Celebrating fifty years of Marist education in Burnie



On the occasion of the Blessing of the Geoffrey Coombs Memorial Garden

It is indeed very appropriate that, on this day, recognition is to be given to a former student of Marist Regional College, Geoffrey Coombs, who died while serving as a sapper in the 1st Field Squadron, Royal Australian Engineers in Vietnam. His death occurred on 22 March 1968, when he paid the ultimate sacrifice for his country and the people whose freedom he was trying to defend.

Forty-one years later, in the presence of his mother and members of his family, we recognise that he too, like Jesus in the Gospel, was prepared to go into an area of great danger, place himself in circumstances of great risk and, in this instance, he surrendered his life, just as eventually Jesus did.

The development of the garden at the entrance to the College will be a memorial to Geoffrey, but a reminder of others, such as staff and students, who have died during the 50 years of the life of Marist Regional College. I commend the Old Scholars, particularly the Year 10 leavers of 1975, for initiating the fundraising that made this project possible. I am told that their efforts had also contributed greatly to a revitalisation of the Old Scholars group of Marist College that made this project possible.

This readiness to see the importance of serving the community has been integral to the vision and purpose, encouraged and promoted here at Marist Regional College for 50 years. The values to which staff, students and parents aspire at this College are those of hospitality, respect, justice, compassion and responsibility. I believe that it is a very faithful reflection of a statement I made on Catholic Ethos in 2005:

"Our work in a Catholic organisation is more than using our professional skills in the service of others. In everything we do, we are ministering in the name of the Catholic Church and the Gospel. We must, therefore, represent the values of the church, presenting the compassionate face of Christ to the world – respecting the dignity of every person as a child of God."

Marist Regional College, as we know, has a history which involves the significant contribution in the earlier years of both the Marist Fathers and the Sisters of Mercy. It was a new venture for the Marist Fathers to come to Tasmania, at the request of Archbishop Guilford Young, and for many years their ministry was carried out here at the College and in the parishes of Burnie and Claremont.

The Sisters of Mercy, on the other hand, had been present in Tasmania for many decades, here in Burnie, Deloraine and Latrobe. It was in 1972 that the two colleges of Stella Maris Regional Girls' School and Marist College were amalgamated to become the Marist Regional College as we know it today. Thankfully, the charisms of the Sisters of Mercy and the Marist Fathers remain very prominent in the vision and operation of this large Catholic college.

What will stand us in good stead is the lesson of the Gospel, and our readiness to put ourselves in the place of others, as Jesus did, to stand by one another, and to be prepared to go the full distance, as did Geoffrey Coombs.

Principal's Report



It is again a great pleasure to report on the progress of the College community over the last 12 months and to reflect on 50 years of Marist education in Burnie. The prospectus of Marist College issued in 1959 proudly announced a college for boys situated 2 miles west of Burnie in a most picturesque setting. The property comprised of 60 acres, consisting of spacious lawns, two large ovals and expansive playing areas.

When the school opened in February 1959, boarders had to stay with families in the Burnie area as the school buildings were still being constructed. At the 50th celebrations earlier this year, the first day pupils talked about those early years and their proud contribution to the development of the beautiful grounds we have now. In those days pupils attended Mass on a daily basis, cows roamed on the fields and parents received a progress report every fortnight. The first students were 90 Year 7 and 8 boys who studied Religious Knowledge, English, Maths, Social Studies, French, Latin, Commerce and Agricultural Studies.

At the 1959 end of year ceremony, the equivalent of our Speech Night, Father H K Davis, the first Rector or Principal of the College spoke about "Diligite Veritatem" or as we translate it "Love the Truth" the motto of the College then and now. He told the audience that the motto echoes what Jesus Christ said "I am the way, and the truth and the life". "It is our aim then", he said, "for our Marist College boys to live the truth by clinging to God, by loving God, by pleasing God, by being anchored on God."

We are very grateful to the Marist Fathers for their courage in accepting Archbishop Guilford Young's challenge to build and run a secondary boarding school for boys and for their tenacity, care and teaching excellence which enabled the college to thrive and eventually led to the amalgamation with the Sisters of Mercy secondary school in 1972 and resulted in Marist Regional College.

50 years on how have we built on the traditions of these pioneers, in terms of faith, learning and the wider community?

