

KALORI – Message Stick

Over tens of thousands of years, message sticks were used by our indigenous ancestors as a way of communicating between different tribes and nations. A series of lines, circles and dots were inscribed onto round or flat sticks. These inscriptions were not a form of writing, but the symbols did possess a significance understood by both sender and receiver. Any messenger carrying a kalori across unfamiliar territory was guaranteed safe passage and the kalori was a guarantee that the bearer was telling the truth.

The Kalori has been the traditional way of passing on messages about our College since 1972.



Principal's Report



ARCHBISHOP'S REPORT



The Distinctiveness of a Catholic School

What makes a Catholic school different from other schools? In choosing to send your child to a Catholic school what was it that attracted you?

Was it the quality of the education that the school offered? Was it the evident dedication of the teaching staff? Was it the sense that Catholic schools offered value formation for your child? Was it the positive atmosphere of the school? Was it the pastoral care that the school offered?

It could be any or all of these, and it could be other reasons that prompted you to make this decision. You chose to send your child to a Catholic school because you felt that, in some way, it was distinctive and offered something of value in the education and formation of your child.

Catholic schools, of course, are a work of the Catholic Church. The Church has been at the forefront of education since its earliest days. It has always seen that education offers a person an important opportunity for their human formation.

In more recent centuries, particularly with the rise of the Industrial Revolution, the Church has seen the need to offer education as a means to help young people rise out of depressed and difficult economic and social situations. Many of the religious orders that established schools in Tasmania did so to ensure poor Catholic families had access to education.

Our Catholic Schools still ensure that there is a preferential option for the poor. Pope Francis has often spoken of this aspect of the service of the Church to society. The Church is committed to serving those who are in socially disadvantaged situations.

Catholic Schools in Tasmania do not turn away a student if their family is unable to pay the fees.

While this is a very important policy of our Catholic schools, it is also important to remember that Catholic schools were founded, not simply out of a desire to educate the poor but, more fundamentally, out of a desire to offer children the opportunity to grow in their Catholic faith. This is, ultimately, what our schools are about. Faith is vital to the direction of a person's life. What we believe shapes our attitudes and our actions. The Catholic faith offers a sure foundation for the development of character and the embrace of values that inspire the way we live.

The Christian faith has played a central role in the development of Western Civilisation as we know it today. At the heart of Christianity, of course, is a person, Jesus Christ. We are followers, disciples of Jesus. Christian teachings and beliefs about the nature of God and human life are not abstract theoretical principles, rather, they arise from the life and teachings of Jesus. Christianity is not a theory, it is a way of life.

The Christian life is shaped by some key foundational beliefs. Thus, we believe in God, "the Father Almighty, creator of heaven and earth", who is both loving and just. We believe that the God who created us has a provident design for how human life should be lived. Thus, God revealed the Ten Commandments to Moses and Jesus offers a whole body of teaching which, as he said,

does not abolish the law but completes it. We believe in the resurrection and life everlasting.

Catholic schools do not just offer values education, but seek to form students to live a Christian life. They do this by imparting to students a knowledge of God and human life inspired by the Sacred Scriptures.

What makes a Catholic school distinctive is that it seeks not simply to educate but to form the whole person in the Christian way of life so that they might fully flourish as a human person.

It is important people understand and are aware of this distinctive feature of Catholic education, particularly when there is such a focus on the purely academic dimension of schools. Catholic schools are not simply about marks and grades. Although these are important, they are concerned about the formation of the whole person and ultimately, their eternal destination and happiness.

BOARD REPORT

I thoroughly enjoyed the year of 2015, my first year as Chairman of the Board at Marist Regional College. I have relished the opportunity of working alongside the Board members in the execution of their duties. I am greatly respectful of their expertise, dedication and passion that they bring to the execution of their roles.

We commenced the year by making sure that the Board members were fully aware of the mission and vision of Marist Regional College as a Catholic school and explored what this meant in the context of our College community at this time. We also took the opportunity to re-visit the role of the College Board and to determine how best we can support the Principal, the College and the Governing Council in the College to achieve its aims.

At the beginning of the year, the College Board decided to recommence a building Master Plan, given that the completion of the Middle Years' project had seen substantial inroads into the previous Master Plan. To ensure this was done in a manner that was both exhaustive and also caught the full voice in the community, we engaged architects, 6TY, to carry out the consultation phase. It saw contributions from the staff, students and parent population and provided an opportunity for the broader Burnie population to contribute as well. At the time of writing this report, we have just signed off on the final version of the Master Plan which has now gone to publication. We are particularly pleased with the outcomes that have been achieved throughout this process.

Significant work has also occurred around the population demographics of Marist Regional College and what that will mean in terms of the future. We utilised the Burnie City Council and the Cradle Coast Authority in helping us to determine where the areas of growth will be and also look for opportunities for increasing our service provisions to the community. We have also been involved at a College base level understanding the operational vision for the College in terms of the learning and teaching practice that occurs. We are pleased that the College has embarked on a learning and teaching program that is both rigorous and backed by the use of data to inform the practice. We are confident that the direction being taken by the College will ensure that the young people who attend are given the best possible learning opportunities that are available.

The Board this year has also looked through a number of policies around learning and teaching, assessment and reporting and general College operations. We have been able to see a rotation of policies through this time to make sure that the Board is both across these and that they are ratified for execution at a College level.

The College continues to perform extremely well in all external standardised measures, including NAPLAN, TCE and TASC data. The College has also embarked on the implementation of a new student information system which will enable it to run its operations more easily and with greater capacity.

Marist Regional College remains in an extremely strong position, both in community reputation and in practice. We are truly grateful to have a College community that both respects and esteems education as the greatest gift for young people. We look forward to the commencement of 2016 as the College goes from strength to strength.

I thank the College Board members. Wayne Licht, Richard Rozendaal, Kevin O'Daly, Sonia Guizzo, Anne Wood, Anthony Stewart, Fr John Girdauskas, Lynette Purton, Adrian Drane, Rod Tremayne and Tess McDonagh. Their dedication, service and support of me as Chair of Marist Regional College Board has been unfailing.

One of our first challenges for the SRC of 2015 was to devise a motto to be used across the whole College community. In one sentence we were required to articulate the Catholic tradition of Marist Regional College, its values, as well as, the values of the current crop of College councilors.

In turn, we challenged the College community to 'Accept and Respect all of God's Creation.' The words 'accept' and 'respect' neatly summarised the values and ideas that each SRC member held regarding our interactions with each other and the environment around us. Equality, social justice and respect were values shared by some 28 College Councillors from five year levels. The motto also gave us a standard to adhere to and governed the way we interacted within our day-to-day lives at Marist.

We were challenged again and again throughout the year.

We were challenged to organise 'Pancake Day' in under 24 hours. The academic year was in full swing, NSATIS sports had started up for another year and, as an SRC, we

were already in the process of organising the College's Commencement Mass. In this chaos of the new school year we completely overlooked an event that most students take as a given. A quick group meeting the day before Shrove Tuesday and we set to work, all theories of leadership and service becoming practical or obsolete. We became chefs, advertising gurus and shameless spruikers. We prepared a reasonable amount of pancake mix from scratch and collected a ridiculous amount of lemons. We were sold out within ten minutes and faced with the reality that, what felt to us like a momentous achievement, would largely be taken for granted as another event on the school calendar. As a team, however, this experience was formative. It helped us realise that things do not happen unless a group of people work hard behind the scenes to make it happen. Though a relatively trivial exercise, Shrove Tuesday was a humbling experience.

