
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




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Principal's Report



All of us know education matters and we are fortunate to live in a country that values education and today provides funding for schools to ensure our children have adequate resources for learning. Australia has not always been like that. In 1842, Mary MacKillop was born in Fitzroy, Victoria, the eldest of eight children. She experienced poverty and, while she had access to education, she noticed that many didn't. Her own family fell on hard times and when Mary found employment she helped support her family because, back then, there was no safety net for families in distress. Children remained illiterate because there was no money to send them to school.

The story of Mary McKillop is one of great courage and faith which inspires Australians today. Perhaps, above all, we can learn from her determination to "have a go" and give everyone a "fair go".

Catholic education in Burnie has its roots in the efforts of other similar heroes such as our own Catherine McAuley and Jean-Claude Colin who had similar visions for education of the poor and a fair go for all. In their footsteps and inspired by their stories, sisters, priests and brothers came to Burnie in order to make sure children here had access to a quality education. They have handed to us a legacy which is a worthy cause for us to foster and enhance.

While our young people have the opportunity to access a good education, there are enormous challenges. We live in a world where communication and transportation are made easy. National boundaries and distance from other countries no longer protect us from competition and we need to find new and better ways of producing products and providing services. Students need an education that helps them to be flexible and open to change, to use their imaginations as well as to work cooperatively and collaboratively.

How we go about educating young people at our College is under regular review. As educators, we evaluate our provision of curriculum and our teaching practices and we look for creative and effective ways to improve and to innovate. As our vision statement says: we embrace strategies to improve student outcomes.

How are we doing this? As a College we are preparing for the Australian Curriculum and will be introducing elements of English, Mathematics, Science and History in 2011, although implementation is not required until 2013.

It is not just about a more rigorous curriculum, but also about how we engage students and make learning interesting and enjoyable.

With the aid of Federal Government Building Education Revolution funding, we have built the Chanel Centre for Year 7 students designed with the learning needs of young adolescents very much in mind. In Term 3, Year 7 students moved into Chanel and were amazed by the quality of the facilities. The "proof in the pudding", of course, is in the quality of student learning, creativity and innovative thinking inspired by the new learning environment. This point is not lost on the Middle Years team who are reshaping curriculum and learning to meet the needs of 21st century learners.

An aspect of this is immersion in digital technology. Our children have grown up with computers and are eager to use these tools to help them in their learning. For this purpose one of our teachers has been given substantial time in 2011 to work with teachers and students to keep them up to date with the latest developments in eLearning. The number of computers in the College has risen from about 350 in 2009 to 475 in 2010 and will grow to more than 600 in 2011.

In November we also received the exciting news that our submission to the Federal Government for funding of a trade training centre was successful. This will inject almost \$1.5m





into our building program and will result in an integrated commercial cookery, bakery, tourism and business training centre. It provides options for students who are looking to achieve industry recognised VET certification and will contribute to the Australian Government's program to increase the percentage of students leaving school with industry skills.

As has been demonstrated time and time again, the most important factor in ensuring good outcomes for students is good teachers.

Each of us can recall that good teacher who was patient, kind and firm enough to make sure we understood and grasped what was being taught. Those who show us respect usually secure our respect. It is in that atmosphere that we can learn best and I both thank and commend the College teaching staff for their commitment to College values and encourage parents, caregivers and students to engage with teachers in conversations where listening is the focus.

Candi Dempster, Susie Bond, Ian Margetts, Michael Ireland, Les Allen and Alanna Stretton work with me on the College Leadership Team. It is a wonderful group to work with, one that has built up great expertise and supports each other in an environment allowing for both autonomy and teamwork due to high levels of mutual trust and respect. The resignations of Candi Dempster and Ian Margetts are a big loss to the team and to the College, and we wish them well in their new endeavours.