We live in a secular world that struggles to put moral principle before personal need, where the catch cry is for individuals to "be happy" rather than the focus being on the needs of all, the common good. Despite that, our College is firmly and authentically Catholic in its central focus of "Love the Truth", that is, love God and follow in Jesus' footsteps. Sadly, this doesn't always lead to Mass attendance, or worship, but there is a strong focus in our community of being Christlike, living in harmony with each other and caring deeply about the needs of others. It means that Religious Studies is a vital subject in the curriculum. The emphasis on God-given talent and Christ's call to use those talents in service of others is what is most attractive about our community and students' faith can grow through participation in Young Vinnies and REMAR, which provide opportunities for worship, prayer and community service.

Our community of learning has grown over those 50 years in terms of the courses provided, number of students and facilities. Massive changes in technology have caused us to re-evaluate what students need to learn and how they learn.

We continue to prepare students for their careers and we are very proud of our NAPLAN results which show that the literacy and numeracy results of our students are high and improving. The Year 7 and 9 results are better than the average Tasmanian and Australian results and most importantly are higher than statistically similar schools across Australia. The LEAP program in Year 7 and 8 targeting literacy skills is already providing evidence of improvement for many of our students.

The extension of vocational and trade based courses at the College is an exciting curriculum strategy with this year's suite of Small Engines, Construction, Hospitality,

Business and Tourism. 2010 will see the addition of VET Childcare and School Based Apprenticeships.

50th Anniversary

Celebrations began in February with class reunions, an Old Scholars' Dinner Dance and the Anniversary Mass, official opening of the Old Scholars' sponsored memorial garden and 50th Anniversary assembly at which some of the first prefects assisted with the induction of the Student Representative Council for 2009. In August, an anniversary capsule was buried in the memorial garden to be opened in 50 years.

Re-Registration

In June this year, the College underwent the re-registration process and successfully achieved six years of ongoing registration, 2010-2015. A great deal of work went into the process to ensure that curriculum and assessment are well documented and up to date and policies and procedures are current and relevant. As a result, every subject has a scope and sequence chart and processes for updating courses. The Board worked hard to update policies and ensure that there is a comprehensive set of policies to safeguard the community. Over 30 of these policies are available on the College website, others on the intranet.

Death of Alexander Waugh (Year 11 student)

The College community was greatly saddened by the news of the death of one of our students, Alex Waugh, in November. The chapel became a centre for prayer and celebration of Alex's life, and a memorial service prepared by the students was a feature of the days that followed. On the day of the funeral, a whole school prayer assembly and a guard of honour along the school drive way were wonderful symbols of the respect held for Alex and his family.

Master Plan

In 2009 we were able to complete several minor projects utilising the \$200,000 School Pride grant received from the Federal Government plus an additional \$50,000 of our own funds to complete:

- Sound recording studio
- Refurbish Maths classroom
- Refurbish Common Room
- Build new VET and Careers offices in the library

Science and Language Learning Centre

Top priority on the College Master Plan is the provision of up to date facilities for Middle Years' learning (Years 7 and 8). Plans for a Year 7 Learning Centre were on the drawing board when secondary schools were invited to apply for the Building the Education Revolution funding, which for secondary schools was a highly competitive process for the development of Language and/or Science facilities. Fortunately, our forward planning stood us in good stead and the College argued successfully for nearly two million dollars worth of funding to assist in building stage 1 of the Middle School.

Vos Constructions began work on the project in late November with an expected completion date in August 2010.

In contrast to 50 years ago when Catholic schools received no Government funding, all schools receive recurrent funding according to their socio economic status. In addition all schools in Australia are the beneficiaries of the Federal Government's Building the Education Revolution which has enabled us to speed up our building program and provide many more computers for our students.

Back in 1960, Father Davis thanked the Parents' Auxiliary as it was known then for their unceasing labours. The Parents' and Friends' Association continues to work for the College through catering for the Year 10 Dinner and the second hand book and clothing sale held in December each year.

I would like to thank the Governing Council and the College Board for the leadership they give to the College and support in my role as Principal. I would also like to thank Mr Kevin Young, retiring Chairman of the Board who has given 5 years dedicated service to the Board. Father Bernie McFadyen SM has been on the Board for 6 years and leaves the Burnie/Wynyard parish in January. Father Bernie has brought the wisdom of many years as an educator to the Board and has always been a loyal supporter of the College. Also, finishing on the Board are Mrs Sandra Harvey, Mrs Margaret McKenzie, Father Pius Jones, Mr Barry Britton and Mr Ted Kulinski. Their contributions are much appreciated.