We were challenged to reinstate the carnival vibe and inclusive culture of the College's Feast Day. The success of the day owed much to the consultative planning process between the SRC, the staff and the students. We encouraged staff to brainstorm and coordinate activities that they themselves were passionate about, and this passion was reflected in the incredible commitment to making the day a success. The SRC found that, if we trusted the student body to engage in the planning of Feast Day as well as the day itself, they could trust us to organise activities they could look forward to. As a result, Feast Day attendance rose to regular

school day levels and, a precedent, was established for how school events could be run in the future. We couldn't have achieved such a day without the participation and commitment of all involved.

We were challenged by the very real problem of students coming to school in the morning without having eaten breakfast. In partnership with staff, the Parents & Friends Association, and volunteers, we implemented a Breakfast Club that operated from the Harcombe kitchen every school morning. The nonjudgmental atmosphere of the Breakfast Club gave us another avenue to interact with fellow students while addressing an issue that is prevalent across Australia's schools, irrespective of socioeconomic situation. I hope the Breakfast Club continues for as long as there is a need for it.

The Marist culture has left an indelible mark on my own values and perspectives, and I sincerely hope the SRC of 2015 will leave our own unique stamp on the Marist tradition and culture. It has been an incredible privilege to work with 27 talented and selfless leaders and an honour to represent such a bold and unique student body.




PAT BISSETT

Mission and Ministry

"I would like to tell you all the little cheering things that God permits to fall in our way."

Catherine McAuley in a letter to de Pazzi Delaney, 1837

One wonders what "little cheering things" Catherine McAuley was referring to in her letter to de Pazzi Delaney. 1837 falls in the period of expansion for the Sisters of Mercy with two convents being opened in this year alone. One can imagine a great deal of challenges as well as cheers during this time.

So it has been for Marist Regional College in 2015, a year of "little charming things" that we are grateful to have received as a result of God's grace.

Fr Rob's Visit

Ask students what "charming little thing" they remember about 2015 and it is guaranteed to be the visit of Fr Rob Galea. Fr Rob is a world renowned singer, songwriter and young priest based in the Sandhurst Diocese of Victoria. This year he was a contestant on the X-Factor and spends much of his year travelling around the world performing and speaking at Christian/Catholic events. Fr Rob, accompanied by his guitarist Zeb, spent two days at the College! Over the course of his visit Fr Rob spoke to students, staff and Years 5 and 6 students from our feeder primary schools. His personal testimony, interspersed with music, was engaging for all who sat in Conway. Although not all of us were sitting for long as Fr Rob had us up and dancing. The results of Fr Rob's visit continued to be felt, as a fortnight after his visit the whole North-West Coast was singing his music at the Catholic Education Week Mass we hosted. In 2016 we will be exploring the prospect of introducing Fr Rob's "Stronger" parish based youth program.

Prayer Life, Liturgies and Masses

We gathered together a number of times to celebrate mass, raise our voices in prayer, and reflect during liturgies. The traditional masses and liturgies included:

- Ash Wednesday
- Commencement Mass
- Holy Week Liturgy
- Feast Day
- Graduation Liturgy

We also celebrated:

- Year 12 Vale Mass with all Year 12 students at the Star of the Sea Catholic Church in Burnie.
- Remembrance Mass with staff, students and members of the College community in memory of deceased staff and students.
- **Eucharist** in the Chapel every Wednesday morning for staff, students and the community.

Retreating for Renewal

The Retreat program at Marist Regional College started in February with the Year 12 Retreat. This year it was held at Camp Clayton and, with a final year of schooling to go, students could not wait for the fun to begin. The two day retreat was based on the theme, 'Running your own Race'. With this in mind, students were given many opportunities to challenge themselves, work together in teams, reflect on their time at Marist and set some goals for the future.

The next retreat was with Year 7 students as part of Year 7 Camp. Held in the evenings, the program was based on the theme 'We Belong Together'. Members of the SRC helped to keep the atmosphere light-hearted as they organised games and shared dinner together. Students were welcomed to the College and Catholic communities. They were given the opportunity to think about what they wanted from the next six years.

The Year 11 Retreat, 'Leadership at its Best', was a one day event held at Camp Clayton, Ulverstone. The highlight of the day was the panel of speakers who came to inspire, encourage and give advice to our new Senior College Students. From the panel discussion, students were then asked to reflect on what leadership is through a range of activities.

As part of the Year 10 Week, 'Living Justly' was the Year 10 Retreat which was held at the College. It was an eye opening experience for many students as they experienced for themselves how hard it can be to survive in the world. This was done through simulation activities that focused on the complex and interconnected issues relating to poverty. Jeremy Picone, from A Fairer World presented 'I am a Global Citizen', which was designed to raise awareness and educate students about extreme poverty. Students were genuinely inspired by the concept of being a global citizen and felt empowered as individuals to do something in relation to ending extreme poverty.

MISSION AND MINISTRY

In Term 3 Year 9 students participated in their retreat, 'Keep Bouncing'. This retreat was based on learning about, and developing skills in, resilience. Students progressed through a range of activities that were designed to initially seem impossible, like finding a specific toothpick in a mountain of toothpicks and completing a water relay using a colander. From these activities students were asked to reflect and develop skills including emotional awareness, self-regulation, impulse control, optimism, flexible and accurate thinking, empathy and self-efficacy. As well as building resilience skills Year 9 students were introduced to the Remar Program.

The final retreat for the year was 'Accepting Diversity' for Year 8. The day started with an activity that involved 4 students being blindfolded and given a set of verbal instructions about how to fold a piece of paper. At the end of the task, each student's paper looked slightly different, reinforcing the message that everyone is different and unique in their own way. From this, students were then engaged in a range of activities challenging their thoughts on diversity.

The retreat program proved, once again, to be a fantastic way to encourage students to work with new people, to take time to reflect on oneself, to be inspired, to consider the world that we live in and to remind us all that Jesus is present in our day to day lives.

Faith in Action

2015 has been a particularly inspiring year with so many students taking up one of the many opportunities to get involved, get informed and make a difference. Participation in ministry and service has proved to be a very valuable and rewarding experience for students, not to mention for the organisations and people we help!

The year has been a massive year for fundraising at MRC! The College has raised and donated over \$5000 to different organisations.

Our first community event was Relay for Life which was held at the Penguin Athletics Centre. It was fantastic to see over 50 students participating and raised vital funds for the Cancer Council of Tasmania.

Over 100 students took up the opportunity to live in someone else's shoes by participating in the 'Live Below the Line' challenge, the 40 Hour Famine or the Solidarity Sleep-out. There were 10 courageous participants who took on the challenge to live in solidarity with those who live below the poverty line by surviving on \$1 a day (for food). Another 15 students participated in the 40 Hour Famine which meant they spent a weekend in August without something vital to them like food, transport, sight, furniture, etc. To further

support the 40 Hour Famine campaign, we held a poverty lunch designed to introduce students to the different proportions of food that people receive around the world. Students were shocked when learning that only 15% of the world's population are able to afford a nutritious daily diet. In an effort to raise awareness about homelessness in the community, an evening 'Solidarity Sleep-out' was held. It was a fantastic night that engaged students and provided an insight into homelessness.