Mrs Dempster, through her leadership of learning and teaching, has helped us embrace change with the focus always on student needs and striving for excellence. She will be sorely missed especially by students, staff and parents who hold her in high regard as someone who genuinely cares and does her best for them. Mr Margetts is an old scholar who is a very loyal supporter of the College and its values. He has put his stamp on the role of promoting faith formation and the religious education of the College community and articulating the vision of the College through the Marist and Mercy charisms. His gentle presence will be greatly missed.

I would also like to thank Mr Garry Dazeley, retiring Chairman of the Board, who has given six years dedicated service. Having had dealings with many different College Board members for more than eight years now, I assure you that our College has been well served by its Board members. Finally, I would like to thank the Governing Council for the guidance they provide to the College and their support of me in my role as Principal.

As I reflect on 2010 I can't help thinking it has been a very special year for learning at Marist Regional College. An event that stays with me was the Year 12 Graduation Mass and dinner dance. We farewelled a wonderful cohort of Year 12 students with their teachers, parents and caregivers. Over their six years at Marist, they have grown from childhood to adulthood. They have undertaken learning that will set them on a career pathway. They have learned for the sake of learning, for their health and for their spirituality. Our

graduates will make a difference in the world. They are creative, questioning and responsible young adults and we are proud to have played an important role in their development.

Annual Board agenda topics

This year the Board introduced an annual agenda, with a topic relevant to the governance of the school scheduled for each meeting. The topic was generally supported by a working paper, prepared by a member of the College Leadership Team, to help inform discussion on the topic.

The topics covered during the year included:

facilities

A tour of the school was conducted to help ensure Board members understood the functions and workings of the College, the facilities that support the school and the condition of those facilities.

school mission

The Director of Mission provided a paper aimed at ensuring the College was achieving its mission, meeting the Archbishop's charter and working towards achieving our vision.

enrolment

This agenda item helped members understand factors that could affect future enrolments and, where possible, plan for the impact those factors might bring.

long term finances

The Finance Manager prepared a paper to help satisfy the Board that the College will continue to be financially viable and in particular that future capital and recurrent expenditure can be appropriately funded within the expected fees and grants.

· building plans and capital works

This agenda item was intended to assure the Board that the College building assets are being appropriately maintained and that we continue to provide educational facilities that meet contemporary educational expectations.

safety

This agenda item was intended to satisfy the Board's duty of care that we are providing a safe environment for students and staff. The paper presented information on the injuries that have occurred during the year, the status of safety policy and procedures, and the risks and risk-control measures that are in place.



benchmarking

Numerous papers were presented to the Board comparing Marist Regional College with other schools and colleges within Tasmania and Australia. The benchmarking compared indices such as student-teacher ratios, fees, capital expenditure and administration-teaching staff ratios.

annual budget

A budget, addressing enrolment, long term finances and building plans, was prepared and approved by the Board.

succession planning and board review

This paper helped with planning for the coming year with respect to Board membership and Board performance.

New projects

The 2010 year saw some planned improvements completed and new projects initiated.

Chanel Centre

The Chanel Centre was completed and occupied in September of this year. This is a fantastic facility that will help ensure our Year 7 students receive a good education in a first class, contemporary educational facility. This facility was financed by the Federal Government under the Building Education Revolution program and from College funds and borrowings.

Trade training centre

The Federal Government has approved funds for the refurbishment and conversion of a part of the western wing of the school into a new trade training centre. This facility will include a commercial kitchen, an artisan bakery, restaurant and classrooms. We will be relocating some of the College's music and textile design facilities.

The College had a visit by the Catholic Secondary Education Review panel who interviewed members of the student, staff, parent and Board groups. The College received some positive feedback from members of the panel.

Board members continue to either lead or work as members of standing committees including the Finance Committee (Dean Waldhauser and Garry Dazeley), the Safety Committee (Paul McGrath), the Building Committee (Wayne Licht) and Strategic Planning (Tess McDonagh). These committees continue to work successfully to guide the activities of the Board and the College.



Learning & Teaching



This year has proven to be a very rewarding academic year for Marist Regional College. The outstanding achievements of our students across traditional subject areas and vocational learning courses continue to show the depth of our academic program.