The role of Principal is made easier through the collegiality of a wonderful team of leaders. Mrs Candi Dempster, Ms Susanna Bond, Mr Les Allen, Mr Michael Ireland and Mr Ian Margetts share clarity of vision and determination to ensure that Marist Regional College continues to grow its fine reputation for developing well educated young people. Thank you to the staff whose dedication to the learning of students is greatly appreciated.

Finally, I would like to thank the students and parents for your continued support and faith in us. Fifty years ago, the Marist Fathers answered the call of the Catholic Church in Tasmania to provide Catholic education for boys in this region of Tasmania. We stand tall on the shoulders of those pioneers who from the very beginning were intent on forming young people of character who could make a difference in society. We continue that work with confidence.

Master Plan

The Building Education Revolution program has allocated \$1,970,000 to the College for the construction of a new 'Language and Science Learning Centre', which when completed will house the Year 7's and form part of our new Middle Years' learning centre. The College will need to borrow about \$1,000,000 to complete this project. The work on this has begun and is expected to be completed during Term 2 next year.

Other Matters

The College successfully underwent re-registration this year with a huge effort by staff. The finance, building and safety sub-committees continue to meet and provide closer management of these areas.

2009 has been a wonderful academic year. The outstanding achievements of our students across traditional subject areas and vocational learning courses show the depth of courses that the College offers.

Certificate I qualifications in General Construction and Certificate II qualifications Hospitality (Kitchen Operations), Business and Tourism have been a highlight of the vocational learning of students in 2009. The extension of vocational and trade based courses at the College is an exciting curriculum strategy. Small Engines has been introduced into the suite of elective courses in Years 9 and 10 to cater for this growing area of study. VET in Schools programs have been extended in 2009, and include Construction, Hospitality (including Responsible Service of Alcohol, Coffee making Barista units) Business and Tourism. 2010 will see the extension of these programs to include VET Childcare, Electrotechnology and School Based Apprenticeships in areas such as automotive, hairdressing, metal fabrication, diesel fitting, plumbing and joinery. The ability of students to undertake academic courses and vocational courses is an integral part of the curriculum and is growing with student and community interest.

The use of laptops and ubiquitous technology, where students can learn when they need to, and access computers without having to be confined to a traditional computer lab structure is a key strategic direction for learning at the College. More and more 'virtual' learning or learning in a digital way is becoming the standard and teachers continue to embrace the need to complement their teaching and learning strategies to cater for digital learning. More data projectors and professional learning on interactive whiteboards has been a feature of 2009.

The second year of National testing in literacy and numeracy has enabled the College to track student progress between like tests. The nationwide data has revealed some important trends for our literacy and numeracy teaching and learning.

Year 7 Benchmark Results

162 students were enrolled in Year 7, 2009 from 30 different schools. 2009 results show improvement in 4 out of the 5 indicators, with 'reading' remaining constant at 97% as in 2008.

The Year 9 data is particularly pleasing as it reveals the value adding that the College curriculum has made to students overall literacy and numeracy efficacy from Year 8 to Year 9. Particularly pleasing is the difference between 2008 writing and grammar/punctuation sections. 2010 will clearly show the three year value adding trend that the College makes to students' literacy and numeracy capabilities and will enable us to track, using a consistent testing regime, student progress from Year 7 in 2008 to Year 9 in 2010.

Literacy Enhancement Program

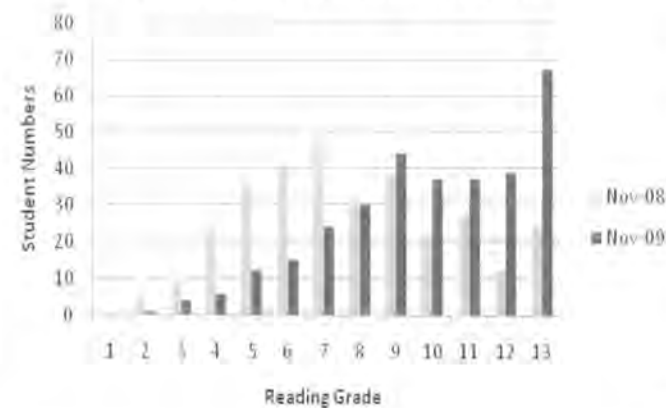
A strategic direction for 2009 was to enhance the literacy and comprehension skills of learners in Years 7 and 8. A Middle Years (Years 7 and 8) Literacy Program (L.E.A.P – Literacy Enhancement Achievement Program) was undertaken by all Year 7 and Year 8 students, in a vertically timetabled structure. L.E.A.P focuses on students' ability to decode, comprehend and apply literacy knowledge across the curriculum. Pre-testing for all Year 6 and Year 7 students occurred in November 2008 and comparative testing was done again in November 2009.