MISSION AND MINISTRY

In an effort to capitalise on the enthusiasm and passion of Year 7 and 8 students, a new program was offered – 'Young Vinnies'. Fifteen students from across the two year levels worked together to hold three great events. The first was a bag drive, for which students were asked to bring along nonperishable food items to be donated to St Vincent de Paul. This was a great success, with loads of boxes donated! The major event was a movie night at the Metro Cinema in Burnie, for a screening of Oddball. A lot of hard work preparing for the event saw the cinema almost at capacity and a handy cheque to give to the St Vincent de Paul Society of Tasmania. As a final initiative Young Vinnies held a competition to get loose change donated for the campaign, 'Turn on the Tap', which is run by an organisation aiming to reduce water related diseases around the world. All members of the Young Vinnies team worked extremely hard to do what they could and help make a difference in our world.

Where the community needed help, we were there — putting our faith into action by supporting various charities and organisations in our local community. This has included volunteering twice a month to operate City Kitchen, a service that provides food to lonely, hungry and homeless individuals, and marginalised families on the coast. Approximately 20 students have been involved with this service. As in previous years, there were seven students who participated in the Smith Family Reading

Program, a program that pairs our students with a younger student who is struggling with their reading. There were also 10 students who helped out the Cancer Council on Daffodil Day by selling daffodil merchandise.

Remar

At the beginning of the year we welcomed another group of eager rowers into our College's Remar community, and at the end of the year celebrated as another joined the illustrious alumni of the broader Remar community.

In 2015 Remar continued its strong tradition of forming young people for a life of leadership and service. We were proud to see a Gold Rower, and previous Remar students, being elected to the SRC — evidence of the program's emphasis on leadership development. The same will be the case in 2016.

The Reds, now known as "Hearts of Lotus", were the only caravel to "embark" in the traditional way with a camp. This was held at Camp Banksia. All caravels participated in the process of embarkation which involves getting to know the other rowers in the caravel, becoming familiar with the motto and values for the year, and committing to the journey.

Over the course of the year each caravel has met regularly to talk about issues

relating to leadership and faith, undertaken massive amounts of outreach and community service and planned various fundraising events (for charities).

Remar is a challenging program requiring significant commitment from students. Every student that has been involved in 2015 has shown remarkable personal growth, proving that you really do only get out what you put in!



As each year concludes, my thoughts often travel in two different directions — one in reflection about the year that has been and the other in anticipation for the year to come. In reflection, I can say with confidence that 2015 has been a year of strength, confidence and achievement.

Our students have achieved, academically, at a level sometimes three times the expected national average. Their results at the end of the year represent the dedication, hard work and tenacity that has been a feature of the cohort since their very early days in the school. Their achievements also extend beyond the classroom, with many gaining distinction and high distinction grades in national mathematics, science and english competitions; victories at the Burnie Eisteddfod and state and national representations in a wide variety of sporting pursuits.

A key feature of our graduating Year 12 students has been their ability to diversify their learning. Many students gained nationally accredited certificates through our TAFE Training Centre in the areas of Construction, Tourism, Kitchen Operations, Retail Bakery and many more. Indeed, it needs to be noted that some students who gained TAFE Certificates also achieved University entry ATAR scores of 75+ indicating that our students have a keen

eye for what the future requires from an educational perspective.

As the year progressed our students contributed greatly to the cultural life of the school. Despite the pressures of studies, record numbers involved themselves in the Arts Festival and the Music Tour to Queensland, the French Trip and Comicon in San Diego. At a more subtle level, many forged strong bonds of friendship with our younger students through assisting in sports coaching, studies and mentoring in many areas. Perhaps indicative of the passion for the school our students have were the Feast Day activities co-ordinated by the SRC.

From the start of the year, the SRC was determined to bring forward their desire for a more unified school population and this was certainly achieved on Feast Day. Record numbers of students signed up for and attended activities on what has been hailed as one of the most successful Feast Days in years. The SRC is to be congratulated on their hard work throughout the year and they have certainly

laid strong foundations for future Councils to build upon.

I must convey my deepest and heartfelt thanks to all the staff who supported the 2015 Senior College students. The measure of your success is the weight of their achievements, and there have been many! As I conclude my reflection on the 2015 year, my thoughts do travel to the future - what will 2016 bring? Having had the privilege of spending a week at the Marist Youth Leader conference at Lismore with next year's incoming senior SRC members and witnessing their connectedness and vision for the future of the school I am certain that 2016 will be just as exciting as the year given to us by our 2015 students. 

Year 9

This year we had fewer camps running than usual, however, for the first time in a number of years all camps required students to spend the three nights in tents and supply and prepare their own meals. waters and white sand beaches while Derby allowed some to visit what is fast becoming a mountain biking Mecca in Tasmania. The camps were a great opportunity for

positive or praising in regard the positive attitudes of the kids to be involved and try new things.

Overall, it has been another extraordinary year for an amazing group of students who are fast becoming young adults. It will be my great pleasure to see what awaits them as their coordinator again in 2016.





This is facilitated by developing units of work that provide a framework of learning that encourages students to become creative, critical and reflective thinkers.

The rigorous Year 7 Curriculum strives to incorporate learning experiences for students that connect the content studied to their lives and the world around them. In Science, when learning about renewable and non-renewable resources, students constructed houses (to scale) which had to include three renewable resources such as solar panels, insulation, and water tanks to name a few. This was then integrated into Mathematics where they used their measurement and finance skills. These findings were then utilised in Humanities and Social Science where they designed and built their own communities (and running of their town) that incorporated their knowledge and understanding from all units.

In one of the Geography units, students created different types of water innovations.

The skills acquired in these types of activities encourage students to pursue creativity and originality when developing unique designs.

Throughout the year during designated lesson times, Mrs Catherine Woodberry ran sessions exposing the students to interactive programs such as Padlet and Kahoot, and other modes of communicating knowledge and understanding, including the use of Minecraft to represent their findings about Roman Architecture.

In an attempt to further stimulate the Year 8 cohort's desire to take responsibility for their own learning, steps were put into place for them to become more independent in their educational journey. One of the units undertaken in English was Media and Persuasion in which they designed, planned, edited and published their own magazines. It is through tasks like this that they, as learners, strive to become inquirers, thinkers, communicators, risk-takers and to be reflective.

During the Geology unit in Science, students visited three locations in Burnie to observe rock formations and to identify the different types of rock around these areas. This experience was organised for them to learn how to apply what they learn in class, to the real-world.

Medieval Day is a celebration of the content learnt through the History units of Medieval Europe and the Black Death. Throughout the day the students and teachers participated in medieval activities like the construction of trebuchets, calligraphy, stain glass windows, medieval games, archery and Troubadours. At lunch time we shared combinations of roast chicken, vegetables, fruit and bread for a memorable medieval feast. The day concluded with an interactive presentation by "The Dragon's Realm" about medieval weapons.