Much learning occurs parallel to formal classes and students have achieved wonderful successes in academic competitions, regional, state and international competitions. This year we celebrated our first winner of the Frank MacDonald Memorial Prize, a competition that has been running for the past six years. Year 9 student Declan Fahey wrote a moving essay on Gallipoli and this win enables him to attend the ANZAC Day Service in Gallipoli, Turkey in 2011. The College also provides students with a variety of opportunities to extend their learning and skills through co-curricular clubs and after-school programs like Stitched, Tai Chi and fitness classes.

Certificate I and II qualifications in construction, hospitality, business, tourism, electro-technology and child studies have been a highlight of the vocational learning of students in 2010. Australian school-based apprenticeships have also been taken up by students, this year in the hairdressing area.

ICT usage has increased dramatically in 2010. Classpad technology in mathematics classrooms, interactive whiteboards, projectors and 24/7 on-line learning access to assignments have all enhanced the flexible and innovative delivery of learning.



Year 7 and 9 NAPLAN

This year saw 158 students enrol in Year 7 from 31 different primary schools. The NAPLAN data indicate the current Year 7 cohort is slightly lower in spelling, and grammar and punctuation than previous years.

There were 153 students enrolled in Year 9. The Year 9 NAPLAN data reveal the value-adding the College curriculum has made to students' overall literacy and numeracy efficacy from Year 7 to Year 9.

The NAPLAN results indicate the College is performing at a consistently high level when compared with other Tasmania and Australian schools.

Literacy enhancement

A strategic direction for 2010 was to continue to enhance the literacy and comprehension skills of Middle Years students. The literacy enhancement program, undertaken by all Year 7 and Year 8 students, focused on the ability to decode, comprehend and apply literacy knowledge across the curriculum. The data clearly demonstrate the positive impacts the program is having on students' comprehension levels and reading confidence.




Movement in reading grades for the Year 7 Cohort of 2009

Reading is the precursor to improved comprehension, vocabulary, creativity and literacy confidence. Improvement in reading enables learners to better access the curriculum. The graph to the right illustrates the progress of learners from 2008 to 2010. The graph shows a dramatic improvement in the number of students, from 11 in 2008 up to 55 in 2010, reaching a Grade 12 reading level.

The next phase in embedding challenging and specific literacy development for learners will be through a program to be formulated throughout 2011 that maps where literacy is specifically taught in each of the key learning areas. The aim in 2011 is to provide critical links between the literacy enhancement program and the Year 9-12 subject programs, teaching pedagogies and learning sequences. The 'filter' on literacy will also be used to align our current literacy areas to the identified areas where literacy is explicitly taught in the Australian Curriculum.

Pathways

The continued tracking of our students and their employability skills for the future reveals that our students have a well-balanced approach to their chosen careers, whether in the traditional trades, emerging trade areas, university, certificate courses or employment. Our pathways tracking and career counselling program yields many successes, with students able to fulfil their dreams through hands-on experiences such as structured workplace learning and try-a-trade experiences.



A rigorous academic program coupled with our strong pastoral care breeds success and a climate of respectful and calculated risk-taking in our graduates.

I extend warm and heartfelt thanks to all teaching and nonteaching staff for their dedication and witness to our young people throughout 2010, and wish the College community every success for the future.

Student & Staff Welfare

The Pastoral Care Team is led by the Deputy Principal Student and Staff Welfare and consists of the College Counsellor, the Year Level Coordinators and the LEC Coordinator. They have been working hard this year to ensure consistency of practice when responding to the management of student wellbeing and behavioural issues.

The team has updated policies concerned with academic, social and emotional wellbeing. The Safe School Policy, Personal Responsibility and Student Behaviour Management Guidelines were also reviewed. Our aim is to promote empathy, understanding, responsibility and accountability within the student body. For this reason, we work closely with students, helping them to reflect on their choices and the impact of those choices on others. The principles of working restoratively to promote justice are embedded in our practice.