The data below clearly demonstrates the undeniable worth of this program. Students are placed with 14 different staff, including teacher aides and meet 4 times a cycle with small groups of students to investigate creative and shared ways to approach literacy development.

The graphs on the next page show the evidence of the program's success. Each learner is assigned a reading grade level – from Grade 1 to Grade 12. The November 2008 testing is then compared to the findings from the November 2009 testing. Graph 2 shows the reading grade level changes from November 2008 to November 2009.

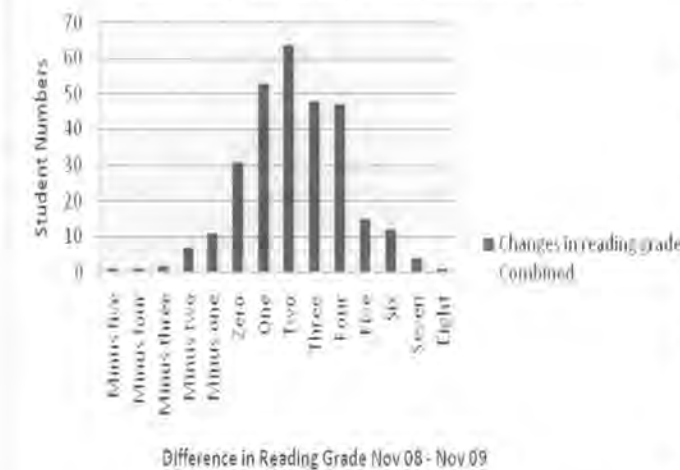
TORC 2009 Combined Results



There have been significant changes in the results as highlighted above in Graph 1. In Grade 4 Reading level, there has been a dramatic decline in students from 23 students in 2008 to 7 students in 2009. Similarly the increase in Year 12 reading age learners in 2008 to 2009 are impressive.

Graph 2 illustrates data relating to the actual changes in grade levels from 2008 to 2009 for all students. As indicated, 64 students have increased their reading grade level by two years through this program, while 48 students have improved by four grade levels.

This program highlights the staggering importance of literacy development. The ability of students to access the curriculum has been enhanced through giving them the skills and strategies to decode, comprehend and understand text. The program will continue into 2010 for Year 7 and 8 learners. Our next challenge is to contextualise the learning for Year 9 2010 students through analysis of this literacy data and

how teachers can better support literacy development and the comprehension of lesson content and tasks by considering students reading grade level in the development of lesson plans, tasks and teaching resources.

Daily co-curricular activities reveal the many talents and skills of our students. These include entry and successes in many regional, national and international subject based competitions and the many excursions and out of class learning experiences that students have the opportunity to experience at the College. Students, regardless of their learning ability are challenged to achieve their potential.

The Learning Enhancement Centre is an integral component of learning and teaching and develops modified programs in collaboration with teachers to enhance learning opportunities for all. They assist in both the learning consolidation and extension areas to enable this potential to be realised.

Challenging our preferred talents and expanding our skills is never easy, however, the quest for knowledge and continuously renewing our learning and teaching practices lay at the foundation of our academic, social and cultural successes.

The continued tracking of our students and their employability skills for the future reveal that our students have a well balanced approach to their chosen careers, whether they be in the traditional trades, emerging trade areas, university, certificate courses or employment. Our pathways tracking and career counselling program yields many successes, with students able to fulfil their dreams through hands on experiences such as structured workplace learning and Try-a-Trade experiences. A rigorous academic program, coupled with our strong pastoral support breeds success and a climate of respectful and calculated risk taking in our graduates. I extend warm and heartfelt thanks to all teaching and non-teaching staff for their dedication and support to our young people throughout 2009, and I look forward to a rewarding 2010.

Marist Regional College places a high value on its Catholic identity and the religious traditions of our Mercy and Marist founders, who have as their ethos, *care, respect, justice and compassion* for one another. In 2009, Marist Regional College continued to celebrate and grow as a Faith Community.