The Literacy Program this year focused on building the fundamental English skills of numerous Year 7 students. Set programs were developed by Mrs Kerrie Flynn who together with other teachers, ran a number of Literacy groups assisting those students who required extra support. Throughout this program, students also used Literacy Planet as a means of developing their skills in reading and writing.

Service Week was a fantastic opportunity for both students and teachers to contribute to their surrounding communities. Students were empowered by activities such as working with children at childcare facilities or at primary schools, working with the residents of Umina Park and Yaraandoo, helping the environment at Ulverstone, Burnie and Wynyard, making penguin burrows, clearing and building of a mountain bike track in Penguin, knitting trauma teddies, baking biscuits, making jewellery, photography, gardening and setting up a stall to sell their products in order to support their chosen charity - the Cancer Council. It was evident that they saw the benefits of being involved, helping others and realising that it doesn't take much to put a smile on someone's face. The students' incredible enthusiasm and eagerness throughout the week highlighted the positive attitudes in which they approached the whole idea of service to others.



Pastoral Wellbeing

Pastoral Care within the school continues to look at ways of providing a safe and welcoming environment for the students.

The Pastoral Care Program focusses on issues that are related to each specific year level.



Year 7 - 10 Students attended a performance by Brainstorm Productions entitled Cyberia. Cyberia covers a number of issues that students face online including: Cyber Bullying, Internet Security, Alienation, Responsible Use of Technology, Internet Addiction and Online Reputation. The performance explored the internet use of two siblings (Ruby and Tim) and how they coped with their online interactions with the world. They indulged in cyber bullying and anti-social behaviour which created havoc in their real world. Once they had realised the mistakes they had made, it was too late to undo what they had done. Their actions had implications for their relationships with others, their reputation and their privacy. Cyberia is designed to make students think

about what they are putting online and some of the consequences that could occur.

Students also attended a Motivational Media session entitled Jigsaw. The presentation was based around the stories of five people and the challenges that they have faced in their lives. Throughout the five different stories there is a focus on making choices and deciding on which ones will lead to the results that we want. There were five overarching themes when dealing with choice — having a vision, knowing ourselves, accepting others, making good decisions and overcoming difficulties.

An initiative introduced by our Youth Health Nurse, Kiona Fitzpatrick, was Fresh Faced Friday, which is a youth created initiative inviting the nation to 'Tear up' their negative thoughts and become body and selfpositive. The aim of Fresh Faced Friday is to support young people to feel confident with who they are.

The Year 7 and 8 students continued to focus on resilience and wellbeing. Within their Pastoral Care Sessions they looked at



belonging, identity, team building, values, respect and creating positive environments. These sessions allowed the students to build their self-worth and wellbeing.

Year 9 Pastoral Care explored topics such as decision making, pathway planning, impact of social media and study skills. The Year 9 Students once again organised a Day for Daniel which is aimed at raising the awareness of Child Safety within the community.

Year 10 Students participated in a driver awareness program, a careers program and Young Guns. Young Guns is an interactive health information program where students had access to a number of Government and Non-government agencies to explore different aspects of their overall health.

Our Senior College students focussed on a number of different topics within their Pastoral Care Program this year. These included essay writing skills, practical motor mechanics, study skills, careers education, time management and general health and wellbeing.

I would like to thank the Pastoral Care Team for their dedicated work in assisting students to develop their health and wellbeing. In particular, I would like to thank Mrs Chelsea Gale, Mrs Fiona Hamilton, Mr John Hamilton and Mrs Bernadette Smith who have work tirelessly for the College over a number of years on the Pastoral Care Team.

Learning and Teaching

This year has proven to be another very rewarding academic year for Marist Regional College. The outstanding achievements of our students across all learning areas continues to show the depth of our academic program.

Implementation of the Australian Curriculum continued to be a central focus at the College and in 2015. We reported to the Australian Curriculum, achievement standards for Geography and Health and Physical Education, in addition to English, History, Mathematics and Science.

Much learning occurs parallel to formal classes and students have achieved wonderful success in academic competitions. This year Angus Thomson was acknowledged for his outstanding effort and medal winning achievement for Year 12 English in the University of New South Wales (UNSW) 2015 International Competitions and Assessments for Schools. The College also provides students with a variety of opportunities to extend their learning and skills through co-curricular programs and events such as the French Trip and the Digital Media trip to Comic Com.

YEAR 7-10 RESULTS

A large number of students across Years 7-10 were recognised at our Evening of Excellence, receiving Academic Excellence Awards. General excellence award winners and the dux of each year level are listed in the Prize List at the end of the Kalori. Outstanding student achievements in each Year 10 Subject were also acknowledged, with 20 students receiving a subject prize and some students winning multiple.

SENIOR COLLEGE RESULTS

Senior College results in 2015 provided much to celebrate, as both our Year 11 and 12 students continued to achieve outstanding results. The highest university entrance ranking or Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR) at the College was awarded to Connor Doherty, 99.7, making him the College Dux. Samuel Wilson and Lachlan Mason also achieved a score above 99 placing them in the top 1% of Australia with 17% of Year 12 students achieving an ATAR over 90, and 29% achieving an ATAR over 80. Samuel Wilson was awarded the Science and Mathematics Prize for his outstanding results. Angus Thomson was awarded the Humanities Prize for his outstanding results in Humanities subjects.

The Year 11 Dux, Georgia Whiteley, achieved outstanding results in her TASC level 3 subjects. Six Year 11 students: Georgia Whiteley, Seniya Wijewardena, Varun Kotay, Austin Roberts, Sinead Freeman and Mali Mai, all achieved a TE score of over 40 for the best two Level 3 subjects.

A large number of students successfully completed VET qualifications with Tyler-Jane Quarrell awarded the Outstanding VET student of the Year Award.

NAPLAN

NAPLAN was conducted in May for all Year 7 and 9 students. Our results indicate that the College performed extremely well in comparisons between our school and the results from all Tasmanian and Australian schools.

The percentage of Year 7 students at the College achieving at, or above, the national minimum standard, was higher in the majority of the testing disciplines than the percentage of students from all Tasmanian and Australian Schools. Only in Spelling were we on a par with the Australian results. This is the fourth year in a row that our results for the Year 7 cohort have scored higher or on a par with their peers from around the country when comparing the students at, or above, the national minimum standard.

Our Year 9 cohort also achieved a higher percentage for students at, or above, the national minimum standard when comparing their collective results against all other Tasmanian and Australian schools. This is the second time we have been above for all testing disciplines. A major improvement has been achieved in the Writing discipline for this year. A strong focus in the school in this area over the last two years has resulted in our students achieving 11% higher than the result for Tasmanian schools. This is a fantastic achievement. This is coupled with a strong showing in the Spelling results, where we achieved 9% more students gaining results above the national minimum standard compared to other Tasmanian schools.

In our country, I see a common floccinaucinihilipilification of women. By the age of fourteen, many girls feel they need to 'grow up'. They begin wearing makeup and provocative clothing. Many girls want to have a boyfriend and see that as life's ultimate goal. They are influenced by males' attitudes, the media and society's unfair expectations, judgements and stereotypes. For this reason, I would, as Prime Minister, launch a Gender Empowerment Program for all Year Eight students. This program would be divided into single sex groupings. For young women, it would teach them that they are not, and should not, be dictated to by anyone.