Working in partnership with parents and building links with the community is fundamental to our practice in supporting student wellbeing. To this end, we invited parents and the wider community to three evening workshops on the topics of Drug and Alcohol Education, Cybersafety and Raising Boys.

The Pastoral Care program at the College has supported students by focusing on issues responding to their developmental, social and emotional needs. Consistent themes throughout the College have been the promotion of positive peer relationships, making safe and responsible choices and decisions and raising awareness of the complex issue of cyber safety.

Mr Paul Dillon, from Drug and Alcohol Research and Training Australia, presented workshops for students and staff from Years 10-12 on the topic of harm minimisation in relation to the consumption of alcohol or other drugs. Year 10 students were given a further opportunity to explore safe partying behaviour later in the year with the team from iparty.

The very topical issue of cyber safety was addressed, Brainstorm Theatre performed *The Hurting Game* for Year 7 and 8 students, while Mr Greg Gebhart, from the Australian Communications and Media Authority, provided practical and comprehensive strategies and advice regarding online safety. As a result our students have become more proactive and responsible with regard to their communication online.

During a half-day workshop, facilitated by speakers from Youth Health and Tasmania Police, Year 9 students were offered the opportunity to explore their rights and responsibilities in relation to sexual health and relationships. In small groups, the students discussed a range of scenarios involving young people and the issue of consent. Older students have had similar opportunities to discuss the personal, social and legal ramifications of some of their choices and decisions.

Numerous special events across each of the year levels have also continued this year. Highlights have included camps for Year 7 and 9 students, held at various locations across the State, Rome Day, Medieval Day, driver education, Harmony Day, the annual social, as well as the Graduation Ball and Masquerade Ball for Senior College students.

I would like to thank the Year Level Coordinators and Class Teachers for their commitment to ensuring students are offered opportunities beyond the classroom to participate in activities that greatly enrich school life, increase self-confidence, resilience and a sense of belonging, teach new skills and encourage appropriate risk-taking behaviour in a safe and supportive environment. These activities could not take place without the dedication and support of our teaching staff to the holistic education of our students.

Our Faith Community



Staff and students were formally welcomed to Marist Regional College for the 2010 school year at the annual Commencement Mass. The College student leaders were also inducted at this time and we met and welcomed the new Burnie-Wynyard Parish Priest, Fr Tony Kennedy. Other liturgical celebrations included Ash Wednesday, Holy Week, Catholic Education Week, as well as Mass for Feast Day and Year 12 Graduation. We also met to remember passed loved ones at a memorial liturgy for Alex Waugh and our annual Mass for deceased members of the College community. Mass continued to be celebrated every Wednesday morning in the College chapel.

Renewal and Retreat programs formed a part of the Year 7-12 Religious Education program. Years 7-11 undertook a one-day program that took in such themes as values, giftedness and respecting difference, personal best and social justice. The Year 12 cohort undertook a two-day program that included presentations from Nick Clements, a motivational speaker and mentor from the Whitelion organisation, Stuart Wright from UCANDO New Zealand and Fr Richard Ross from Catholic Youth Ministry Tasmania.





The REMAR program provided an opportunity for students to undertake personal, spiritual and leadership development activities. These occurred through fortnightly meetings and a variety of local and national camps and retreats for the students from Years 10-12 who are involved in the program. In addition to this, REMAR students undertook community service in the local area. This included Yaraandoo Aged Care visitation, assisting with the College Winter Breakfast Club and raising money for charities. The Year 11s again travelled to Melbourne for a solidarity camp that included helping out at the St Mary's House of Welcome, packing Christmas hampers at the Collingwood Community Shop and assisting with St Vincent de Paul Society's Fitzroy soup van services.

Under the guidance of the Youth Ministry assistant, students were involved in various activities to support both local and international groups. The College community also continued to support fundraising initiatives of Caritas, Marist and Mercy Missions and the Archbishop's Samaritan Fund.