In February, the community gathered to celebrate 50 years of Marist Education in Burnie. Mass, celebrated by the Archbishop, was followed by the Blessing and Opening of the Geoffrey Coombs Memorial Garden. The College community also came together to celebrate the commencement of the school year and Ash Wednesday with Mass and then again to remember the last stages of Jesus' life through a dramatised Stations of the Cross during Holy Week.

Embrace Mary MacKillop, Engage the World was the theme of Catholic Education Week. Students engaged in the story of Mary MacKillop through a dramatisation by Sydney based company, Starrs Productions. Sixty class-captains represented the College at the North West Catholic Education Week Mass and the College community also gathered and celebrated Mass with Fr. Mark Walls (JC Colin Project, New Zealand) presiding. Fr. Mark also ran the Year 11 Renewal day and visited classes from Years 7-12.

Other visitors to the College included Sr. Mary O'Shannassy who spoke on the role of social justice and ministry in the prison system and Sr. Cathy Solano who spoke of the mission work of the Sisters of Mercy. Mission fundraising by the College supported Marist and Mercy Missions, Caritas and The Archbishop's Samaritan Fund. Operation Christmas Child was again supported which provided a number of Christmas gifts to send to less fortunate areas.

The College as a Faith Community has grown as a result of the appointment of a trainee Youth Ministry Assistant in 2009. The role has included: assisting with the development and implementation of Community Service/Justice Programs, networking with the local agencies and charity organisations, assisting in the preparation of whole College, year level and class liturgical celebrations and being actively involved in the College's Renewal and Retreat programs. The trainee also completed 12 units of work to attain a Certificate 3 in Business Administration.

The Marist and Mercy charisms have continued to be strengthened in the College. I attended the Mercy Ethos program in Dublin in April, where participants were immersed in the story of Catherine McAuley and the charisms of the Sisters of Mercy. Five staff members participated in the Australian Marist Schools Association Conference, which explored Marist Spirituality for Mission. Twenty Year 12 student leaders and two staff travelled to New Zealand to undertake the J. C. Colin Project's Marist Youth Leader program.

REMAR, a Marist Youth movement focusing on personal and spiritual development, leadership, and community service, has continued to grow in the College. Students have attended Remar Retreat Days as well as National Leadership Camps.

Year 10 students have become involved in the Parish, helping out in the garden as well as supporting a number of local charities. The Year 11's travelled to Melbourne for a solidarity camp. Under the guidance of Br. Doug Walsh the group helped out at the St Mary's House of Welcome and in the evening worked on one of St Vincent de Paul Society's four Melbourne soup van services which provide assistance to more than 700 people each night.

Under the guidance of the Youth Ministry Assistant, a Junior St. Vincent de Paul Society conference was re-established in the College. They held regular meetings, assisted with 'Buddy' camps in Hobart and held raffles and cake stalls at the parish centre to raise funds for the 'Christmas Appeal'. Years 7 to 10 students participated in a one day Renewal program at venues along the coast while Year 12 students started their year with a two day retreat. These days form part of the students' Religious Education program. Students undertake Religious Education classes in all year levels.

Marist Commemorates

In February, community spirit and reflection were the main themes running through the 50th anniversary celebrations at Burnie's Marist Regional College.

The Society of Mary opened the College in 1959 as a boys' secondary boarding school, initially known as St James Marist College, and attracted an initial enrolment of 90, with students garnered from as far afield as the mining towns of the west coast, the farming communities of Circular Head in the far west, King Island and Hobart.

In 1972 the College amalgamated with Stella Maris Regional College a girls' day school conducted by the Sisters of Mercy to become Marist Regional College.

Several students of that pioneering class of 1959 gathered in Burnie on the weekend of 14 February to join in the 50th anniversary celebrations. Among them were Wayne Grant, Derek Leary, David Stubbs and Sam Samec who paid tribute to their fallen classmate in a moving ceremony.

A key feature of the celebrations organised by the Old Scholars' Association was the blessing and opening of a memorial garden named in honour of Geoffrey Coombs, the only former Marist student to have died while on active war service.



Geoffrey Coombs was a part of the pioneering 1959 class and was with the first group of Year 10 leavers in 1962. As a sapper in the engineer corps, Geoffrey was on active duty in the Vietnamese province of Phuoc Tuy in March 1968 when he was killed after stepping on a landmine. He was 22 years old.