However, this issue not only affects females; males are also affected by gender inequality and stereotypes. As a student, I see many young men affected by this issue as society assumes that men cannot be sensitive and have feelings. This misleading concept can lead to males feeling alone, and, sometimes, to self-harm and suicide. In fact, as cited from 'Mindframe' in 2013, 1885 males (as opposed to 639 females) died as a result of suicide. I think this appalling epidemic needs to be stopped. Men need to feel accepted and feel free to display their emotions.

My program would be organised into single sex groups following a relationship focused education, which would have respect at its centre. It would confront issues such as violence against women to try and tackle this issue at an age when teenagers are still developing their moral code. Teachers, as well as local experts (police, counsellors and health professionals), would run this program.

In addition, I would encourage young women to be involved in leadership positions in their schools and communities.

In conclusion, as Prime Minister I would establish scholarships for young, rural women aged between twelve and eighteen to give them hope and aspirations for their futures as leaders of our country.

Humanities

Humanities and Social Sciences had an event filled and historically significant year. Firstly, March 31st marked the unveiling of a plinth at the Burnie Park for Burnie born soldier, Corporal Cameron Baird VC MG, who was killed in Afghanistan in 2013 during a firefight with the Taliban. Students attending the ceremony were reminded that people who have given service to their country are appreciated and remembered for their bravery.

The 25th of April was the one hundredth anniversary of the Australian and New Zealand forces landing at Gallipoli. Angelique Woodward, student and highest ranking female army cadet on the North West Coast, coordinated a window display and whole school commemorative service, including visits from squadron leaders and the presentation of a Lone Pine tree from ex-serviceman Ron Clark. This was followed by a visit from Joan Wylie, Ambassador for the 2016 Frank MacDonald Memorial Prize. Joan presented a series of photographs taken on her 2015 trip through the battle grounds of World War One.

The Australian History Competition was held in May and for the first time all of the Year Ten students participated along with voluntary entries from other grades. Congratulations to Kate Djakic for her high distinction and Phoebe Djakic, Ruby Doherty, Tallulah Eaves, Sophie Elphinstone, Gabrielle Gee, Georgia Hugen, Oliver Malley, Callum Somerville, Nathan Williams, Aaron Woo, Stephanie Wylie, Rayyan Baig and Angelina Bassett for receiving distinctions.

Alec Rawlings and Phoebe Rouse represented the school at the Rotary Model United Nations Assembly in Deloraine and were awarded first prize for their choice of costume.

May also saw Connor Doherty and Mathew Schmidt receiving distinctions in the University of New South Wales Economics Competition, and the Senior College Legal Studies class gained insight into the criminal justice system with a visit from a criminal lawyer working for Legal Aid.

In June, the Legal Studies class and a selection of students from Years 9 and 10 attended a UTas presentation by Gail Mabo, the daughter of famous Indigenous Rights campaigner Eddie Mabo.

UTAS lecturer, lan McFarline, presented a series of photographs in July and brought local aboriginal lifestyles to the attention of Year 9

students, revealing some little known factual information including the hardships endured by the aboriginal women.

The Senior College Economics class had the 2015 Federal Budget justified when Brett Whiteley MP visited in August. Additionally, they participated in the second round of the ASX Schools Share Market Game. However, it was the Year 10 Business and Economics class that demonstrated the better investment skills with Shainah Hine coming in the top twenty Tasmanian players.

Thanks to the Burnie Pioneer Village Museum, the Year 9 Students were able to literally smell the trench foot suffered in World War One when they visited the 100 Years: 100 Objects exhibition in September.

Senior College Geography students completed the field work component of their Case study on the Rubicon Estuary. After researching population changes and changing land-use patterns they completed practical investigations into the impacts of urbanisation, climate change, and land use on biodiversity, water resources, cultural and natural heritage, marine environments and the atmosphere.

September is Law Fest month and the Senior College Legal Studies class made the trip to Hobart in order to participate. To supplement this they attended a sitting at the local Magistrates Court.

Starrs Productions toured in October and enthralled the Years 9 and 10 with presentations entitled 'Fighting the Kaiser' and 'Fighting

for it', based on real stories involving the Australian experiences of World War One and Two.

The year came to a close with a series of class based activities; one of the highlights being Mrs Kerr's Year 10 History class looking at the post-war period and the emergence of popular culture. Slogans and movements in the 50s, 60s and 70s prompted the creation of 'hippie' shirts.

Religion

YEAR 7 RELIGION

Year 7 – the grand initiation year – where we aim to introduce students to all the skills and knowledge they will need to have a successful Secondary School journey. Students arrive at the beginning of each year at varying levels of religious understanding, so we feel it important to start off with the basics, to ensure students are not left behind. We started with an introduction to Marist Regional College, exploring the history, values, motto, crest and house patrons, and discussing that all important feeling of belonging. Students were then presented with an overview of the Catholic Faith, covering areas such as God, Jesus, Church, Scripture, Sacraments, Prayer, Christian Life, and Religion and Society. These eight elements form the basis of our Religious Education Curriculum at every year level.

During the second term, *The Story of the Hebrew People* introduced students to some of the characters in the Old Testament, as well as the concept of 'Covenant', or making promises. We looked in detail at the covenant of Moses, and the promises made between the Hebrew people and God at Mt Sinai. Students then reflected on their own lives, writing a series of promises about how they could treat people in a variety of places to reflect their covenant as Jesus' disciples.

Honour and shame were a particular focus in Term 3, as students learnt about Jesus and life in 1st century Palestine. By looking at the cultural values in Jesus parables, we can understand the message of these stories even clearer. Students analysed the Parable of the Prodigal Son, interpreting the meaning of the honour and shame presented in this story. They were challenged to create a modern parable with the same message as one from Scripture, which resulted in an amazing array of stories across the year level. From video and animation, to story and song, the Year 7 students impressed their teachers and peers by their understanding and creativity.

The final topic for Year 7 students was *Stewardship of Creation*, which included: a study of ancient creation myths, how science and religion can both complement our understanding of the history of our planet, and how we can be responsible stewards of creation. Students were challenged to consider how they could respond to environmental issues on a personal level.

Throughout the year, students were encouraged to think deeper, reflect on Scripture and make the message relevant to their lives. It was a wonderful start to each student's spiritual journey here at Marist Regional College.

YEAR 8 RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

2015 was a fantastic year! The students began by looking at Discipleship, and the travels and teachings of St Paul. The saints were a source of inspiration as the students chose one to research to learn why he/she became a saint. Biblical history was found to be fascinating. While students understood that the Holy Spirit had filled the saints, they were able to put discipleship into practice in Term Two with the focus on The Church's Mission and Decision Making. In groups, the Year 8s decided what they wanted to achieve to be living disciples or, in the words of Pope Francis, "Get dirty". Groups presented their ideas to their classmates; the idea being that their proposal could be used in Service Week. Some of the ideas included: Dog's Home, Street Swags, visiting old people, Bike Ride for charity (Cancer Council), making a BMX track at the old tip site, helping young people with their reading and working at Tassie Devil wildlife sanctuary. Term Three saw the students involved in writing their own creation myth in the unit: Stewards of Creation. Many different cultures creation stories were enjoyed and it was realised that there was a common theme of creation from chaos. The students had a choice about how they wished to present their work and which age group it was aimed at. The final unit to round off the year was Spirituality and Prayer. Students wrote a prayer of thanksgiving and designed a prayer flag that was displayed in class. They also designed a symbolic representation of another prayer (to praise God, request something, or to ask forgiveness.) This tied in perfectly with an understanding of the real meaning of Christmas – in giving you will receive. Service Week was held in the final days of school, enabling the students to practise what they had preached. This is what makes a Marist education so holistic. Well done, Year 8 – you're amazing.

