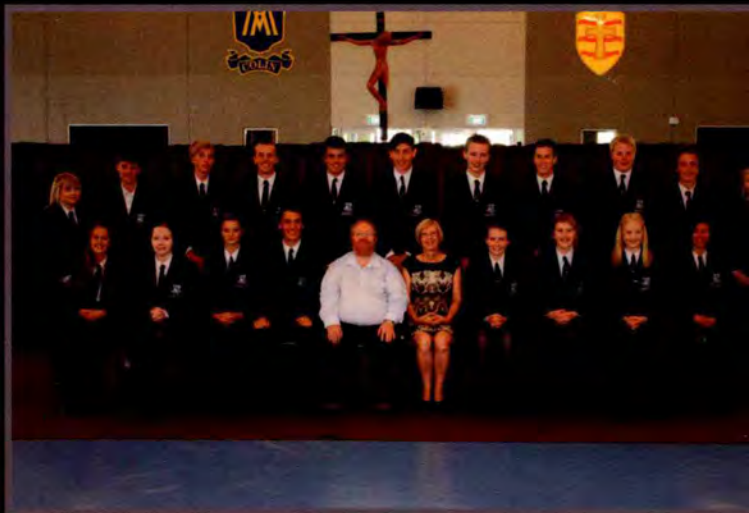