His mother, Marie Coombs, said she was overwhelmed by the generosity and actions of those who established the garden in Geoffrey's memory. "We are so proud they have named the garden after him", Mrs Coombs said. "I'm sure we'll treasure it for the rest of our lives."

Marist Regional College Principal, Susan Chen said the garden was a place for reflection and reconciliation, as well as a place to celebrate the service of former students and staff. "We believe that re-building this garden is a way to symbolise and focus on the importance in our lives of those themes," Mrs Chen said. "Water cleanses and heals and reminds us of the healing spirit of Jesus Christ, and so we have named it the reconciliation pond."

As a memorial garden, the pond also holds plaques commemorating those students and staff who have died while at the College.

Archbishop Adrian Doyle blessed the garden during the Sunday morning's Mass which he

concelebrated with parish priest and Marist Father, Bernie McFadyen and visiting Marist Fathers Ray Chapman, Paul Cooney, Pius Jones, Andrew Murray, Paul Pidcock, Bill Ryder and Michael Whelan.

Sunday's celebrations concluded with a family barbeque held on the main sports oval, where old scholars and their families had the opportunity to mingle with present day students, teachers and former staff.

Fathers Whelan and Chapman were among the Marist clergy who flew in from the mainland for the celebrations. They recounted many colourful stories from their days at the College. "We really struggled for equipment in those early years," recalled Fr Whelan.

"I remember thinking during one cricket match against Grammar, in which David Boon was playing, that if the ball is hit for six, that's the end of the match. The only match ball headed over the bank and in the direction of Bass Strait."

Fr Chapman, now a parish priest in Brisbane, said the establishment of the school grounds, set on 17 hectares of hilly land, was a massive undertaking.

"Brother Kevin drove a semi-trailer down from Sydney, carrying on it a bulldozer which he used

to sculpt out these magnificent sports ovals we have today. It was a massive job. When he was finished, he drove the semi all the way back to Sydney."

This year's inauguration Assembly on February 17 took on a special significance, commemorating to the day and hour 50 years ago when Archbishop Guilford Young blessed and opened the new boarding college, known initially as St James Marist College.

Invited guests and former students were invited to the inauguration assembly where 1959 student and former prefect, Sam Samec, presented blazers to the 20 students on the 2009 Representative Council.

Event organisers also staged community events across the weekend, commencing on the Friday night, 13 February with several informal gatherings at various venues around the town. A dinner dance was held on the Saturday evening, incorporating a silent auction that raised money to fund the memorial garden.

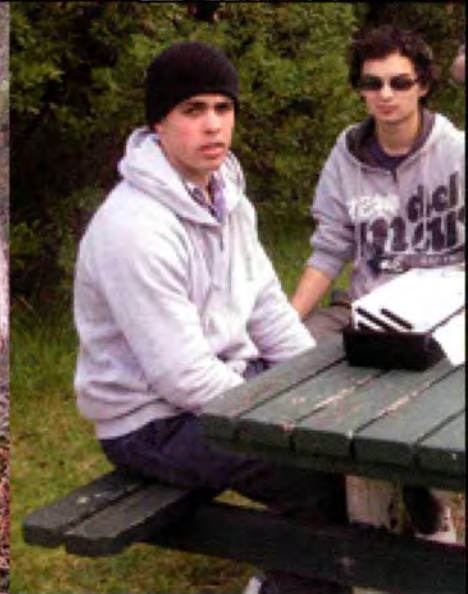

Pastoral Care at MRC

At the core of our approach to education at Marist Regional College is the pastoral care of our students. Pastoral care is demonstrated through the relationships the students build with their teachers, as well as through the structures we have in place for support, such as class teacher groups, counselling services and the formal Pastoral Care Program. The Pastoral Care Program, managed and coordinated by the Year Level Coordinators, aims to provide our students with a range of skills which will assist them to better manage their lives and interpersonal relationships.

This year we have focused our attention on raising awareness of the impact of bullying behaviours on student wellbeing. Students, parents and staff have been invited to participate in a survey on bullying and Year Level Coordinators have spent time on the issue in some of their pastoral care activities, which have included a performance by Brainstorm Theatre entitled "Sticks and Stones," as well as discussions about cyberbullying and managing conflict. At Year 9, students working in gender based groups, participated in a whole day workshop which focused on building positive relationships.