YEAR 9 RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

In first term, Year 9 Religious Education students had the opportunity to broaden their creative abilities by designing their own religion. Students enjoyed this unit of work immensely and presented their 'new' religion in a booklet format and in a PowerPoint presentation to their respective classes. Each religion included dimensions based on scripture, traditional belief, sacred stories, sacred structures and sacred places.

Students had a great deal of enjoyment, fun and creative flair. Their unique spiritual insights, philosophical investigations and high level imagination led to some very interesting religions with names like 'Chocolates and Me', 'Footballis', 'The Story of Togi', and 'Cokeism'....

Students were extended further in the program in Term 2 with a study of the Parables and an understanding of Jesus' mission. The beauty of this work was the special connectedness between the students and the teachings found in the parables. Well known parables like The Good Samaritan, The Lost Sheep and The Pharisee and The Tax Collector, enabled the Year 9s to appreciate the values and understanding of the deeper meaning in each parable. In the last term students extended their learning further with an in-depth analysis on Religious Ethics and researched the various meanings and approaches to be found in pilgrimage. Virtually every country has some type of pilgrimage and this led to students discovering and creating a brochure outlining four different pilgrimages, such as the popular Camino walk in France and Spain or researching less well known pilgrimages found in Kathmandu, Japan and India.



In the different classes, there were many and varied ways of exploring and reporting the set tasks and in some students pondered the message from film. 'The Castle' highlighted justice issues in an Australian context and the magnificent Bollywood 'Lagaan' tackled injustice in a fictional cricket match in colonial India.

Overall, this was a good year to ponder the religious dimensions of life richly helped by the media visibility and warmth of Pope Francis.

Mathematics

In 2015 the Mathematics Faculty focussed on implementation of ICT where applicable. An example of this was the use of the free graphing programme DESMOS to facilitate Year 10 students understanding of simultaneous linear equations and inequations. This allowed considerable time saving by avoiding the need to repeatedly hand draw lines to find graphical solutions. An Excel spreadsheet was used to automate area and volume calculations in Year 10. Year 9 students used Excel to develop a simple interest simulation.

In July, 100 participants sat the 37th annual Australian Mathematics Competition. The results included 1 High Distinction, 15 Distinctions, 40 Credits and 34 Proficiency Wards.



Science

As I look back at 2015 I am reminded of the huge efforts made by the Staff in the Science department guiding students through the National Curriculum.

It is a mixture of good memories, enjoyable practicals and a sense of achievement that Science Staff have had the opportunity to share their love of Science with the students. Even though the workloads and demands are ever increasing, I hear the staff reflecting on the rewarding relationships that have built up between the students as they say good bye to their classes of 2015.

I would like to thank the Science Staff members and Teacher Assistants for all their conscientious work throughout the year in giving students the opportunity to achieve their best in Science.

Areas of focus for the staff have been:

- Regular afternoon meetings discussing students' achievements and ways of improving through interactive practicals, presentation and delivery of units of work, and constant reflective practices about our teaching methods.
- Science Staff have been moderating assessment work samples both at meetings at the College and at network meetings with other high schools.
- This professional development that our Science Teachers have undertaken has shown that we continue to meet high standards of assessing to various achievement standards in the Australian Curriculum for Year 7 to Senior College.
- Lunch times and after hours tutoring by Science Staff in the Library for Years 9 to 10 and Senior College. This is where staff have given up their free time to tutor students. Regular tutoring was available in the Library on Thursdays from 3:00pm to 4:15pm. Staff observed an improvement by students regularly attending.
- Trialling electronic resources such as Britannica Pathways, Science by Doing and COSMOS. These are interactive Science sites on the internet that take the students through a series of interactive lessons. No cost was incurred as the Science department were trialling these sites. We informally surveyed groups of students through 'word and mouth' and the vote was for COSMOS.
- Science Textbook decisions. Richard Fedosejevs (Head of the Mathematics Faculty) and I did sample surveys of Years 9, 10 and Senior College students about moving towards a completely electronic textbook, commonly called 'ebooks'. Interestingly the majority said they were not in favour in having ebooks and still preferred paper back textbooks.

The Science Staff in Years 7 and 8 feel there is not a specific textbook that covers the curriculum well enough yet, so we are

holding off on getting students to purchase one. Students will be provided with photocopies of worksheets and use interactive websites like COSMOS. In Years 9 and 10 we are opting to go with a Science workbook which the students write in called 'National Science Year 9 or National Science Year 10' depending on year level.

- Year 10 revision assignments in preparation for the yearly exam.
 To motivate all Year 10 students, we trialled compulsory revision assignments in Term 3 to help students revise from Terms 1 and 2 so they would be prepared for the exam in Term 4. Overall our results showed an improvement from 2014 exam results. This will be a standard practice from 2016 for all Year 10 Science students.
- Last four weeks of Term 4:

We have analysed and reviewed activities, experiments and investigations to further engage students' inquiry skills for 2016.

This has been achieved by each Science staff member reviewing, working on a unit and then uploading it to our electronic resources that all staff can access.

On top of all the above we nurtured and supported student involvement in a range of forums, competitions, research projects and community engagement activities.

Careers in Science

This was a terrific opportunity in May for Years 11 and 12 students who were thinking of a career in Science. The program was a 1.5hr presentation which outlined the opportunities a career in Biological Sciences can offer. Presented by two PhD students, the program ran through everything from 'I have my acceptance letter, now how do I choose my subjects?' and 'What is a major and a minor?', to 'What kind of things would I be doing if I studied Biological Sciences at the University of Tasmania?" Students who attended the talk commented on how interesting and engaging the presentation was for them.



Environmental Science – "New Subject"

Environmental Science is a new course that has been introduced to the College. Senior College students learn to draw evidence-based conclusions about the environment and gain an understanding of how the environment relates to them personally, locally and globally. Marist Regional College is located in Burnie in a superb location overlooking Bass Strait. It is a true regional college servicing a student population of over 800 students. It draws students from as far east as Ulverstone, as far west as Circular Head and as far south as Rosebery.

The College provides outstanding opportunities for HPE and sport, through its programs, resources and a commitment by staff to provide quality teaching and learning.

The HPE department is staffed by nine qualified HPE specialists supported by one trainee on a combination of full-time and part-time loads. The College delivers compulsory HPE to students in Years 7 & 8 for 250 minutes per fortnight and to Years 9 & 10 for 300 minutes pf. Sports Science is provided as an option in Year 9 and 10 for 300 minutes pf. Outdoor Education is provided as an option in Year 10 @ 300 minutes pf. TQA courses are provided in Outdoor Education (Level 2), Health Studies (Level 3) and Health Studies (Level 3). A VET Certificate 3 in Fitness is also available.