During the September holidays, five students and two staff members embarked on the College's inaugural International Immersion Experience to Fiji. Partnering with Catholic Mission and Marist schools in Fiji, the 10-day experience allowed participants to:

- develop an appreciation of the work of the Church in Fiji;
- develop an appreciation of the spiritual wealth, but material poverty, inherent in non-western indigenous communities;
- develop an appreciation of the depth of relationships and sense of community;
- critique our own culture from the vantage point of a culture very different from our own;
- search for reasons for the huge disparities in wealth between the minority world and the majority world from a justice and gospel perspective; and
- become advocates for social justice.

Sessions were interspersed with drama, games, discussions, workshops and prayer, all of which helped students to develop a personal understanding of what it means to "sail away from mediocrity".

Red caravel day

Blue solidarity camp

Sessions looked at the contrast between how society "calls" us to be in contrast to our God who calls us to be people of love, justice and faith.

The trip also let us try out things we would not otherwise do. We are very grateful for the opportunity to get to know some really amazing people in Fiji.



Year Levels



Middle Years



This year the College commenced a middle years' learning program which recognises that young adolescents have particular academic, pastoral and social needs as they make the transition from primary to secondary education.

The middle years' learning program includes integrated curricula structured around themes that relate to all subjects. In Term 2, Medieval Day for Year 8 students and Rome Day for Year 7 students were very successful cross-curricula days, also having a strong pastoral care focus.

A feature of middle years' education is creative 'hands-on' learning. Some examples of the creative 'hands-on' learning that occurred are constructing Roman architecture, Aboriginal art, designing and constructing board-games and infomercials.

The Ancient Rome unit in Year 7 SOSE required students to research Roman architecture, design and build a replica model of their architecture and design an information sheet explaining the interesting parts.

In the Year 7 SOSE Tasmanian Aboriginal history unit, students worked in small groups to explore different topics: clans, roles of men and women, food, clothing and technology, language, Dreaming and culture.



In Year 8 English, two of the classes read *Lockie Leonard*, a novel by Tim Winton. Students constructed their own board game that was based on the novel. In the game they had to include 40 or more question cards, figurines to move around the board, a board to play on and a set of instructions. The finished games looked fantastic and were great to play.

All Middle Years students continued to participate in the Literacy Enhancement Achievement Program. Students worked in small groups four times a cycle to develop their literacy skills. Students were grouped according to their reading grade level — from Grade 1-12. All students were tested in November 2009 and again in November 2010. The results have clearly shown the value of the program with substanial increases in students' reading grade levels.


The concept of students only having two main core subject teachers has contributed to the building of positive relationships between students and staff in the Middle Years. The first two days of the year for our new Year 7 students involved a transition program to assist students into settling in at Marist. The focus of the two days was to make students feel welcome and part of the Marist community. It also aimed to develop positive relationships between students and Year 7 teachers prior to commencing timetabled academic study. Year 8 students participated in a Super 8s Day early in the year to assist them in developing their cooperation and teamwork skills.

Overall 2010 has been a fantastic start to Middle Years at Marist Regional College.




















Sorry, and saying Thanks) and being a giver in preference to being a taker.







Work Experience







Year 10 Work Experience was conducted in the last week of Term 2. The aim of the week was to provide all Year 10 students with the opportunity to venture into the workforce and experience the demands and challenges of working five full days and in some cases shift work. The most popular occupations again this year were Hospitality, Education, Building and Early Childhood. One of the most pleasing aspects was that all students participated in the program and can now state they have experience in the work force, have an up-to-date resumé and can write an application letter at any time if required.

Many of the students were particularly nervous yet, at the same time, excited at the prospect of working away from the College. Work Experience week is designed to broaden and inform the student of future career pathways and gain first-hand experience. The program is now a central component to the Vocational Education Learning (VEL) course.





























Senior College Homerooms

Pierre de Coubertin award



Named after Baron Pierre de Coubertin, the founder of the modern Olympics, the program recognises those students who demonstrate attributes consistent with the fundamental aims of the Olympic

movement, such as mutual respect, friendship, fair play, understanding of others, a striving for excellence and sense of pride in the achievements of others. Importantly, the awards recognise and foster leadership qualities, as well as providing role models for peers to emulate.