Students at each year level are offered so many opportunities to engage in curricular and co-curricular activities which are designed to foster the development

of resilience, a strong sense of identity, confidence and creativity. Through a range of activities which include camps, Feast Day, Rome Day, study skills programs, driver education and peer leadership, students also develop problem-solving, collaboration and team work skills, a respect for others and an appreciation of diversity.

The success of each of these activities can be attributed to the dedication, energy and commitment of our teaching staff and the willingness of our students to take a risk and try something new. Engaging in activities which take the students out of their comfort zone is such an important part of building resilience, confidence and self esteem, so crucial to their continued social, emotional and intellectual development.

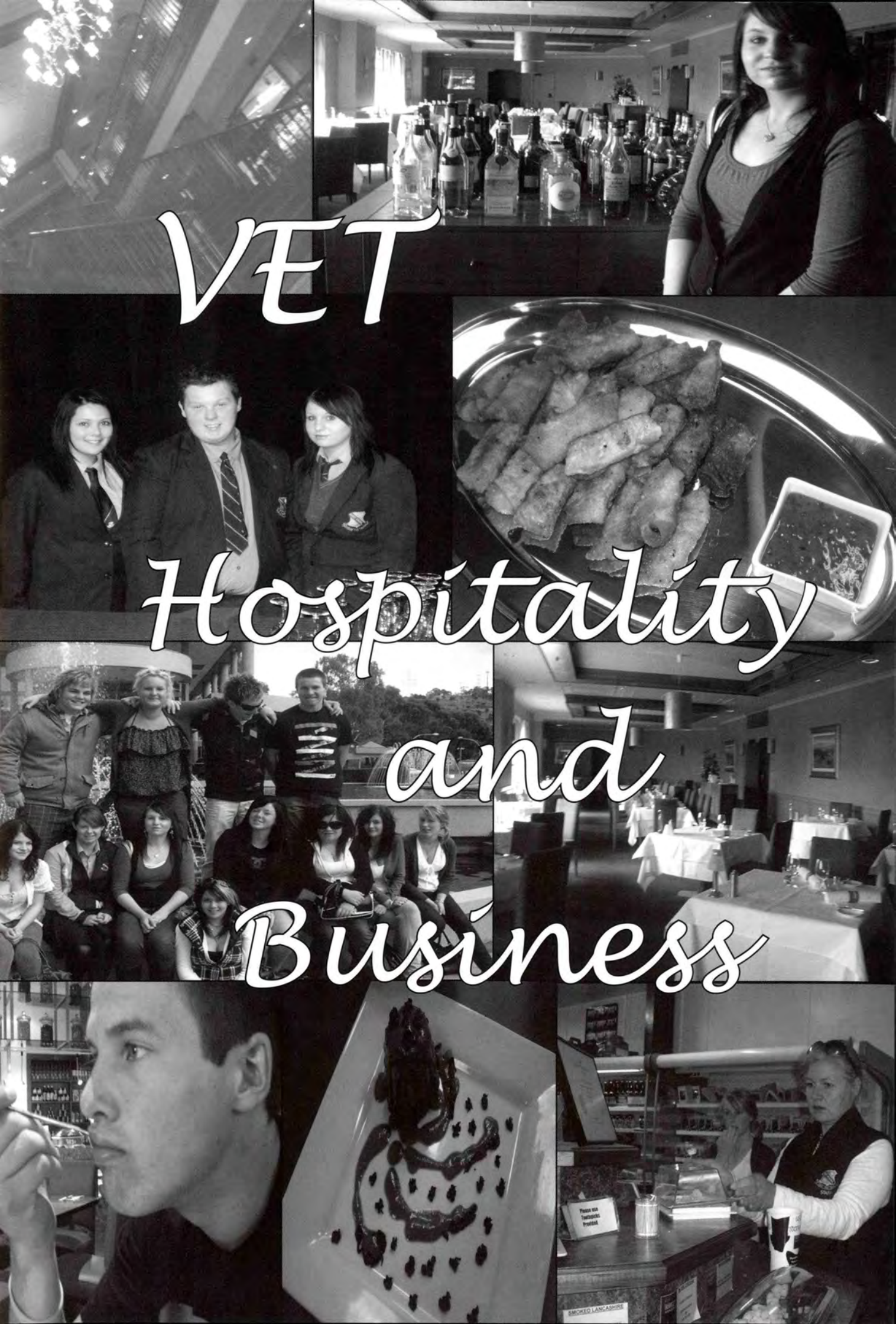

Mathematics

2009 saw a changing of the guard in the Mathematics Department with long time servant Mrs Dillys Goninon retiring from teaching. Many thanks must be made for the tireless effort and countless hours Mrs Goninon contributed towards the successful running of the Mathematics program at the College over a number of years. Students, once again, represented the College in the Australian Mathematics Competition and the Maths Relay Competition with great success. Marist Regional College continues to be well represented in both these events and students find the challenge very rewarding.