The College supports the HPE programs through the provision of outstanding physical resources. It has two AFL ovals, two soccer grounds and an outdoor multipurpose synthetic playing area. These outdoor facilities are serviced by external changerooms and pavilion. The grounds are superbly maintained and are available free of charge to local sporting organisations for training and playing outside of school times.



Our indoor facility (Harcombe Centre) is state of the art. It provides the following opportunities for students. Two full size basketball courts or one full size show court with retractable seating for 800. Two volleyball courts, 8 badminton courts, remote drop down divider, one fully equipped weights room-gymnasium, two classrooms, toilets including disabled toilets, HPE storage area and a separate Outdoor Education storage area.

A major focus of our programs is to promote links to the community through providing the opportunity for students to become actively involved in physical activity at both a school and community level. In working towards this we provide the following:

- Use of local sporting resources as part of HPE e.g. Burnie Aquatic Centre, Burnie Tennis Centre, HealthGlo Fitness Centre, Burnie Police Boys Club, Zodiacs Gymnastics Club, Burnie Hockey Centre, Burnie Netball Complex, Burnie Greens (Indoor Bowls).
- Use of local Resources for Outdoor Education: local surf life-saving club and beaches (surfing and snorkelling) Burnie recreational parks and reserves (orienteering), Burnie cycling paths, Cradle Coast Mountain Bike Park at Penguin (mountain biking) local rivers: Cam, Blythe, Inglis (kayaking) retail outlets Red Herring Surf, Tassie Tackle and Outdoor (activity specific knowledge and equipment).
- Provision of intra-school house carnivals with a focus on inclusivity, providing opportunities for all ability levels. Carnivals provided are Aquatics (2 carnivals), Track and Field Athletics (2 days) and Cross Country Running.
- Development of student coaches through the Sports' Leaders course in Sports Science. These students actively assist in regional primary school sporting expos.
- Provide team sporting opportunities at a school level that
 extend those sports that are introduced to students in HPE. The
 College participates in the following local competitions (Burnie
 area); Greater North West and West Coast; provide capacity
 for students to play sport at a higher level through participation
 of teams in Northern Independent School (NSATIS) rosters and
 State Independent School (SATIS) rosters.
- Provision for students to participate at a national level through affiliation / membership of Marist Schools Association (MSA).
 Annual participation in netball and basketball.

Drama



PLUS 10 stands for Pathway/Planning, Learning, Understanding and Success beyond Year 10. To gain the certificate, students are required to demonstrate a willingness to undertake work experience, develop a high level resumé, application letter and a personal statement, complete a 300 word research assignment on a specific career of interest and write a personal work experience journal which may outline part time work or a week of work experience coordinated through the Work Experience Shadowing Program offered at the College. The final module is to successfully complete an on-line work safety induction test.

Work Experience Shadowing Program


Twenty Year 9 students attended the annual Try-a-skill Expo day at the Burnie Civic Centre during May.

Congratulations to Maverick Bakes. He was awarded our Year 10 prize for most outstanding student for both Wood Technology and Metal Technology. His achievements in the technology area over his four years spent at the College has resulted in him gaining an apprenticeship starting in 2016. Well done, Maverick. Students who volunteered to display their work in the mid-year Arts and Craft Festival also received great feedback, with the craftsmanship and the quality of their project receiving many positive comments. I thank all students who took part. The continued use of our online

safety program (On Guard Safety Training) is working well and students are showing an increased level of understanding important safety precautions needed to operate in the Wood and Metal workshop.

Next year we will be purchasing three new miniature lathes. This equipment will help the students immensely. At the present time there is only one large woodwork lathe and students starting out in developing this skill can feel overwhelmed by the size of the existing large lathe. In 2016 we will continue to strive to increase the understanding, safety and skill level of all students who are participating in the Materials, Design and Technology area, while endeavouring to acquire the up to date equipment needed to achieve future goals for students in the ever changing technology industry.

CAD

Computer Graphics and Design has continued to maintain strong support amongst our Years 9-12 students in 2015 with 2 Senior College classes for the first time and sizeable classes in both Years 9 and 10.

The College this year purchased two new 3D Printers which were in continuous demand throughout the year, as students embraced this new technology. Design tasks, set around designing items and printing 3 dimensional prototypes appears to be the way of the future in this subject.

Late in the year, the College was also able to equip the CAD Lab in Room 19 with a new A3 colour printer to further enhance the quality output from students when presenting their finished projects.

In 2016, we will be looking to upgrade our popular vinyl cutter and also our TurboFloorplan (house design) software package as the College looks to keep up with new technologies in this ever changing medium.

With our Senior College students continuing to achieve quality results in the Stage 3 pre-tertiary course again in 2015, we look to maintain our reputation as a centre of excellence in Computer Graphics and Design in 2016 and beyond.

HOME ECONOMICS

Year 7 Home Economics saw many aesthetically pleasing pieces of bunting, reflecting a personal element, displayed yet again in the Chanel building. Food Technology for Year 7 saw many designer dippers consumed!

With record numbers of students enrolled in Year 8 Food Technology, it started off as a promising year. As tradition demands, the highlight of the year for Year 8 students was preparing the decorated cakes, with many students proudly sharing the end results with their peers.

Year 9 Fibres Technology saw students making great use of the thermal copier, purchased the year before. Students found the technology to be simple to use to create stencils, using images from the internet, and to apply the ink to fabric with silk screen printing methods. Perhaps the highlight of the year for many students was the guest speakers, Aunty Ollie (mainland Aboriginal Elder) and Jacinta Vanderfeen (University of Tasmania - Tasmanian Elder in training), who showed them an indigenous method of twisting raffia. Students then went on to design and produce a Dream Catcher using materials from nature with the twisted raffia being a technique of option.

Year 9 Food Technology saw students design and produce sustainable sausages for the first time. Vaughn, a butcher at the Hygienic Butchery in Somerset, showed the students how to make sausages and the students had to create their own using local, seasonal ingredients. There were some very professional sausages produced!

Year 10 Fibres Technology saw students' consideration of sustainability to create new life for unwanted objects. Some objects that were created were a clock from a bicycle wheel, a recovered trunk, a stool was recovered using an unwanted jumper and lamp shades being re-covered. Students were also exposed to asian elements in a 'Collage and Culture' Design Brief, where many were surprised with their level of inspiration obtained from traditional asian fabrics.

The highlight of the year for Year 10 Food Technology was the first ever Food Sustainability Excursion. Students were treated to a visit to Kindred Organics and were lucky enough to learn about low food miles from the very knowledgeable co-owner, Henrietta. They enjoyed a delicious lunch at The Berry Patch and then visited Mount Gnomon Farm where they were able to pat and cuddle piglets and lambs — a rare treat. Guy Robertson shared his knowledge of free range farming with the students who were able to sample some of the Mount Gnomon ham. Overall, an excellent outing!

Burnie Show entry numbers were down on previous years but the students who did enter did extremely well. Special mention must go to Jessica Lowe (Year 9) who was the most successful entrant overall from the College.