This year's recipient is Tom Hartley.

What is Olympism?

To me, Olympism can be summed up in one single Australian sporting moment. This was a moment that demonstrated friendship, respect and a level of sportsmanship possessed by very few people. It was during the 1956 1500 metre final at the Australian National Championships. On the third lap, with a tussle for position at the front of the pack, Ron Clarke was clipped by the fellow runners and fell. John Landy, the one-mile world record holder at the time, leapt over him but caught Clarke with his spike and injured him. In a spontaneous act of true sportsmanship, Landy stopped, turned back to the fallen Ron Clarke and helped him up to his feet. He brushed him off, and checked his bloodied shoulder and simply said 'sorry'. Landy had stopped, without hesitation, to return to his fellow runner showing genuine concern. With the lead pack now some 30 yards in front of him, he was determined to strive for excellence and get himself back in the race. Landy pushed himself and went on to win the race, only six seconds shy of his world record. Was this a stupid or foolish act that Landy committed by going back to help his fellow competitor and sacrificing what would most likely have been a world record? For me it was a beautiful, selfless, incredible act of Olympism.


Our own After Three Theatre Company collaborated well to produce *Much Ado About Nothing* which delighted audiences.

Sport



State of Sport



Marist Regional College continued to raise the sporting bar throughout 2010. Approximately 40 students represented Tasmania and a further 40 represented the North West Coast in a wide range of sports across the year. This equates to about one in 11 students at the College reaching a very high level in their chosen sport. The College competed in five State Finals, winning three. We also saw a number of excellent athletics, cross-country and swimming performances that have seen records being broken from as far back as 1984.

A large number of Marist Regional College students were nominated in *The Advocate* Junior Sport Awards, which recognise sporting excellence along the North West Coast, with the College providing six of the 16 finalists and also a team nomination.

Excellence in sport

Some of our outstanding individual and team performances included:

- Matthew Phillips, who represented Australia in the World Motor Cross Championships in France in September and finished a creditable 15th in the Under 19 age group.
- Five players representing the Tassie Mariners this year and our Year 8 football team running out convincing winners of the NWJFU competition.
- Emma Humphries, who was recognised as the State's
 most promising junior cricketer by being awarded a
 Lord's Taverners Scholarship. Emma, a right arm leg
 spinner and right hand bat, has been training with the
 State's open female cricket team, the Tasmanian Roar.
 Emma is also a talented soccer player and scored both
 goals in the College's 2-1 win against St Mary's College
 in the State soccer final in August.

- Luke Plane, who made it all the way through to the national final of the 71kg division at the Australian Amateur Boxing Championships, losing out in the final on a points decision.
- Estelle Margetts, who has continued to work hard at improving her netball skills within the TIS programs and also playing a major role in assisting our Year 9-10 girls to win the basketball State title.

Girls in sport

The dominance of our senior girls has been a real highlight for the College. Leah Waldhauser again took out the All Schools Cross-Country and performed a clean sweep of the 3km, 1500m and 800m at the NSATIS Athletics Carnival and had another strong performance at the SATIS carnival a week later. Morgan Gaffney and Zoe Gee dominated the sprinting events at the northern carnival finishing first and second respectively in the 100 and 200 metres, with Morgan going on to record a win in both events at the SATIS carnival as well.

Year 11 student Tayla Britton continued to impress with an outstanding performance at the 2010 Under 18 Indoor Hockey Championships in Perth, being named "player of the tournament" and being selected for a three-day national training camp, which looks to develop players for the 2015 World Cup team. Tayla was also an important member of the College team that was narrowly defeated in the State final this year.

It was a successful year with many new players joining both the boys' and girls' training squads.





Despite Mitchell Stanley's outstanding goal keeping, Marist A had their first loss for the tournament in their semi final and finished the day in a respectable third place.