Mathematics Relay Competition

On Sunday 9 August 2009, twelve students, representing Marist Regional College, made up three teams of four to compete in the Tasmanian Mathematics Association Annual Relay Competition. In the relay, one student acts as a runner for the team, while the others attempt to solve the problem. With each new question, team members rotate the position, so a new student becomes the runner. Teams have a maximum of 45 minutes to solve 20 questions. One of our teams of Year 7 students won the Year 7/8 section of the competition. The team members were Jennifer Cable, Jacqueline Smedley, Arrabella King and Alyssia Moolenschot. Congratulations and well done to this team for such a high level of achievement, winning against Year 8 teams from local schools.

Our senior team, comprised of Gerald Mc Donagh, Hannah Younger, Malcolm Watson and Caleb Gillett were the only senior team competing on the day and did very well. Commendation wards also went to our second Year 7 team, comprised of Nicole Dunn, Kate Willmot, Corey Parker and Alice Djakic. This team did well and gained valuable experience for next year.

Australian Mathematics Competition

In August more than 300 Marist Students sat the 2009 Australian Mathematics Competition. The results for the school included 50 Proficiency Awards, 71 Credit Awards, 25 Distinction Awards and 1 High Distinction. Hayden Medwin from 7J achieved the school's only High Distinction. A Prudence Certificate is awarded to the student in the school who answers the greatest number of consecutive questions correctly. This year the award went to Jacqueline Chamley of 7J.

NAPLAN Testing

In May, students across Australia in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 sat the National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) Testing. Approximately 25,000 students from

Tasmanian government and non-government schools participated.

In reviewing the Numeracy results for our College, my initial reaction was one of pleasure in noting how our students had performed and that our students had compared favourably to the rest of Tasmania and, in fact, Australia as a whole.

IN NUMERACY

100% of Year 7 students were above the National Minimum Standard compared to 93% for Tasmania and 95% for Australia.

99% of Year 9 students were above the National Minimum Standard compared to 94% for Tasmania and 95% for Australia. Closer inspection of the School Summary Report illustrates a few other points:

1. In Year 9, 9% of our students reached the top band (Band 10) compared to 8% Australia wide.
2. 58% of our students in Year 9 are in the top 3 bands, compared to 52% Australia wide.
3. 65% of our students in Year 7 are in the top 3 bands, compared to 55% Australia wide.

The students and our Mathematics teachers and support staff must be congratulated on receiving such fine results.

MATHS ONLINE

McDonalds Australia has sponsored this fantastic website to enable everyone free access to online Maths tutorials. The website features full lessons for each concept with a voice over and numerous examples at varying difficulty. Every lesson has an accompanying summary and worksheet to consolidate concepts with full worked solutions. The Marist Regional College Mathematics department registered every student from the College and issued them with a free account, which many students accessed regularly. Feedback was very positive from staff and students and it is hoped that McDonalds will continue their sponsorship of the site in 2010.

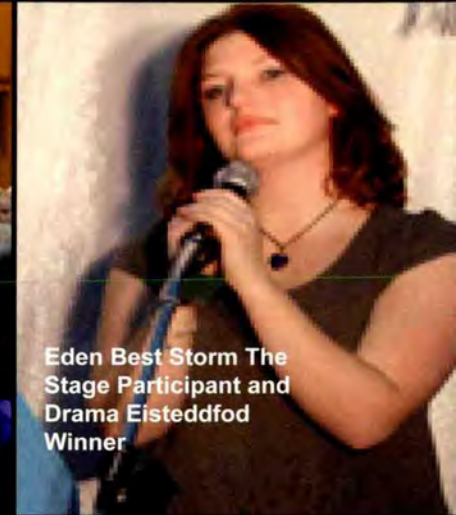

French Trip