Two teams of students from Year 10 entered the Burnie Paper Dress Competition. There were many entries of a high standard this year, proving to be stiff competition. Both teams can be proud of their effort.

SMALL ENGINES

This year in Small Engines the Year 9 and 10 classes worked in pairs to dismantle, study and learn each of the parts of a Four Stroke Honda engine. They looked at parts such as a piston, valves, crankshaft and carburettor. They looked at how the engine was started, how it ran and what to do to fix it if it breaks down. Each group was then responsible for putting their engine back together again and, hopefully, starting it!

During the course of the year students learned about the basic principles of a four stroke, two stroke and diesel engine. They examined each of the separate processes within a working engine, such as the fuel, air and cooling system.

Students were required to bring in their own projects from home to work on individually. Projects such as whipper snippers, lawn mowers, four-wheelers and motorbikes were all dismantled, cleaned and put back together again.

We finished off the year with a tour through the new AJL Heavy Machinery complex at Wivenhoe and Confidyne in Ulverstone, where the students received tours of the workshops and information on gaining an apprenticeship.

TOTAL NUMBER OF ENROLMENTS IN COURSES

This is powerful evidence that Marist and the CCTTC are playing a pivotal role towards providing and assisting students' future employment opportunities and the important role that VET continues to play in the curriculum.

CLUSTER GROUPS

VET pathway programs need to have employment relevance and industry acceptance. Cooperation between schools and across industry sectors is essential to appropriate VET in schools programs and the CCTTC. We offered cooperation through clusters with other schools and partnerships this year including:

CATERING EVENTS

The CCTTC has played a vital part in the combination of training and catering to clientele, both from internal and external avenues. This year we have catered for 56 functions. Incorporating Certificate II VET programs such as Retail Bakery and Kitchen Operations, students have been involved with the preparation, cooking and service of food, which has strengthened skills and knowledge for students in the Hospitality, Bakery and Cookery programs. In addition, students have found out how employability skills, qualities and values translate into the workplace by practising and developing these skills.

CLOUD 9 CAFÉ

This year has seen a transformation of unification, blending and maximising opportunities for a cohesive mix of Senior College students and staff to come together. Thursday, our Trade Training Day, has enabled Kitchen Operations students to not only prepare and cook food, but also serve a wide variety of fresh innovative dishes at recess and lunch time. This has increased skills, knowledge and preparedness for work for our bakery and KOP students and Year 10 students enrolled in the Introduction to Bakery/Patisserie program.

TRAINEESHIPS AND SCHOOL BASED APPRENTICESHIPS (SbA)

14 students have started a traineeship and 3 students a SbA this year. There are another 25 traineeships that are still current from last year. Certificate II or III in Retail dominates traineeships and SbAs vary including plumbing, fitness, commercial cookery and agriculture and one has been processed in retail bakery.

In Semester 2 we offered information days and nights for students interested in participating in apprenticeships or traineeships. A company called MAS National provided students with information

pertaining to mentoring support to find future employment opportunities, a job matching service and support from the initial sign up to completion, including in-training.

SUBJECT ADVICE NIGHT - YEAR 10

Seven Registered Training Organisations were invited and attended this information night.

BAKERY

A total of 15 apprentices participating in bakery and 6 patisserie apprentices, equating to 65 days training in 2015.

FACEBOOK

Social media has been an excellent way of communicating products and highlighting VET food programs. This has also minimised the need to throw away products, while promoting VET students'/apprentices' work.

YEARS 8, 9 AND 10 HOME ECONOMICS

Working collaboratively with Benoit Marchand we opened the door towards thinking about food career pathways for 3 year levels this in 2015.

It is envisaged that the centre at the College is set to change the VET landscape in Burnie. To be really successful we need to be delivering VET opportunities that meet student pathways and industry needs. We are looking further abroad to allow for a joint application to deliver across several industries. We are in the process of working with a number of different systems collaboratively, with strong local industry backing. It is envisaged that we will provide students with prospects in regional areas such as Burnie and along the North West Coast with a selection of VET programs of the highest quality. With the support of management, We look forward to the possibilities of assisting students into exciting and relevant programs and, more importantly, working closely with parents, staff, community and industry to strengthen our bond.























Library

We welcomed the beginning of 2015 with balloons and, right from the start of the year, we have continued to be popular with both students and staff, averaging around 600 people through the library doors every day. It has been a year of change and new programs. In May we farewelled our popular library technician, Ms Barb Lodge who decided to move to a warmer climate in sunny Queensland, and we warmly welcomed incoming technician, Ms Kristia Gluyas, who has been a much appreciated addition to our library staff.

The various reading programs from previous years have continued, with PRG (Privileged Readers Group) members contributing to a number of fun activities, writing reviews and generally sharing their love of books and reading. Ms Lodge worked with this group from the beginning of the year, and Ms Gluyas has done a fantastic job of motivating group members since she began work in May. Our mobile libraries in Chanel and McAuley are still being well used, with the Year 7 and 8 students silently reading during Class Teacher several mornings a week. We have expanded this reading program into the Year 9 area, with Year 9 Homeroom classes coming to the library once a week to participate in silent reading for 15-20 minutes. We are looking forward to continuing this program with the 2016 Years 7 to 9 students.

The College's chess team has gone from strength to strength, with between 15 and 25 players participating in each of the interschool chess tournaments we have attended. We had 8 of our best players go to the State Finals at Scotch Oakburn College in Launceston, where we came 7th out of 15 teams. Congratulations to all our players on getting that far. We'll practice some more in 2016!

A range of student work from English's Macbeth projects to Textile's Upcycling creations has been displayed in the library throughout the year. In Terms 3 and 4 we had an inspirational display of work by Mr Richard Holwill to promote a new library activity called MakerSpace. Guided and encouraged by Mr Holwill, our inaugural MakerSpace Event was thoroughly enjoyed by a group of students from Years 7 to 9 over 5 weeks in Term 4. They pulled apart old computers and other technology and reused the pieces to create new items such as a clock and a purse.

Another group which began this year and ran once or twice a week was the Minecraft building group. The library purchased an educational Minecraft server and licences to enable class groups to use this creative technology as a lesson tool. It was a great way to encourage both boys and girls to build and play together online. It

was also a fantastic technology which we used in the Year 7s library lessons this year, specifically as part of their Ancient Rome project where in small groups they needed to research, write about, design and then build a particular type of Roman building. As well as enabling them to be creative in a different way, the Ancient Rome assignment encouraged use of other skills that the Year 7 students had been learning within the library: writing bibliographies, researching using a number of different resources, in both print and digital forms, taking notes and summarising information. The results of this project can be seen on the College YouTube Channel.





This was created due to WSSA being unable to create a format for High Schools within an agreeable timeframe for all schools.

With five teams competing in 3 divisions Marist certainly felt optimistic about the season ahead. 2015 saw the roster revamped with all roster matches to be played in Term 2 with top of the ladder position at the end of the roster season determining the WSSAL Premiers.

In U16 Boys' Division Marist had one team competing with a mix of Year 9 and 10 students. The team was very competitive throughout the roster winning 6 games, drawing one and losing one to eventual premiers Parklands High. 




